

Pastor's Desk

Watch out!

There are certain words that capture our attention and one such expression is watch out! We are more cautious now due to the prevailing situation of Covid and so we are on the lookout for someone or something that may cause us harm or distress. We have to take responsibility for or ensure the welfare of someone or something. Be vigilant at the time of the arrival of someone or something, like watching out for the mailman as you could be expecting a package today, or watch out that car nearly hit you. We are alert these days more than ever before and that does help us to guard ourselves from whatever dangers we may have to encounter. To guard ourselves from physical dangers we could be taking utmost care, likewise Jesus sounds a note of caution to us all to be alert, watchful. What do we need to do then?

We have launched into the new liturgical year beginning with the first Sunday of Advent and the theme we come across is "Watch." The Church reminds us to be vigilant and watchful. Why do we need to be watchful? We are getting prepared to welcome the Savior as he came 2,000 years back, and also we are awaiting his second coming. But we also know that He is always present in our midst. Every alertness involves preparation so too in our liturgy we are preparing to welcome the Savior for we do not know when he will come, but are asked to be prepared at his coming.

The watchman or the gatekeeper keeps a regular check of the movement that takes place as he watches carefully, so that the people under his charge are kept safe and notified of any danger that he may visualize. If he fails in his duty and neglects it, then the lives of many can be lost. Similarly, the readings remind us of the spiritual dangers that can weaken the state of our soul. Jesus is very much aware of the dangers to our spiritual life and he warns us to be watchful. How do we go about in our preparation so that we can be watchful at all times?

It is not easy to be alert at all times as one can become drowsy in the process but with God's graces we can. Alertness or being on the watch can save us from the dangers of straying away from God. We are called to pray without ceasing, invoking him in everything that we do. Setting aside time to pray, finding out his will and doing it. How can we allow being callous in our relationship with God? God cares and loves us very dearly and it is only when we respond to his love that we would be watchful of our wrongdoings. Every evil word or deed done would strain our friendship with God. Let's heed to the teachings laid down by Jesus asking us to be on the watch. Do it and you will reap the harvest of success? So be on watch!

REOPENING AND COVID

Our efforts prioritize the safety and wellbeing of all while maintaining due respect and reverence for the sacraments and liturgical norms of our faith. While our parish is taking appropriate precautions consistent with the advice of public health authorities and per the policies of the Archdiocese of Chicago, parishioners and guests should understand that they assume the risk of contracting COVID-19 anytime they enter a public space since such precautions do not eliminate the risk of infection. **Per the Archdiocese of Chicago on 10/26/20:** "Due to the pandemic the **dispensation from the obligation** of Sunday and Holy Day Masses for all Catholics within the Archdiocese of Chicago **remains in force**. Those faithful initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist who are unable to participate in-person are encouraged to participate via livestream/broadcast and offer an Act of Spiritual Communion, in union with the entire People of God in the Archdiocese and throughout the world in this time of stress and difficulty."

Fifty people are able to attend any Mass and **you must make a reservation** using the online system. If you need help making a reservation, call the Rectory at 847/967-1060 (M-F, 9 a.m. – 4 p.m.), and we will be happy to help you. To give access to everyone who would like to attend a Mass, **please sign up for only one weekend Mass and one Reconciliation time a month. You may sign up for weekday Masses as often as you want. If you want to come more often, you can check the coming weekend's availability on Friday after 1 p.m. and make a reservation if there is still room.** PLEASE NOTE: **Reservations are closed at 10 p.m. each Friday night for Reconciliation and weekend Masses.** If you show up for Reconciliation or Mass without a reservation, you will have to wait to see if you can be accommodated.

The door opens 15 minutes prior to the start of each Mass. It is important that you are on time and enter the church during those 15 minutes. **The doors are closed soon after Mass begins** and, for everyone's health and well being, **latecomers may not come in, even if they have a reservation.** Please note: It is very important that you wear your face mask properly (covering nose and mouth) and have your hands sanitized. We do not want people's confidence in their safety weakened. Remember there is no singing, no kneeling on the kneelers, no physical sharing of the Sign of Peace, your hands are sprayed before Communion and your mask stays up until you move six feet away from the person distributing Holy Communion and the restroom is sanitized after each person's use. **It is important we all follow procedures and understand that doing so is an act of charity.**

At the end of Mass Ushers will guide each row out to the only exit door, which is the door by Golf Road (long ramp). Please maintain social distance and do not touch the doors. They are fixed to stay open or an Usher holds it open for you. **Should an emergency arise** and we need to move everyone out of the church (i.e. fire alarm goes off) we will use every available exit but ask you to follow Usher directions. Once in the parking lot please go directly to your cars.


Religious Education

CHRISTMAS MASS RESERVATIONS

In an effort to give everyone a chance to sign up for Christmas Masses, reservations will be taken by **phone only on Monday, December 7th, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., 847/967-1060.** Links will be sent out on Flocknote Tuesday, Dec. 8th, and will be put up on the parish website on Wednesday, Dec. 9th.

Please note that the Christmas Octave (eight days) begins with Christmas and ends with the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God. This time frame is so important to our Salvation History and our life as the Church that it repeats the solemnity of Christmas each of the eight days. Therefore, **if you sign up for a Mass on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, you are not to sign up for a Mass the weekend of December 26-27** so that those who are not able to sign up for Christmas Eve or Christmas Day will have the chance to celebrate Christmas within the Octave at a Mass that weekend.

For those who cannot come for Mass on **Christmas Day, Sunday Mass at Mercy Home** will air a special Christmas Mass on that day at 8 a.m. on WGN Channel 9. It will also be available on demand at www.MercyHome.org/Mass. However we are able to do it, let us pray for one another on this great feast of the Word becoming flesh and dwelling among us, the Solemnity of the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ.



Hearing the haunting music in "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" takes us right to the season of Advent, a time of waiting and preparation. The text was originally written in Latin. The hymn has its origins over 1,200 years ago in monastic life in the 8th or 9th century! The 1861 translation by John Mason Neale from *Hymns Ancient and Modern* is the most prominent by far in the English-speaking world. While the text may be used with many metrical hymn tunes, it was first combined with its most famous tune, often itself called *Veni Emmanuel*, in the English-language *Hymnal Noted* in 1851.

For the four Sundays of Advent, you will hear variations on our beautiful hymn "O Come, O Come Emmanuel."



FEAST OF FAITH

What Is the Mass?

What is the Mass? There is no simple answer to that question. The Church uses many different images and terms to describe our most important prayer. The Mass is the celebration of the Eucharist, a Greek word that means "thanksgiving." It is the Lord's Supper. It is the Breaking of the Bread. It is the memorial of the Lord's passion, death, and resurrection. It is the Holy Sacrifice, in which the sacrifice of Christ on the cross is perpetuated. It is the holy and divine liturgy, the sacred mysteries. It is the source and summit of our Christian lives, the new covenant, the work of the Holy Spirit, the paschal mystery. The many different words and images that we use when we speak of the Mass are not signs of confusion, but of wonder at what the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (1328) calls the "inexhaustible richness" of the Eucharist. The Mass, our greatest prayer and our deepest mystery, is celebrated every day, many times a day, the world over. The Eucharist is both "bread from heaven" and "daily bread." The Mass is our everyday miracle.
