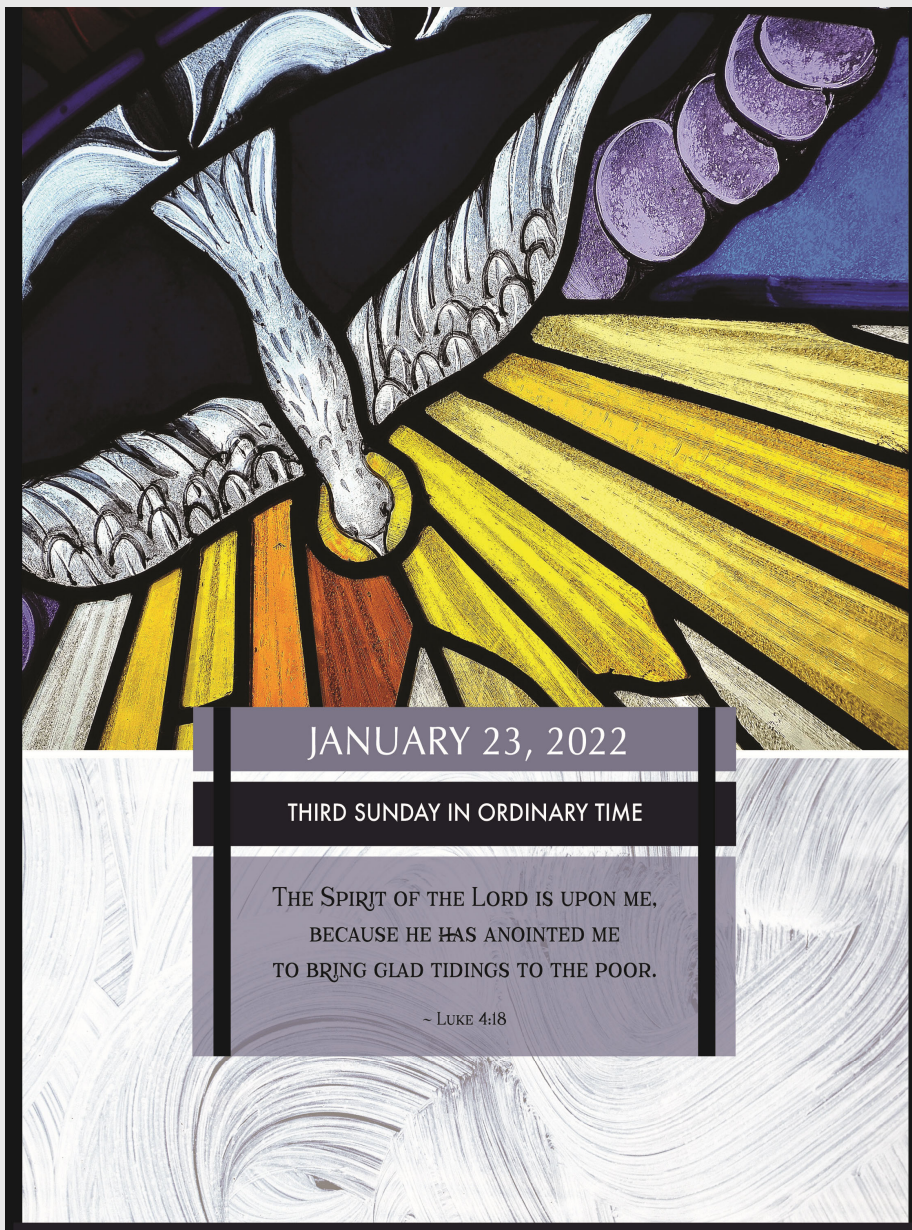

SPIRITUAL READING: From the *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy of the Second Vatican Council*

“Christ is always present to his Church, especially in the actions of the liturgy. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, in the person of the minister (it is the same Christ who formerly offered himself on the cross that is now offered by the ministry of priests) and most of all under the eucharistic species. He is present in the sacraments by his power, in such a way that when someone baptizes, Christ himself baptizes. He is present in his word, for it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. Finally, he is present when the Church prays and sings, for he himself promised: *Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there in their midst.* Indeed, in this great work which gives perfect glory to God and brings holiness to men, Christ is always joining in partnership with himself his beloved Bride, the Church, which calls upon its Lord and through him gives worship to the eternal Father.

“It is therefore right to see the liturgy as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ, in which through signs addressed to the senses man’s sanctification is signified and, in a way proper to each of these signs, made effective, and in which public worship is celebrated in its fullness by the mystical body of Jesus Christ, that is, by the head and by his members. Accordingly, every liturgical celebration, as an activity of Christ the priest and of his body, which is the Church, is a sacred action of a preeminent kind. No other action of the Church equals its title to power or its degree of effectiveness.

“In the liturgy on earth we are given a foretaste and share in the liturgy of heaven, celebrated in the holy city of Jerusalem, the goal of our pilgrimage, where *Christ is seated at the right hand of God, as minister of the sanctuary and of the true tabernacle.* With the whole company of heaven we sing a hymn of praise to the Lord; as we reverence the memory of the saints, we hope to have some part with them, and to share in their fellowship; we wait *for the Savior, our Lord Jesus Christ, until he, who is our life, appears, and we appear with him in glory.*

“By an apostolic tradition taking its origin from the very day of Christ’s resurrection, the Church celebrates the paschal mystery every eighth day, the day that is rightly called the Lord’s day. On Sunday the Christian faithful ought to gather together, so that by listening to the word of God and sharing in the Eucharist they may recall the passion, death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus and give thanks to God *who has given them a new birth with a lively hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.* The Lord’s day is therefore the first and greatest festival, one to be set before the loving devotion of the faithful and impressed upon it, so that it may be also a day of joy and of freedom from work. Other celebrations must not take precedence over it, unless they are truly of the greatest importance, since it is the foundation and the kernel of the whole liturgical year.”

One of our volunteers will walk around with you with a cart as you choose the produce/foods you want. It will be placed in the cart and when you have finished, the volunteer will walk the cart to your car so you can load it in and bring it home. The volunteer will then bring the cart back to use with the next person. If you can benefit from this food support, please come. PRAYER FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE UNBORN

Lord Jesus, we know how precious each child is to you. We pray that their family and friends would come alongside them. *Let these beautiful mothers know how fiercely You love them.* **We pray all shame, guilt and fear would break off of them in Jesus' name.** Share with them that by Your grace You will give them the strength, wisdom and capacity they need to be a wonderful mother. Awaken the church to see the needs of mothers and families experiencing unplanned pregnancies. Cause the church to step out in generosity and carry Jesus' extravagant love, to care for mothers and families from the moment their baby is conceived to the day that precious little one is born and throughout all that their life brings. **We pray for legal protection for each child.** May our government recognize the sanctity of every life and commit to protect the unborn. We pray mothers receive the wrap-around care and resources they need. We know in this world we will have trouble, but we also take heart because we know You have overcome. *(John 16:33)* **We trust that you are on the move on behalf of each unborn child and their mothers.** We commit them into Your care, Jesus. Thank you for making a way. Thank you for showing us how to follow You. Thank you for loving each of us so deeply. *Thank you for leaning close, being with us and for hearing and answering our prayers. We pray in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*

Reflections from Fr. Dennis

Dear Friends and Fellow Parishioners:

If you have ever been to an all-you-can-eat buffet, you probably know what it means to feel overstuffed. There are so many delicious things, you have to try them all. After hearing today's Bible readings, you may also feel that you have "eaten" too much. How can we sum up all of this?

The Alleluia verse gives us a clue in its expressions "bring glad tidings" and then "proclaim liberty." First of all, we should be glad. How blessed we are to receive the Good News of Jesus Christ. God has revealed the law to us, a law that is "perfect, refreshing the soul." We have a guide to living a good life, a road map to heaven on earth and heaven in eternity. Consider the world's troubles caused by ignoring God's law: corruption, violence, thievery, greed, addictions, infidelity, polarization, systemic injustice. The Lord has given us the antidote to these evils: Glad tidings indeed!

Jesus liberates us. The public life of Jesus, which we will examine in detail through the eyes of St. Luke during this liturgical year, shows us how to be liberated from sin's captivity – by not doing what we please but by doing what we ought to do in order to be fully human. We are truly free when we honor and obey God, enabling our fellow human beings to do the same. We are truly liberated when we follow the teaching and example of Jesus, who calls us to follow Him. Though this may take us along the way of the cross, we can rejoice because we know we are going in the right direction.

God's Good News calls us to become one Body in Christ, to unite in one common effort, different as we are. As each part of the body has its special function, so each of us has a personal role to play in the Body of Christ. If one part suffers, all parts suffer with it; if one part is honored, all parts share the joy. The body is most free when its parts are healthy. We are called to be healthy members of Christ's Body. How we live God's law of love is the measure of our health. How we mirror Jesus in our lives indicates how much we set ourselves and the whole Body free.

Jesus wants to form us into one Bread, one Body in the Eucharist we are about to celebrate and receive. He wants to set us free and give us joy – glad tidings and true liberty indeed!

GOD'S LAW

Scripture has always held God's law to be the path to human happiness. In today's first reading, Ezra the priest reads the scroll of the law to the people returned from exile. They weep—then are joyful. Israel's relationship with God had always been defined by how they kept and lived God's law. The author of Psalm 96 likewise praises the law of God as the source of wisdom, joy and enlightenment, purity and justice.

In his advice to the bickering Corinthians, Paul points out that, just as God has made all parts of a human body essential for the health of the whole, living as "Christ's body" requires that each member be recognized as necessary for the good of all. Finally, in Luke's Gospel Jesus claims that the Spirit is sending him to relieve human suffering. Like Ezra, he is reading from a scroll, proclaiming God's "law" of mercy to those in need.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

"Ordinary" is not always a desirable adjective. Who would not be insulted to receive a thank-you note for your "ordinary birthday gift," or "the ordinary hospitality at the dinner party"? No restaurant advertises its "ordinariness," no car dealer seats a customer at the steering wheel and whispers, "Look how ordinary it is!" Yet here we are in "Ordinary Time." The word carries a different meaning here: it does not mean these days are dull, boring, pedestrian, uninteresting. It means "ordinal," or "numbered" Sundays, a season of the year when we follow the story of Jesus' life and ministry in an ordered way, with each Sunday assigned an ordinal number.

You can amaze your friends with this example of Catholic arithmetic: the "Ordinary Sundays" begin with the last Sunday of Christmas, the Baptism of the Lord, continue until the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, and resume after a cluster of feasts following Pentecost Sunday. The numbers are calculated by counting backwards from the Solemnity of Christ the King, the Thirty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Now you know there is nothing "ordinary" about "Ordinary Time!"

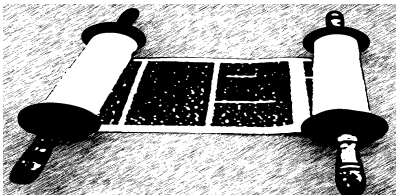

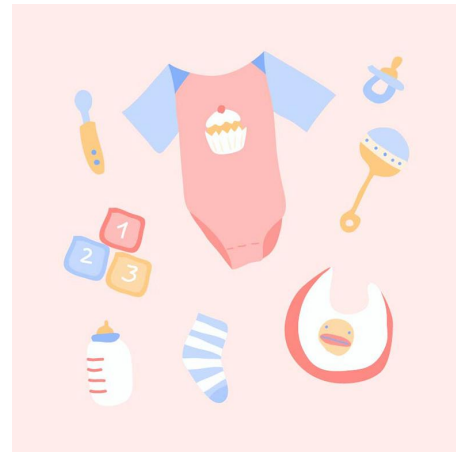
