

THOUGHTS FROM FR. JOSE

RELATIONSHIP OF LOVE

The main point in the Gospel of this weekend is to learn to “abide in Jesus” and that without that there is no life or fruit; but with that we will be effective and bring glory to God the Father. This teaching clearly states that success or failure all rests on experiencing this one reality - which is “abiding.” The first truth is that we must know who Jesus is and the role of God the Father in giving us an effective and meaningful life. Without knowing who Jesus is, we cannot abide.

‘The Vine and the Branches’, image sketches a series of relationships of love, which is a bond uniting Father, Son, disciples, and the disciples with one another. This image is clarified in terms of love-relationships. Love has its source in the Father, it is disclosed in Jesus and the disciples share in this gift of love and manifest it in their relationships within the community. But the key relationship is that between Jesus, the vine and disciples, the branches.

The vine or the vineyard was an Old Testament symbol for the people of Israel. The book of Isaiah, Is. 5:1-7, pictures God’s covenant love for his people as a vinedresser who tends his vineyard with loving care. Also, to ‘bear fruit,’ with reference to a vine or other plants, is to live according to God’s commandments with emphasis on justice and love. Here it is Jesus who is the ‘true vine,’ for he replaces all imperfect manifestations, even the vine which was the Old Testament symbol for the people of Israel.

The key points of the “vine and the branches” image are: the vinedresser who is the Father, the vine (Jesus), and the branches (disciples) who abide in one another, and the fruit. At the beginning the Father is mentioned as the one who tends the vine with its branches, for he prunes the branches and clears them from anything that might prevent them from producing fruit. This pruning which enables disciples to enter into a communion of faith and love with Jesus, is effected by means of the Father’s word communicated by Jesus (*“You are already pruned because of the word that I spoke to you” v.3*).

The relationship which Jesus offers (*“Remain in me, as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing” vv.4-5*) is described as a mutual “abiding,” which implies a permanent presence of one person to another, intimate indwelling and familiarity. Like two friends, one is present to the another, is listening, understanding and loving, in the same way, the disciple is present to Christ and Christ is present to the disciple.

Unless the disciple produces fruit, which is later defined as fraternal love, there is no communion with Jesus and vice-versa, outside communion with Jesus there is no fruit. Thus we, his disciples, need to remain in communion with Jesus and produce fruit.



MARIAN PRAYER: THE MEMORARE

REMEMBER, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help, or sought thy intercession was left unaided. Inspired with this confidence, I fly to thee, O Virgin of virgins, my Mother; to thee do I come; before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy mercy hear and answer me. Amen.

The Memorare is a prayer that reminds us that we have a wonderful advocate and protector in the mother of our Lord, the Blessed Virgin Mary. In our prayers to her we honor and worship her Son, who is more than happy to listen to His mother's pleas on our behalf. The Memorare invites us to ask the Blessed Mother for her assistance and her grace, especially when we feel most troubled in our daily lives. The actual author of the Memorare is unknown. It has been traditionally attributed to the abbot St. Bernard of Clairvaux from the 12th century. This is possibly because it was championed by *another* Bernard, the French priest Claude Bernard, who used it extensively in his ministry to the poor and to prisoners (including some quite hardened criminals!) in the 17th century. In this month of May turn to our Mother and ask her help and prayers.

PRAYER MARATHON

"Pope Francis has called for a global prayer marathon for the entire month of May, praying for the end to the pandemic. The initiative will involve in a special way all shrines of the world in promoting the initiative so that individuals, families and communities all take part in reciting the Rosary, 'to pray for the end of the pandemic.' The theme is *From the entire Church an Unceasing Prayer Rises to God*. This refers to the miraculous event recounted in the Acts of the Apostles, 12:1-12, when all the Church prayed for Peter, who was imprisoned until God sent an angel to free him, illustrating how the Christian community comes together to pray in the face of danger and how the Lord listens and performs an unexpected miracle. Each day in May, there will be a livestream from one of 30 chosen Marian shrines or sanctuaries to guide the prayer at 6 p.m. Rome time (Noon EDT) on all Vatican media platforms. The Pope will open the month long prayer May 1 and conclude it May 31."
