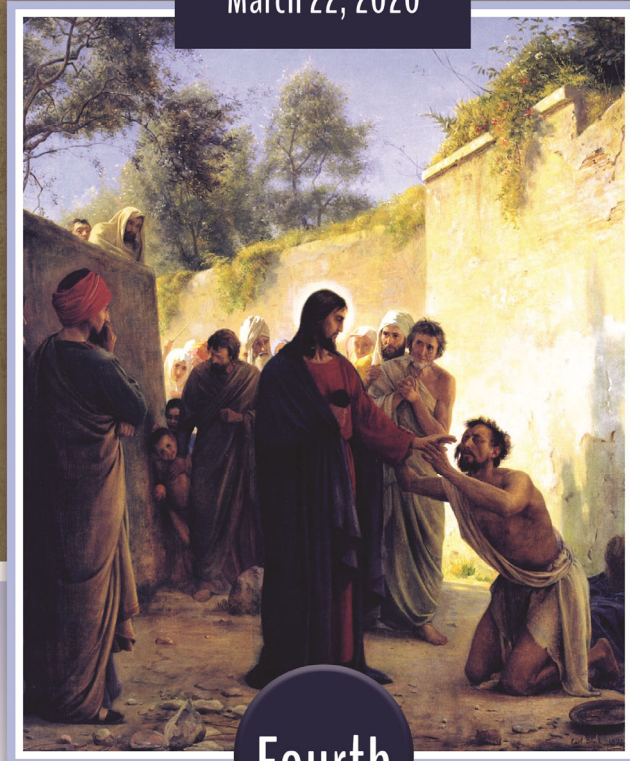

Pastor's Desk

Be not Afraid!

As I write my Pastors column a number of things come to mind due to the spread of COVID-19. It has not only affected people and countries over the world; but we are now gripped with fear seeing the death toll rising day by day. The virus COVID-19 makes its entry anywhere and people who are affected by it may not be aware that they are carriers of such a virus, as a result, fear creeps into our minds and we don't know what to expect next.

President Franklin Roosevelt once asserted, "*The only thing we have to fear is fear itself.*" I think he was right: Fear of fear probably causes more problems in our lives than fear itself. Once you allow fear to overpower you then you will be lean into it. So before fear takes hold of you, act quickly so that you are not lead by it. So how would we define fear? A simple and useful definition of fear is: *An anxious feeling, caused by our anticipation of some imagined event or experience.*

Fear, like all other emotions, is basically information. It offers knowledge and understanding provided we choose to accept it. For many people, worry, anxiety and fear are constant companions. We have a number of fears and to name some like fear of death, fear of danger, fear of disease. Too often, these fears are crippling, keeping us from the life God has called us to live. But it doesn't have to be that way, says Dr. David Jeremiah. As Christians, we have been given all we need in order to face down even the most frightening, unexpected and overwhelming obstacles in life.

In the Scriptures we come across how Jacob cheated his brother Esau and got the blessing for himself instead. Later in the story Jacob is fearful of meeting Esau and it teaches us that when fear grips you, rely on God's provision, not on your plans.

That reminds me of my own experience last weekend as I came to Church on Sunday morning much before 8.00am and seeing the empty pews made me very sad. Sitting quietly alone with God; I began thinking *how long Lord it is going to be this way.* As I began my Church prayer, I came across a Scripture text from the book of prophet Nehemiah (8:9-10) which read "This day is holy to the Lord your God: do not mourn or weep. For this day is holy to our Lord: and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength. I felt so consoled by these words that my own fears disappeared since the Lord spoke to me through his word. So trust in the Lord at all times as He is the one in command. So do not be afraid take all your cares, fears and worries unto to him.

Due to COVID -19 our liturgical celebrations have been suspended but not our expenses or paying of bills. Don't forget your contributions to the church are important as we count on you to make ends meet. Further instructions are given how to comply. Please be considerate to mail your contributions. Let's pray for one another and all those affected by this virus and those who attend to them, first Responders, Doctors & Nurses that their lives may be safe.

I would recommend that everyone use this Spiritual Communion Prayer on the next page which is very fruitful for our spiritual life.

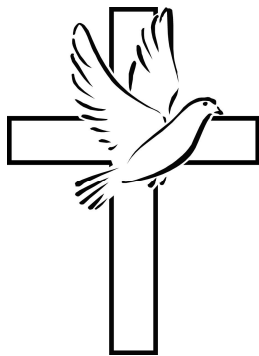

It is a source of spiritual nourishment for those who are unable to leave their homes because of age or ailment (or the current COVID-19 restrictions) to attend Mass.

LENTEN PRAYER, REFLECTION AND ACTION FOR THE WEEK

Pray: O Jesus, come and waken us from our apathy and renew in us your gift of hope. Bring me into your presence, that I may listen to your voice, which is the source of all wisdom, and watch your face forever. “ St. Bede

Reflect: Read the Gospel of the Man Born Blind (John 9:1-41) What blinds you from recognizing Jesus as the Light of your life (pride, self-centeredness, fear)? Who shared the importance of Jesus in their life that opened you up to a new understanding of His importance in yours? How have you helped another “see” Jesus more clearly? Other than praying the Creed at Mass each week, when is the last time you have told Jesus that you believe in Him and all that He promises?

Act: One evening turn off all or most of the lights in a room and light a candle. Watch the flame burn brighter and the light expand in the room. Pray for those who seek light, truth and meaning in their lives and ask Jesus to draw them to His Light. Write a prayer telling Jesus that you do believe in Him and why you believe in Him. Pray it each day this week. Write a general note to the residents of local senior living or nursing facilities and let them know they are being thought of and prayed for at this time. Many feel isolated and lonely because no one can come into the facilities. Stop by the church and light a candle for someone whom you are trying to “see” in a new and better light. Ask for the grace you need to do so.

LIGHT

“Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light” (Ephesians 5:14). We are at the midpoint of our Lenten journey of conversion. As always, God never gives up on us, especially those who have “fallen asleep” along the road to conversion. The most powerful stories of conversion are proclaimed during these final weeks of Lent. May the darkness of sin that still pervades our lives, communities, and world, be dispelled by the Christ who comes to bring sight to the blind and light to the world.
