Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In so many ways—large and small—the pandemic has upended our lives together. Families and, in a special way, young people, have faced distressing struggles. The pandemic made our connections with one another challenging and difficult. Exactly in that moment when we truly needed supportive relationships with one another, we found ourselves separated. Sadly, this included the relationships and connections that we have in and through the Church.


We did our best to move forward and I am proud of our collective response to the challenges of the pandemic. When I announced a general dispensation from the obligation to participate in Sunday Mass, many parishes offered on-line Sunday Masses, and went even further and established prayer lines and reached out to those in need. The TV Mass that I celebrated helped to keep us connected as a community of faith in Chicagoland. So many of you have told me how healing and comforting those Masses have been.

In the meanwhile, we are in a new moment. With vaccinations and boosters, restrictions on public gatherings have eased up. Many people feel more comfortable returning to Church. Yet, we know there are some elderly and immuno-compromised persons who are still not ready to return. And they should not return. These vulnerable brothers and sisters have an excusing cause for being absent and for this reason I will continue the TV Mass on ABC for the present time. But for the rest of us, I have decided, in consultation with my advisors, to lift the general dispensation from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass as we begin a new Church year on the First Sunday of Advent, November 26-27.

My hope is that the First Sunday of Advent will provide us with a fresh start to take up again our life together as a community of faith that gathers to worship God. I have asked our pastors to begin the Masses on November 26-27 with the traditional lighting of the Advent wreath. After the homily your pastor will lead the community in a renewal of baptismal promises, acknowledging that we owe our obligation to participate in Sunday Mass to God but also to each other. Our common profession of faith and of our desire to turn away from sin, will be concluded by a sprinkling rite with the waters of baptism.

Let this occasion of our renewal of faith and life, which we all so much want, provide us with a fresh start as we recommit ourselves to worship God and to be supportive of each other week after week as we gather around the Table of the Lord to be nourished and renewed.

The Survival of Many Relics is Often Miraculous

Our Shrine of All Saints is home to the relics of about 3000 saints. When you consider that the Church has gone through centuries of persecution, iconoclasm, wars, revolutions, and "reformations", the fact that many of these relics even survived to the present is rather amazing. Consider just a few examples. **ICONOCLASM.** For over 125 years, the Christian Emperors in Constantinople, mainly for political reasons, destroyed every religious image they could - including every image of the Dormition of the Virgin. Iconoclasm ended in 848. The one known exception is our bronze disk made in Jerusalem between 400 and 450 - a souvenir a pilgrim would have purchased during a visit to the Shrine of the Dormition. It was excavated in Madaba, Jordan, in 2002.

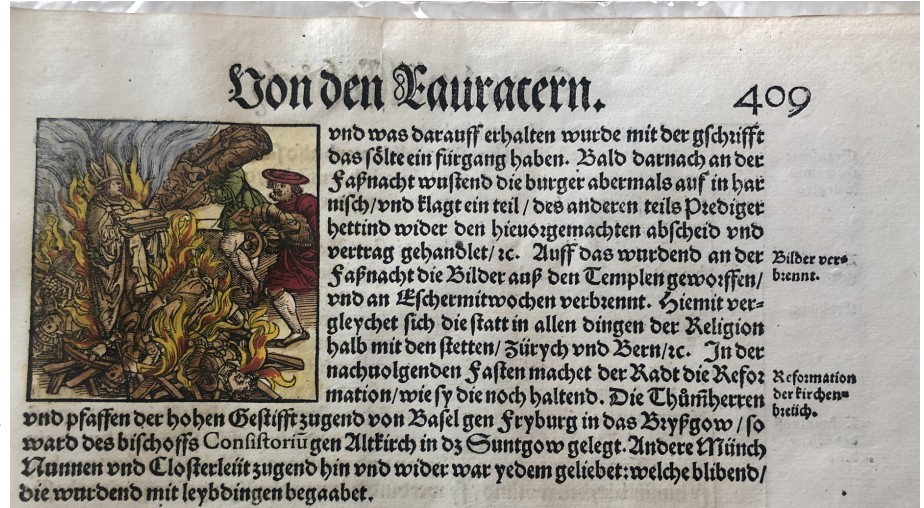
THE REFORMATION. A serious component of the 16th century Protestant Reformation was the destruction of innumerable images and relics throughout many countries in Europe. An illustration and an article from a chronicle of the period shows the looting and burning of images from the churches in Basel, Switzerland, at the beginning of Lent in 1529. You can see one of the reformers throwing images of the Virgin, St. Ulrich of Augsburg, St. Barbara, St. Catherine of Alexandria, and a Pope into a bonfire. In England, King Henry VIII closed and looted all the monasteries and convents and dismantled all of the great shrines of the saints in English cathedrals - often scattering their remains. The relics we have of English, Irish, Scottish, and

Welsh saints in our shrine were already safely in Europe before the time of Henry VIII.

REVOLUTIONS. One of the components of the French Revolution (1789-1795) was the looting and closing or destroying of churches throughout France and what is now Belgium. Many of our relics were saved by pious Catholics who bravely slipped into the churches and removed the bones from their reliquaries, hiding them in their homes until safer times. The reliquaries themselves were all stolen and melted down for the gold, silver, and jewels. After they resurfaced, the bones eventually reached the Archbishop of Lyon. Since Lyon is the oldest diocese in France, the archbishop is considered the Primate of France. It would have been his responsibility to recertify the rescued relics for their replacement in various churches. Until such a time as they were to be recertified, he placed all the relics in the care of the Poor Clare Sisters of Lyon. Many of our relics come from the Poor Clare stock of not-yet-recertified relics. But our relics of St. Colette and St. John Francis Regis came to us wrapped in letters written and signed in 1806 and 1818 by the very people who saved the relics. One of our reliquaries actually went through the Revolution. It is an arm-shaped wooden reliquary, carved in the 16th century, which was in St. Sulpice Church in Paris when it was looted. If the reliquary had been made of gold or silver, it would have been melted down. Since it was wooden, the looter settled for stripping off the silver or golden frame from around the window housing bones of St. Sulpice. Then the wooden

arm was tossed away, leaving it with a couple of finger tips broken, but the bones of the saintly bishop are still in the reliquary!

We also have a newspaper photo of "Worshippers expelled from the church of St. Sulpice by the mob" in the revolution of 1848.

WARS In the worst case of "friendly fire" during World War II, on March 3, 1945, Britain's RAF intended to bomb the main central park in The Hague, because Nazis were using it as a rocket-launching site. They missed the park and bombed the adjoining neighborhood, killing 550 civilians and destroying most of the buildings - including the Martyrs of Gorkum church. While the church was hit and people taking refuge in it died, our two panels of St. Augustine and of St. Monica survived. They are now on the doors to our Eucharistic Chapel. During that same week, the Allies also bombed the Cathedral of Rouen and St. Maclou Church, across the street from it. One of the items destroyed was a large reliquary containing a bone of St. Lambert, Bishop of Liege and Martyr. While the reliquary was destroyed, the relic itself, the red wax seal, and a silver name tag survived. You may view them in the 20th century reliquary of St. Lambert on a pedestal behind our choir screen.

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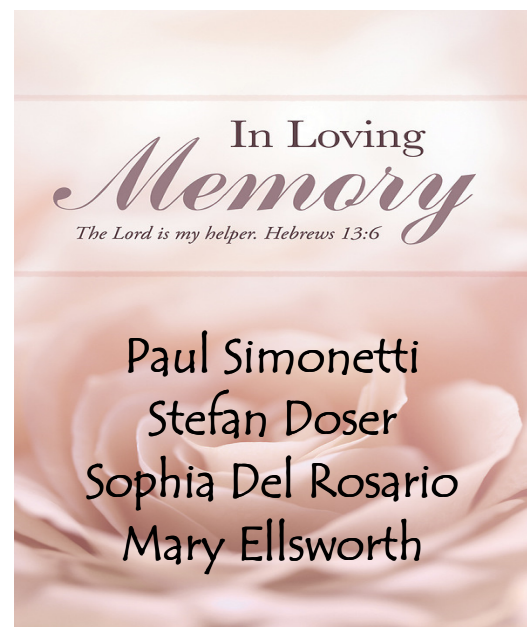
