Reflections from Fr. Dennis

Dear Friends and Fellow Parishioners:

Scientists and psychologists suggest that it takes 21 to 60 days to change a habit or to adopt a new behavior. The Great 50 Days of Easter offer us the perfect time to let go of the old and embrace the new.

Big change is possible in a short period of time. Before Lent, we were a polarized nation in a polarized world. After Russia invaded Ukraine, most Americans - and many of the nations of the world - were finally brought together again in a common purpose – the preservation of a democratic country. The sad fact, however, is that nothing can unite a people more quickly than a common focus for hatred and belligerence. When the peace is restored, then we will have to begin the harder work of sustaining the unity we have achieved through a united effort to continue to do things and to make choices that will preserve the hard-won peace.

Likewise, these months have been a remarkable time for our united parish. We developed a hard-working, enthusiastic, imaginative unification team who have already collected your suggestions for a new name for our parish and for new ways we can work together to build up our unity. Coinciding with the designation of our new name has come the designation of our new pastor, Father Tom Baldonieri. There are many reasons why he is an excellent choice. A transitional time like this can be not only crucial and hope-filled but also scary. Our natural resistance to change can cause a lot of mistrust and apprehension to surface. This is normal. If we are honest with ourselves, we will admit that, even if Jesus Himself were appointed our new pastor and tried to change anything, He would probably meet with at least some resistance. Consider the state the Apostles were in between Easter and Pentecost. They were both delighted to have encountered the risen Savior but also terrified. They had no idea what next. Were they about to face sufferings like he endured? Would his risen Presence be a threat to their Judaism, which had been their anchor in a changing and dangerous world? Was He feeling any resentment over their disloyalty during his days of suffering and death? Jesus knew all of this. And this is why, after He greeted them on the first Easter day, he breathed the gift of peace into their souls and blessed them with the ability to forgive and to reconcile. He also told them to stay together and pray together until He poured the gift of his Holy Spirit into them, after which they would be no longer confused about so many questions that burdened them.

We have now entered another 50 day period of anticipation to the next Pentecost. Recall that Jesus' most fervent prayer at the Last Supper was for the unification of all his disciples – including us. Bearing this in mind, let us use this time to get to know each other even better as we pray together that we can stay together as a newly united parish – and grow together in our appreciation that our Savior has been close to us especially during this entire unification process and that He will eventually get us exactly where we need to be as a vibrant, hopeful, newly reconstituted parish. Happy Easter!

Name Preference Survey Ends Today

The parish wide survey continues this weekend to determine the top three new name preferences of our unified parish. Remember that in accordance with Canon Law, the names of the existing individual worship sites of St. Martha Church and St. Isaac Jogues Church will not change. **If you already completed a selection form, please do not complete another.**

Preferences will be tallied this week and the top 3 to 5 choices will be submitted according to their preference order to Fr. Malave for review. He will then present them to Cardinal Cupich and the Bishops who will discuss the names and the rationale for each with the Episcopal Council. The recommendation from the Cardinal and the Episcopal Vicar will be sent to the Presbyteral Council on May 3 for a final determination.

EASTER REFLECTION:

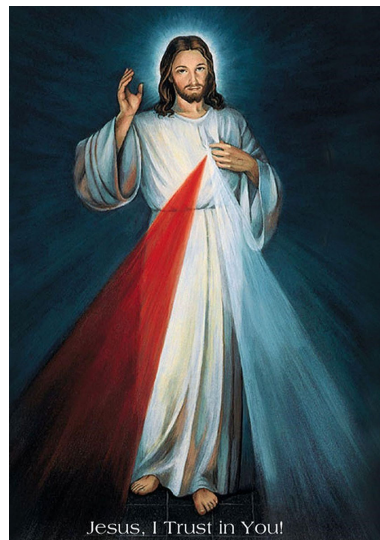
From the Jerusalem Catechesis

“You were led down to the font of holy baptism, just as Christ was taken down from the cross and placed in the tomb which is before your eyes. Each of you was asked, ‘Do you believe in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit?’ You made the profession of faith that brings salvation, you were plunged into the water, and three times you rose again. This symbolized the three days Christ spent in the tomb.

“As our Savior spent three days and three nights in the depths of the earth, so your first rising from the water represented the first day and your first immersion represented the first night. At night a man cannot see, but in the day he walks in the light. So when you were immersed in the water it was like night for you and you could not see, but when you rose again it was like coming into broad daylight. In the same instant you died and were born again; the saving water was both your tomb and your mother. Solomon’s phrase in another context is very apposite here. He spoke of *a time to give birth, and a time to die*. For you, however, it was the reverse: a time to die, and a time to be born, although in fact both events took place at the same time and your birth was simultaneous with your death.

“This is something amazing and unheard of! It was not we who actually died, were buried and rose again. We only did these things symbolically, but we have been saved in actual fact. It is Christ who was crucified, who was buried and who rose again, and all this has been attributed to us. We share in his sufferings symbolically and gain salvation in reality. What boundless love for men! Christ’s undefiled hands were pierced by the nails; he suffered the pain. I experience no pain, no anguish, yet by the share that I have in his sufferings he freely grants me salvation.

“Let no one imagine that baptism consists only in the forgiveness of sins and in the grace of adoption. Our baptism is not like the baptism of John, which conferred only the forgiveness of sins. We know perfectly well that baptism, besides washing away our sins and bringing us the gift of the Holy Spirit, is a symbol of the sufferings of Christ. This is why Paul exclaims: *Do you not know that when we were baptized into Christ Jesus we were, by that very action, sharing in his death? By baptism we went with him into the tomb.*”

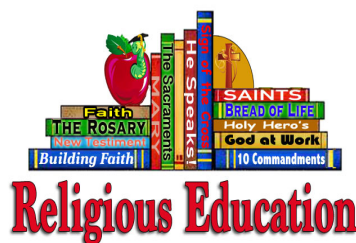


DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

The Sunday of Divine Mercy and the end of the Octave of Easter (celebrating each of the eight days as it is Easter Sunday) is next weekend.
