“Go and tell John what you hear and see:
the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed,
the deaf hear, the dead are raised,
and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them.”

MATTHEW 11:4-5



Hurry up and wait. You might have heard that expression before as it describes the experience of moving about quickly to get ahead only to find something or someone slowing you down. I think of that expression around this time of the Advent Season.

Last Sunday, we reflected on the steadiness of John the Baptist calling out to repent for the coming of the Messiah. Today there is a pause and a question about who is Jesus. John is in prison and he has heard about the works of Christ and sends a message to him asking if he is the one. Jesus answers by referring to the passage from Isaiah about how the blind recover their sight, lame walk and lepers and the deaf are healed. The good news is proclaimed to the poor. Jesus goes on to endorse the great work of John the Baptist. He is the one whom it is written, "I send my messenger ahead of you to prepare the way before you." (Matthew 11:2-11)

Today is Gaudette Sunday, "Rejoice in the Lord always" the Third Sunday of Advent. As we light a rose candle on the Advent Wreath, we are reminded of the joy of the Gospel. Although we are sinners, Christ loves us and chooses to dwell among us. Advent is a season of joy because of salvation in Christ.

While this is a busy time and we seem to be in a hurry, perhaps today we take the lead of John the Baptist who waits and ponders the meaning. Who is Jesus? How have we seen Jesus at work offering healing and transformation in us and in others? We rejoice in the good news shared with the poor and those in need. This is a moment to rejoice on this Gaudette Sunday.

As we rejoice today, let us sing of Mary. The Blessed Virgin Mary offers an example of sharing the good news and joy of her son Jesus. In Mary's prayer, she remarks of how her soul rejoices in God her savior. Mary's joy is visible even in the midst of impossibility and the "yes" to cover over the doubts and fears of "no". Last week we celebrated the Immaculate Virgin Mary: the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Dec. 8) Patronal Feast Day of the United States and tomorrow (Dec 12) we celebrate the apparitions of Mary to St. Juan Diego, Our Lady of Guadalupe.

I am happy to announce the arrival of the newly renovated St. Isaac Jogues Church. We will celebrate our first mass, a special All Saints Parish Advent Celebration on Friday, December 16, Simbang Gabi.

May God bless you during this special week ahead.

ADVENT PRAYER CORNER

Sunday – Light three candles (2 purple and 1 rose) on your Advent Wreath and say: Come, Lord Jesus! Reread today's Gospel, Matthew 11:2-11. If alone, think of something you've experienced that helps you believe that Jesus is the Messiah. If with family/friends, share with each other and encourage everyone to share their story with someone else.

(Each day this week light the three candles of your Advent Wreath or just light a single candle. Take a quiet moment. When ready, make the Sign of the Cross and say this week's prayer – **Lord Jesus, Master of both the light and the darkness, send your Holy Spirit upon our preparations for Christmas. We who have so much to do week quiet spaces to hear your voice each day. We who are anxious over many things look forward to your coming among us. We who are blessed in so many ways long for the complete joy of your kingdom. We whose hearts are heavy seek the joy of your presence. We are your people, walking in darkness, yet seeking the light. To you we say, "Come, Lord Jesus!" Amen. (Henri Nouwen)**

Read the Jesse Tree Scripture for the day and reflect on and/or discuss the day's question.

Monday: Solomon (scales) – “Give your servant a listening heart to judge your people and to distinguish between good and evil.” I Kings 3:5-14, 16-28 How well do you listen with your heart? What will you do to listen with your heart better?

Tuesday: Elijah (burning altar) – “Answer me, Lord, that this people may know that you, Lord, are God and that you have turned their hearts back to you.” I Kings 18:1-46 Think of a time when you knew God had turned your heart back to him. How did you feel when He did?

Wednesday: Isaiah (star) – “The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; a child is born to us...they name him Wonder-Counselor, Prince of Peace...” Is. 9:1-6 How has the Light of Christ been a guide in a time when you felt in the dark? How have you shared Christ's Light with someone struggling?

Thursday: Isaiah (lion & lamb) --- “A shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse...the wolf will be a guest of the lamb...the calf and young lion shall browse together...” Is. 11-10 Jesus talked about his followers being connected to Him like a branch to the vine. How connected do you feel to Jesus this Advent? Why? What might change to strengthen the bond even more?

Friday Jeremiah (tears) – “...we have not yet been saved. Oh, that my head were a spring of water, my eyes a fountain of tears, that I might weep day and night over my people.” Jer. 8:18-23 Is there someone you weep over because they have wandered away from the faith or have no faith at all? How will you try to invite them to return to the Church or to consider faith in Jesus?

Saturday Micah (Bethlehem) – “You, Bethlehem, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel... he shall shepherd his flock...he shall be peace.” Micah 5:1-4 How have you recently experienced the peace and care of Jesus?

Faith in Action This Week (Choose at least one of these actions or one you come up with) – Skip a treat or meal out or use part of your allowance and purchase a toy or gift card for the Catholic Charities Celebration of Giving Project and/or participate in the Christmas Card Project for Ministry of Care (see articles in bulletin). Invite a family member or friend who has been away from church to join you for Mass on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. Pray for the person you feel really needs the gift of peace this season. Share with family, friends or relatives the “invisible” gifts you appreciate about them (either in conversation, in a note, etc.)

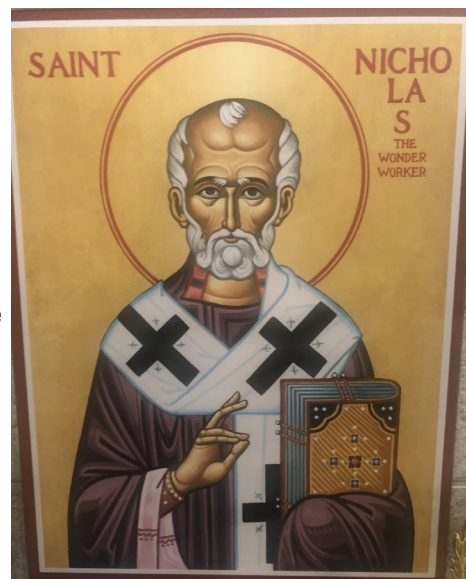
From Myra to Morton Grove – the Journey of a Relic of St. Nicholas

After a remarkable life which earned him the right to be considered one of the most beloved saints of all time, St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, died between 335 and 345 and was buried in a sarcophagus in his cathedral. It quickly became a pilgrimage site, and devotion to Nicholas spread throughout the Eastern Church. He was less remembered in the West, though some Latin people did baptize their children with his name. Pope St. Nicholas I “the Great” (d. 867) is an example of this. The spread of Islam brought more Western attention to the needs of the Christian East. With it came an increasing interest in Greek saints and the unfortunate desire to “rescue” the remains of the most important saints from desecration by unbelievers. One of the most famous of these “translations” was the stealing of the body of St. Mark the Evangelist from Alexandria and its transport to Venice in the year 815. This was meant not only to honor a figure of the Apostolic Era who had a remote and tenuous connection with Venice, but also to use his shrine there as a tourist attraction and the goal of pilgrimage, thus enhancing the desire to visit Venice and, more important to Venetians, to do business with the city.

Further down the eastern coast of Italy was the port city of Bari, under Byzantine government. Its citizens conceived a desire to have their own famous saint, for reasons similar to those of the Venetians. So, in the Spring of 1087, an expedition of three ships, sixty-two sailors, and two priests, set out for Myra and arrived at its port of Andriake in April, with the goal of stealing the bones of St. Nicholas. Pretending to be pilgrims, they walked to the basilica of Myra and went right up to the place of the saint’s repose. Of course, the priests and citizens of Myra did what they could to prevent what was about to happen. There was much shouting and arguing, and swords were drawn. Becoming impatient with a last-minute reluctance on the part of some of the Barisi to actually desecrate the saint’s tomb, a rash young man named Matthew threw down his sword, picked up an iron mallet, and began to smash the floor above the tomb. Others joined him in this. When he exposed the white marble sarcophagus underneath, he smashed in the lid and then, without removing his shoes, lowered himself into the tomb. The bones of St. Nicholas were famous for exuding a holy oil called “Manna”, which had a wonderful fragrance. Standing waist-deep in Manna, Matthew began to lift the bones out of the grave and hand them to a priest named Grimoald. The priest carefully arranged them in a silken wrapping. Taking all the bones they could, the Barisi fled to their ships and then sailed home, arriving in Bari on May 9, 1087, which is now the feast of the Translation of St. Nicholas. The saint’s remains have been honored in Bari, his principal shrine, to this day.

While all this stealing was going on, the Venetians were not unaware of it. In fact, they sent their own fleet, hoping to beat the Barisi in attaining the prize. When they realized that they were too late, they waited for a good opportunity to seize anything that might have been missed by the Barisi. After participating in the First Crusade in 1099, the Venetians stopped in Myra on their way home and stole the bodies of two other saintly bishops of Myra: Nicholas, the uncle of St. Nicholas, and Theodore. Then they found a bonus. The Barisi had been in such a rush to accomplish their mission, they left 500 fragments of St. Nicholas’s bones, still soaking in the “Manna” in the bottom of the sarcophagus, including bits of his pelvis, which was probably shattered when Matthew leapt into the grave and started grabbing bones. Since the relic of St. Nicholas in Morton Grove, Illinois, is a portion of the lower left side of his pelvis, it very likely comes from Venice.

In Venice, it was decided that the bones of St. Nicholas would repose in a monastery church already dedicated to him. The monastery of St. Nicholas on the Lido was built in 1044. The Lido is a slender sandbank about eight miles long, which forms a natural barrier between Venice and the open sea. In the year 1000, Doge Peter Orseolo II established the custom of “La Senza” the annual “marriage” of Venice to the sea. It was celebrated on the Feast of the Ascension. For centuries, the Doge would sail from the mainland in the “bucintoro”, the gilded state barge of the Doges, and pause, just off the coast of the Lido, before the Church of St. Nicholas, and then cast a gold wedding ring into the water. He would conclude the ceremony by visiting the shrine of St. Nicholas and praying for the protection of the Venetian fleet. Thus St. Nicholas protected the fleet, while St. Mark protected the city. “La Senza” continued until 1798, when the last of the Doges surrendered to Napoleon and resigned.
