Reflections from Fr. Dennis

Dear Friends and Fellow Parishioners

In the Gospel today, Jesus is in the temple area, the most important place that any Jewish scholar of the law then could teach. Passover, Jewish prime time on its biggest stage, prompts the scribes and the Pharisees to test Jesus. This Gospel should raise two questions for us. 1) what was Jesus writing in the dirt on the stones of the temple courtyard? 2) Why did the scribes and the Pharisees bring only this woman to Jesus? Doesn't it take two to commit adultery? Jewish law required equal punishment of both parties. The answers to those questions may not come this side of heaven, but asking those questions is not merely a matter of curiosity. It points to two important questions about how we are to live Christian lives.

At the heart of things, in all the teaching that He did not only in the temple, but during his three years of public ministry, Jesus was constantly proclaiming, "Believe that God loves you and live your life in response to that love!" So Jesus taught that the life of his disciples is always and really about responding in love to their being loved. This means for Jesus the two most important questions which can be applied not only to this situation but to every situation must always be: How do we see God's love as present right here, right now in our midst? The second question will always be: How do we respond to that love as individuals and as a community?

Jesus was teaching that God loves us – and not only those we may include in our definition of "us", but also everyone else. When Jesus said that the greatest commandment was to love God and love our neighbors as ourselves, He set the priorities for all Christian life. Whatever our situation, out of love for us, God readily offers forgiveness, not condemnation. God's love is always present for us and among us. Jesus offered the woman brought to him not condemnation but a loving opportunity to move forward with her life. Forgiveness is THE sign of God's love and the presence of the kingdom of God.

Jesus told the woman brought to him to go and sin no more, to live her life in response to God's love for her. Rather than condemning the woman for her mistakes, Jesus offered her a second chance. We all make mistakes, but the biggest mistake we can make is to give in to despair and try to live without hope. Repentance and conversion are always possible, and that is what Jesus asks the woman – and us – to think about and to do. God respects our freedom so much that God always gives us the choice to repent or not, to live life responding to God's love as our guide – or try living in some different way.

People ready to condemn others without offering a chance to repent and make a fresh start, fail to see God's love all around them. Our judgment of others deflects judgments of ourselves because we can say to ourselves, "At least I didn't do what they did!" Was Jesus writing in the temple courtyard's dirt a list of sins? A list of sinners in that crowd? Something very important happened while Jesus was writing that day. Both the woman and those who brought her left profoundly changed by Jesus' question and actions. If we believe in God's love for us and for everyone else, we can get up when we fall, dust ourselves off, and try again to live as God calls us to live – not out of fear, but out of gratitude.

SOMETHING NEW IN CHRIST

Jesus knew that the scribes and Pharisees were trying to trap him. They put him in what seemed to be a no-win situation. Let the woman who was caught in adultery go, and he would have been accused of ignoring the law. Let her be stoned, and he would fail to show mercy toward her, contradicting his life's message. Jesus' response teaches three crucial lessons: none of us is free of sin; we are not the ultimate judges of others; Jesus is the mercy of God, in whom we can always trust. In Christ, God does something new. When we give our hearts to Christ, we have the hope of new life, a life in which mercy reigns.

ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION



Even if we are unable to physically receive Holy Communion at times we can enter into spiritual Communion with the Lord by praying:

My Jesus, I believe that You are truly present in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

I love You above all things, and I desire to possess You within my soul. I am sorry for ever having offended you.

Since I am unable now to receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as being already there, and unite myself wholly to You.

Never, never permit me to be separated from You.

Amen.

HOLY WEEK

Next weekend begins the celebration of Holy Week. Here is some information that will may be helpful to you.

Palm Sunday – Ushers will pass out palm as you arrive for the blessing at the beginning of Mass. The Solemn Entrance will take place at the 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. The Procession will be at the 10 a.m. The Assembly will read the part of the Chorus during the Passion.

Morning Prayers – will be held at 8:30 a.m. Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. It will be a combination of Morning Prayer and the Office of Readings.

Holy Thursday, 7:30 p.m. – The holy oils blessed and consecrated on Tuesday of Holy Week will be presented at the beginning of the Sacred Triduum (The Holy Three Days, sundown today until sundown Easter Sunday). Twelve parishioners will have their feet washed. Only hosts will be distributed at Communion time. At the end of Mass we will process around the church and bring the Blessed Sacrament to the Holy Family Room to the Altar of Repose. Adoration will be until 11 p.m. Access to the Holy Family Room during that time will only be through outside door #12. There will be no pilgrimage again this year.

Good Friday, 3 p.m. & 7:30 p.m. – Church will be open all day for prayer. Same service both times. The Assembly will read the part of the Chorus during the proclamation of the Passion. Veneration of the Cross will take place with a reverent bow or genuflection. There will be no physical contact with the cross (no touching, using it to get up from a genuflection, etc.)

Blessing of Easter Foods, 1:00 p.m. – Please keep your baskets with you in your pew. Deacon Paul will walk around the church to sprinkle the baskets.

Parish Easter Vigil, 8:00 p.m. – **There will be no 5 p.m. Mass.** This is a unified parish celebration with liturgical ministers from both worship sites. We welcome those from St. Martha Church who will be joining with us. The blessing of the fire will be outside and the Assembly will be invited to come outside to participate (those who wish). Everyone will have tapers this year for the Service of Light and Renewal of Baptismal Promises. As you leave Mass each household will be given a small bottle of newly blessed holy water and a home blessing with which to bless your home on Easter. The **Agape reception** returns this year. Food will be served by helpers wearing masks and gloves.

Easter Sunday – Usual Mass Schedule, 8 a.m. & 10 a.m. Both Masses will be in the church. There will be no Mass in the Holy Family Room.

+At least three volunteers to help serve at the Agape reception after the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday.


