FROM THE
Pastor's Desk

Sir, leave the fig tree for another year;
perhaps it will bear fruit.

The words in the Scriptures convey a powerful message and sounds as a warning to us all for a change of heart. Let's look into the gospel text of Luke 13/8-9 and what it signifies. The question that comes to my mind is this: what is the fig tree doing in a vineyard when it should have been in an orchard? To think like this is to misunderstand the agricultural methods of the time. It was a common practice to plant a variety of fruits trees in vineyards and even in vegetable gardens and for that reason, the presence of the fig trees in a vineyard was not unusual. The other reason is that fig trees and vines are often mentioned together in the Old Testament (Joel 1/12, 2/22) and have a spiritual meaning and symbolizes Israel as a nation.

When you plant a fig tree one must know that it takes at least three years before fig trees can yield fruits. So the man had come to the tree after three years had passed. Every year, for three consecutive years the man came looking for fruits but found none. I presume therefore that the tree must have been at least six years old. And the vinedresser requested the owner to grant it another year. Seven is a number of perfection of God's perfect patience. He waits until no more hope is felt. It is useless to go beyond that point as it is depleting the soil.

Remember that a fig tree, like any plant, takes a lot of moisture and nutrients from the soil to sustain its growth. Every year the tree remains barren is a loss to the owner. The other vines and fruit trees suffer. In the owner's judgment, the vineyard is better off without the fig tree if it doesn't bear fruit. The fig tree in the parable was supposed to bear fruit. It had been planted for that specific purpose. But it did not bear fruit. Although the tree is given another chance to produce fruit within one more year, the prospect of seeing it happening is not so good. It is very unlikely that a fruit tree which has failed to bring forth fruit for six consecutive years is going to produce anything at all. To be realistic, it is virtually impossible.

This is where the supernatural element of the parable comes out. You see, this fig tree will never bear fruit unless a miracle happens. There has to be a complete and profound transformation in the fruit tree. It can be described as a miracle of regeneration in the tree and this vinedresser is actually looking for such a miracle to happen.

God gives us ample time to amend our ways while we are on earth but once we die, it is there that our judgment takes place and we will be awarded for the good we do but suffer for our bad choices. Let's use the opportunities that come our way during this season of lent to repent of our evil ways and to live a life pleasing to God. Let us purify our hearts by availing the Sacrament of reconciliation; by repenting for our sins and choosing to live a life worthy of God, so that we can bear fruits.

**LENTEN REFLECTION: from Pope Francis'
Message for Lent 2019**

"Each year, through Mother Church, God 'gives us this joyful season when we prepare to celebrate the paschal mystery with mind and heart renewed...as we recall the great events that gave us new life in Christ' (Preface of Lent I). We can thus journey from Easter to Easter towards the fulfillment of the salvation we have already received as a result of Christ's paschal mystery – 'for in hope we were saved' (Rom 8:24). This mystery of salvation, already at work in us during our earthly lives, is a dynamic process that also embraces history and all of creation. As St. Paul says, 'the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God' (Rom 8:19). In this perspective I would like to offer a few reflections to accompany our journey of conversion..."

"The celebration of the Paschal Triduum of Christ's passion, death, and resurrection, the culmination of the liturgical year, calls us yearly to undertake a journey of preparation, in the knowledge that our being conformed to Christ is a priceless gift of God's mercy. When we live as children of God, redeemed, led by the Holy Spirit and capable of acknowledging and obeying God's law, beginning with the law written in our hearts and in nature, we also benefit creation by cooperating in its redemption. That is why St. Paul says that creation eagerly longs for the revelation of the children of God; in other words, that all those who enjoy the grace of Jesus' paschal mystery may experience its fulfillment in the redemption of the human body itself. When the love of Christ transfigures the lives of the saints in spirit, body and soul, they give praise to God. Through prayer, contemplation and art, they also include other creatures in that praise, as we see admirably expressed in the "Canticle of the Creatures" by St. Francis of Assisi (Laudato Si', 87). Yet in this world the harmony generated by redemption is constantly threatened by the negative power of sin and death.

"Indeed, when we fail to live as children of God, we often behave in a destructive way towards our neighbors and other creatures – and ourselves as well – since we begin to think more or less consciously that we can use them as we will. Intemperance then takes the upper hand: we start to live a life that exceeds those limits imposed by our human condition and nature itself. We yield to those untrammelled desires that the Book of Wisdom sees as typical of the ungodly, those who act without thought for God or hope for the future (2:1-11). Unless we tend constantly towards Easter, towards the horizon of the Resurrection, the mentality expressed in the slogans '*I want it all and I want it now!*' and '*Too much is never enough*', gains the upper hand. "The root of all evil, as we know, is sin, which from its first appearance has disrupted our communion with God, with others and with creation itself, to which we are linked in a particular way by our body. This rupture of communion with God likewise undermines our harmonious relationship with the environment in which we are called to live, so that the garden has become a wilderness...sin leads man to consider himself the god of creation, to see himself as its absolute master and to use it, not for the purpose willed by the Creator but for his own interests, to the detriment of other creatures. Once God's law, the law of love, is forsaken, then the law of the strong over the weak takes over. The sin that lurks in the human heart...takes the shape of greed and unbridled pursuit of comfort, lack of concern for the good of others and even of oneself. It leads to the exploitation of creation, both persons and the environment, due to that insatiable covetousness which sees every desire as a right and sooner or later destroys all those in its grip." 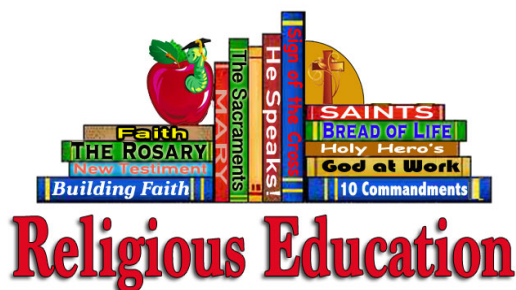




ST. JOSEPH TABLE TODAY

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

With this letter I write to you about a development that should disturb us greatly, both as citizens and as disciples of Jesus, the Lord of life.

Recently, two bills have been introduced in the Illinois House and Senate. The first, House Bill 2495 and Senate Bill 1942, both identical pieces of legislation, seeks to strip unborn persons of any protection - or even consideration - under the law and declare abortion to be a "fundamental right" and matter of health care. The end result is that an abortion could be obtained at any stage of pregnancy, including late term, for any reason and without any regulation. The law would no longer guarantee any modicum of humanity or compassion for any unborn person in Illinois, even if they are partially born. This legislation also repeals the Abortion Performance Refusal Act, which protects doctors, nurses and hospitals who refuse to permit, recommend, perform or assist in abortion. In so doing, rights of conscience, especially religious objections, will be lost.

The second piece of legislation House Bill 2467 and its identical Senate Bill 1594, repeals the Illinois Parental Notice of Abortion Act. This law, upheld unanimously by the Illinois Supreme Court just six years ago, has the common-sense purpose of ensuring that parents would be part of the life-altering decision of their minor child in the case she seeks an abortion. This effective law has reduced abortions performed on minors by fifty-seven percent.

As citizens of a state and people of faith who care about the common good, I urge you to join me and my brother bishops in an effort to defeat this radical departure from current law and practice in our state. Please reach out your State Representative and Senator to urge defeat of these bills.
