My birthday began with dealing with health problems. I'm grateful for all those prayers while I was away and I am on the right track of better health. Your prayers and best wishes strengthen me in spirit and show me the reassurance of God's healing grace. Special thanks to the staff, priests and deacons adding to their busy schedules.

After several days of gloomy weather, we can easily feel discouraged. When the sunlight appears again, it makes us feel good. We may recall last week's Gospel passage showed John the Baptist, identifying Jesus, and saying "behold the Lamb of God." Recognition of Jesus in our lives is so important.

In today's readings the good news shows, Jesus is light not just for himself but for the world. Jesus' light moves in our midst today. He is moving toward the disciples as he goes to Galilee following the arrest of John the Baptist. He refers to the passage from the Prophet Isaiah: *"the people who sit in darkness, have seen a great light, on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death light has arisen."* Jesus goes on to urge those listeners to 'repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.' Jesus sees the fishermen: Simon (Peter) Andrew, James, and John. He calls out to them *"come after me, and I will make you fishers of men."*

God's Kingdom/ Reign is available for everyone. This good news illustrates a clear path forward. When we reflect on Jesus moving toward us as light for us, in our current situation, we will want to get to know him better. We do this by tuning in more, listening in prayer so by deepening our relationship. We trust in this invitation to come after him as disciples today. Like them, there are plenty of things to occupy our time and focus. Jesus still calls us to follow. As modern day disciples in mission, we may work our best at sharing his light, good news of the gospel through sharing our care for others.

AN INVITATION TO SHARE YOUR GIFTS FOR THE BENEFIT OF OTHERS

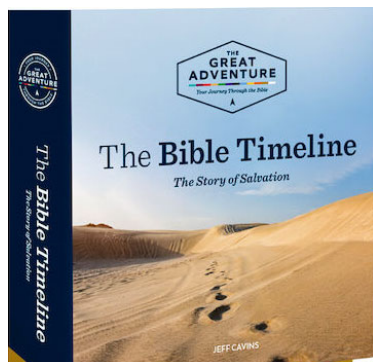

EDUCATION/FORMATION

- +**Be a substitute** in the Religious Education Program (very helpful if you are already Virtus certified). Classes are on Mondays, 6:30-7:45 p.m.
- +Share your faith and friendship as a member of the **SPRED Team** (team meetings and community sessions are on Tuesdays in the late afternoon). We work with adults 22 years of age and older.
- +Assist with planning the **Lent Parish Mission and/or Lent Speaker Series**.
- +Help conduct **Baptism Preparation Sessions**, possibly attend the baptism and check in with parents from time to time.
- +Participate in **Bible Study or the Bible Timeline dvd series** and learn more about your faith. Be trained to help lead discussions after each dvd segment.

HUMAN CONCERNS

- +Comfort and support those grieving as a part of the **Bereavement Ministry**. Funeral Mass planning, attend wake on behalf of parish, be present, assist as needed at funeral, follow up calls.
- +Be the face and hands of Christ for those who come to the church in their need as part of either the **Monthly Food Distribution** (4th Wednesday of each month, SIJ parking lot, anytime from 2:15 – 6:30 p.m.) **and/or Parish Outreach Ministry** (help keep food pantry organized and stocked, assist clients, fill out assistance form).
- +As a **Minister of Care** bring Holy Communion and the prayers and support of our parish to those who are in nursing homes, senior living facilities or homebound. You attend one six-week training in Niles.

OUR FASCINATING FAITH Ordinary Time

Between the end of the Christmas season and the start of Lent, the liturgical year begins a period known as Ordinary Time. That season is interrupted by the seasons of Lent and Easter, and then resumes again after Pentecost. The English translation of the Latin name for this season has received much criticism because of our association of the word "ordinary" with something of lesser value, the opposite of something special. Critics point out that Sunday is the original feast day of the Church, that there is nothing at all "ordinary" about our weekly celebration of the Lord's dying and rising. Translators explain that in this context the English word "ordinary" retains the root meaning of "ordinal," something counted "in order," and that the Sundays throughout the year are in fact named by their numerical order.

It is helpful to understand how all five of the "special" seasons of the liturgical year (Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time, Lent, Easter) fit together to unfold the single mystery of Christ. As we continue the year now with Ordinary Time, we are mindful that what we celebrate is indeed as "extraordinary" an experience of God's grace as one could ever imagine.



THE RELICS OF ST. THOMAS MORE AT THE SHRINE OF ALL SAINTS

His belief that no lay ruler has jurisdiction over the Church cost Sir Thomas More his life. Beheaded on Tower Hill, London, on June 6, 1535, he steadfastly refused to approve King Henry VIII's divorce and remarriage and the establishment of the Church of England.

Described as "a man for all seasons", More was a literary scholar, the author of "Utopia", a dear friend of Desiderius Erasmus, Dean John Colet of St. Paul's, and the other contemporary leading humanists, a gentleman, father of four children, and chancellor of England. He was the ghost writer of King Henry VIII's "Defense of the Seven Sacraments", for which the Pope awarded Henry the title "Defender of the Faith" (a title still used by the English monarch). An intensely spiritual man, he could not support the king's divorce from Catherine of Aragon in order to marry Anne Boleyn. Nor could he acknowledge Henry as supreme head of the Church of England, breaking with Rome and denying the pope as head.

He was committed to the Tower of London to await trial for treason: not swearing to the Act of Succession and the Oath of Supremacy. He was convicted, based on the perjury of Sir Richard Rich. Upon conviction, More declared that he had all the councils in Christendom and not just the council of one realm to support him in the decision of his conscience.

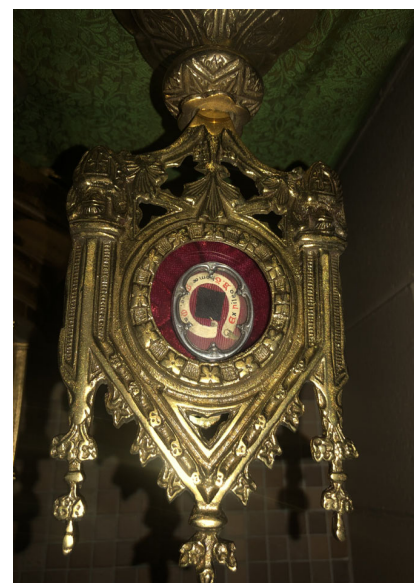
After his beheading, his body was buried under the floor in the Chapel of St. Peter ad Vinculam in the Tower of London. His head was taken from the scaffold and parboiled, stuck on a pole and exhibited on London Bridge. His devoted daughter, Margaret Roper, bribed the bridge-keeper to knock it down, and she smuggled it home. She preserved the head in spices, but she was betrayed by spies and briefly imprisoned. She died in 1544 and St. Thomas's head was buried with her in St. Dunstan's Church in Canterbury. In 1824, her vault was opened and More's head was put on public view for many years. It is still located at St. Dunstan's. The Shrine of All Saints possesses three relics of St. Thomas More: a bone fragment, a portion of his cranium, and a piece of the skull cap he wore (beneath the hat in Holbein's famous portrait of him). Our most recently obtained relic is the portion of his cranium. It was sealed and certified by Cardinal Antonio Torrini of Lucca on April 6, 1961. It comes from the palace chapel of the Orsini Pignatelli family of Spinazzola, Italy.

cranium



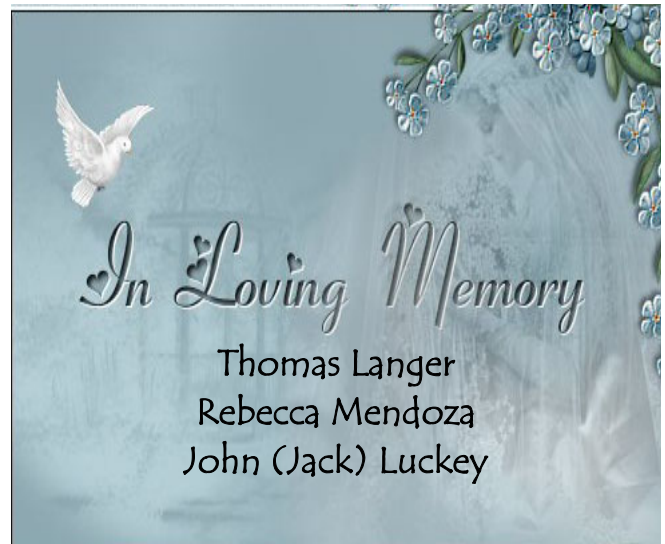

GOD'S LOVING CARE

Two readings today refer to the northeast region of ancient Israel: “the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali.” Upon hearing these names, some of us might consult maps and determine exactly where these regions lie. Others might let the unfamiliar names drift by unnoticed. If no maps are handy—but we don’t want to ignore the references completely—consider this: we might not know the latitude and longitude of Zebulun and Naphtali, but God does. We praise God for watching over every inch of land and sea, caring perfectly for each creature on the planet. While Isaiah celebrates the depth of God’s care with “abundant joy and great rejoicing,” Saint Paul begs us to remember how the Lord shows this loving care: through the cross. In today’s Gospel, Jesus calls Peter, James, and John to follow him. We follow too, confident that God accompanies us, wherever we are.
