Sacrament of Matrimony: Must be registered for six months prior to setting the wedding date with an additional six months for necessary preparation.



FROM THE
Pastor's DeskPrepare the way of
the Lord

Preparation plays an important role in our life, be it to get through an examination, an interview, a driving test or a medical examination. We do take utmost care in doing such a preparation so that we fare well. If in such matters we prepare well; similarly the church reminds us of the importance of preparing ourselves to welcome the lord into our lives.

We need to prepare a way for the Lord and make his path straight so that there will not be any obstacles in his way. Awaiting with expectation and preparing to receive the Lord are two important aspects of the Advent season. We must prepare a straight path for the Lord, removing all obstacles which stand in the Lord's way preventing him from coming. All the crooked ways in our life and in the life of our society need to be straightened out. Every mountain and hill should be brought low and every valley be lifted up.

Israel was a nation in waiting, waiting for the coming of the Messiah. God had chosen Israel to be his people. He had promised that he would be their God and they his people. But their experience as a nation was contrary to all the promises of God. The history of the Jewish nation was a history of suffering. They were conquered, plundered and their Temple destroyed by other nations. Finally, they ended up in exile. None of God's promises were fulfilled. Psalm eighty-five is a cry of a defeated and suffering nation.

At the time of Jesus, the expectation of the Messiah was at its highest. Everyone in Israel was waiting eagerly for the Messiah. The different sects in Israel - the Pharisees, the Zealots, the Essenes - were all waiting for the Messiah. When baby Jesus was taken to the Temple, there was Simon, who was waiting for the consolation of Israel. There was Anna, the prophetess, who was of a great age. She did not depart from the Temple, worshipping with fasting and prayer night and day. She gave thanks to God for Jesus and spoke of him to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Jordan, the whole of Judea and Jerusalem went after him, thinking he would be the Messiah. The people of Israel was a community in waiting, waiting with great expectation for the coming of the Messiah.

We celebrate Christmas year after year, but nothing happens to us and to our community. This is so because, in the first place, we do not expect anything to happen to us or to our community. We do not believe that God is able to change us and we do not want to be changed. Secondly, we must be prepared to receive the Messiah when he comes. At the time of Jesus, there were several movements in Judaism preparing themselves for the arrival of the Messiah. By detailed observance of the Law, the Pharisees believed that they would be ready to receive the Messiah. By observance of Jewish rituals and the study of the Scriptures, the Essenes in the desert prepared themselves for the advent of the Messiah. The Zealots believed that by trying to drive out the Romans by force, they were preparing themselves and the nation for the arrival of the Messiah. All renewal movements in Judaism in the first century were movements of preparation.

Where are we in this movement of preparing for the Lord's coming? God does not look for the external preparation but rather our hearts need to be ready to welcome him when he comes. If we truly take it seriously then each passing day of the Advent season will be a day of preparation, preparing our hearts to wipe out evil desires, inclination and put on the garment of love. I wish you well in your journey as you prepare to welcome the Lord.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION VOLUNTEERS

In collaboration with Catholic Charities and the Greater Chicago Food Depository the next free food distribution will be hosted here in our SJ parking lot on Wednesday, December 23, 4:30-6:00 p.m. Please pass the information along to those who could use the support at this time. This month we hope to test an indoor packing & outdoor distribution plan. The indoor packing will include moving the products into the Holy Family Room, packing and moving the bags outside, with social distancing, masks, windows open, etc. for well being. A few people will also be outside to set up signs and tables. The outdoor distribution plan will continue with directing traffic in the parking lot, checking in those who come, putting food in car trunks (three stations), and clean up.


We are in need of about 15 volunteers for each time frame. The first time frame is 2:15 p.m. – 4:15 p.m. for instructions and to carry out the tasks listed above. The second time frame is 4:00 - 6:30 p.m. to do the outdoor plan and some to continue packing inside if not finished by first team. We particularly encourage younger families, teens, and adults under 65 years of age to help. Everyone needs to be in good health, no underlying conditions, and will have to wear a mask and gloves (which we will provide). If you want to volunteer but are over 65 and have no underlying medical conditions, you may contact us to discuss your involvement.

To give more people an opportunity to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation in preparation for Christmas we will



If your reservation is in the Holy Family Room, please be outside Door 12 (near the Holy Family Room) a couple minutes before your scheduled time. Masks are required in both places.

CHRISTMAS MASS RESERVATIONS

In an effort to give everyone a chance to sign up for Christmas Masses, reservations will be taken by phone only on Monday, December 7th, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., 847/967-1060. Links will be sent out on Flocknote Tuesday, Dec. 8th, and will be put up on the parish website on Wednesday, Dec. 9th.

Please note that the Christmas Octave (eight days) begins with Christmas and ends with the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God. This time frame is so important to our Salvation History and our life as the Church that it repeats the solemnity of Christmas each of the eight days. Therefore, if you sign up for a Mass on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, you are not to sign up for a Mass the weekend of December 26-27 so that those who are not able to sign up for Christmas Eve or Christmas Day will have the chance to celebrate Christmas within the Octave at a Mass that weekend.

For those who cannot come for Mass on Christmas Day, Sunday Mass at Mercy Home will air a special Christmas Mass on that day at 8 a.m. on WGN Channel 9. It will also be available on demand at www.MercyHome.org/Mass. However we are able to do it, let us pray for one another on this great feast of the Word becoming flesh and dwelling among us, the Solemnity of the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

FROM A SERMON BY ST. ANSELM, BISHOP (for Dec. 8)

Blessed Lady, sky and stars, earth and rivers, day and night— everything is subject to the power or use of man—rejoice that through you they are in some sense restored to their lost beauty and are endowed with inexpressible new grace. All creatures were dead, as it were, useless for men or for the praise of God, who made them. The world, contrary to its true destiny, was corrupted and tainted by the acts of men who served idols. Now all creation has been restored to life and rejoices that it is controlled and given splendor by men who believe in God. The universe rejoices with new and indefinable loveliness. Not only does it feel the unseen presence of God himself, its Creator, it sees him openly, working and making it holy. These great blessings spring from the blessed fruit of Mary's womb. Through the fullness of the grace that was given you, dead things rejoice in their freedom, and those in heaven are glad to be made new. Through the Son who was the glorious fruit of your virgin womb, just souls who died before his life-giving death rejoice as they are freed from captivity, and the angels are glad at the restoration of their shattered domain.

Lady, full and overflowing with grace, all creation receives new life from your abundance. Virgin, blessed above all creatures, through your blessing all creation is bless, not only creation from its Creator, but the Creator himself has been blessed by creation. To Mary God gave his only-begotten Son, whom he loved as himself. Through Mary God made himself a Son, not different but the same, by nature Son of God and Son of Mary. The whole universe was created by God, and God was born of Mary. God created all things, and Mary gave birth to God. The God who made all things gave himself form through Mary, and thus he made his own creation. He who could create all things from nothing would not remake his ruined creation without Mary. God, then, is the Father of the created world and Mary the mother of the re-created world. God is the Father by whom all things were given life, and Mary the mother through whom all things were given new life. For God begot the Son, through whom all things were made , and Mary gave birth to him as the Savior of the world. Without God's Son, nothing could exist; without Mary's Son, nothing could be redeemed. Truly the Lord is with you, to whom the Lord granted that all nature should owe as much to you as to himself."
