

Dear brother,

Do you know any men who drink too much, eat too much, sleep too much, struggle with porn or lust, do not exercise like their body deserves, binge social media, politics or sports, feel isolated, do not have meaningful conversations and are lacking in their relationship with God? Do you know any men who are not satisfied with life; that feel out of control, unmotivated, or less than they desire to be? If you answered “yes” to any of these questions, or know a man who would, EXODUS 90 is the answer!

The start of Exodus 90 is just 23 days away from December 17. On Monday, January 9th, tens of thousands of men across the country and the world will embark on a 90-day journey to freedom. I have been blessed to be a part of this experience twice and would recommend it for every man! It is time to be set FREE!

These 90 days are designed to train men in prayer, asceticism and fraternity. No man can thrive without these three elements in their life. I think we understand fraternity- brotherhood, intentional community. I think we have heard some homilies on prayer- communion with God. But asceticism might be a foreign word. In asceticism, we deprive ourselves of something to make room for God! WE detach ourselves so we can attach to HE WHO made us. So, what kind of self-denial? Take a deep breath in and read this following list. *Take short, cold showers. *Practice regular, intense exercise. *Get a full night’s sleep (at least seven hours is recommended). *Abstain from alcohol, desserts, sweets, soda and sweet drinks (white milk, black coffee, and black tea are permissible). *Abstain from eating between meals. *Abstain from television, movies, televised sports, video games. *Abstain from non-essential material purchases. *Only listen to music that lifts the soul to God. *Only use the computer for work, school, or essential tasks (e.g., paying bills). *Only use mobile devices for essential communications; cut out non-essential texting, app, and internet use. *Take Wednesdays and Fridays as days of fasting.

Now imagine that you were living just 100 years ago, or that you lived in a third world country- would this list seem that challenging then? Make no mistake, asceticism is challenging. And, in fact, it’s near impossible, on your own. But you’re not alone, you have the LORD, and you will have true fraternity! Now, on average, Exodus men save \$102 per month simply by decreasing their non-essential spending as part of practicing this Asceticism. Ready to save some money? A quick sell on fraternity. Every man wants to be a part of something bigger than themselves. Every man longs for REAL brothers. 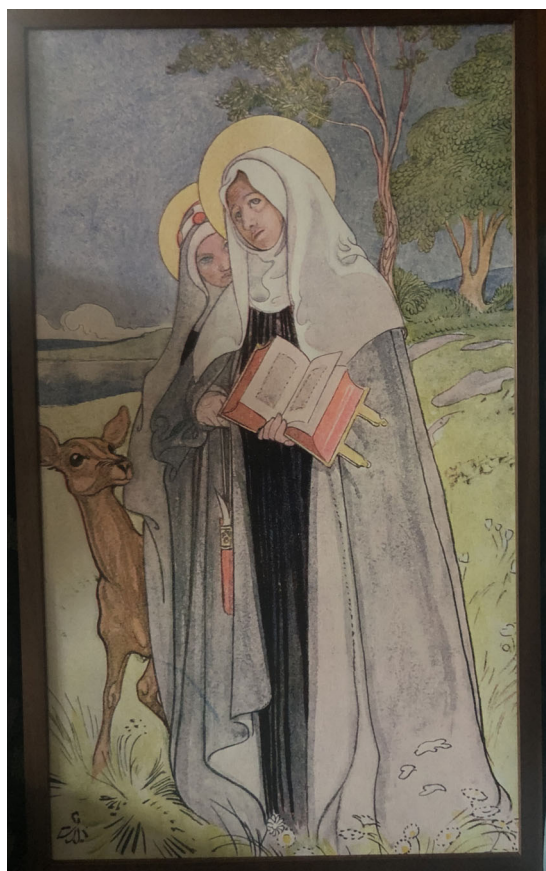

St. Birgitta (Bridget) of Sweden at the Shrine of All Saints

Birgitta (Bridget) of Sweden was a famous mystic. She was the most celebrated saint of the Northern kingdoms and is now one of the patron saints of Europe. She was born about 1303 at Finstad, near Upsala, the daughter of the noble Birger Persson, governor of Upland. From her seventh year she had visions of Christ crucified. In 1326, she was married to Ulf Gudmarsson, to whom she bore eight children, among them St. Catherine of Sweden. Between 1341 and 1343, they made a pilgrimage to Compostella in Spain. On the return journey, Ulf fell ill and died in 1344 at the age of 46 at the Cistercian abbey of Alvastra. Now Birgitta devoted herself to works of penance; visions grew more frequent, and Christ declared her his bride. About this time at Vadstena, she founded a convent for 30 nuns and a separate house for 13 priests, 4 deacons, and 8 lay brothers in honor of the Holy Redeemer. The Order was approved about 1370. Her revelations she wrote and dictated in Swedish. Her confessors translated them into Latin. From 1350, she lived in Rome, where she founded a hospice for Swedish students and pilgrims. She admonished the pope to return to Rome from Avignon, but was not successful until 1367. The cutting reproofs of princes, kings, and popes made by her proceeded from the conviction that she was the instrument selected by God for the moral and religious revival of her age. She died at Rome July 23, 1373. During her time in Rome, she especially enjoyed spending time with the Poor Clare sisters at San Lorenzo in Panisperna church. She often begged on the entrance steps to the church. And it was here



that she died. Her funeral took place there, and at first, she was buried there. A year later, her daughter St. Catherine, whom she had appointed first abbess of Vadstena, had her body transferred to the chapel in Vadstena. But her arm, her cloak, and her prayer book remained at San Lorenzo in Panisperna until the convent was sequestered by the Italian government in 1873, at which time the Poor Clare sisters were forced to find a new home with the Augustinian nuns at the convent of Santa Lucia in Selci in Rome, where they still remain. They brought along with them their relics of St. Birgitta.

Since the 1920s, the Augustinian sisters of Santa Lucia in Selci have been the custodians of the Liposanotheca - the official relic depository of the diocese of Rome. Until recently, it was possible to send the sisters an inquiry about whether the relic of a particular saint was available. If so, then the sisters would secure a bit of a first-class relic into a theca (a relic-container, resembling a locket). They would have an authority in the Vatican certify and seal the relic and then send it to the one requesting it. This all changed in 2003. Someone obtained a relic from the stone of Christ's flagellation through the sisters and then mentioned it in a book, declaring that the relic - rather than its container - had been purchased. This led to a big scandal about the buying and selling of sacred relics.

The Vatican's response was to shut down the entire practice altogether. It is now all but impossible to obtain a first-class relic from the Vatican - sometimes even despite the authorization of a bishop. Since this had been a major source of revenue for the Augustinian sisters, they found themselves in a situation where they sometimes ended up beggars, just like their Poor Clare co-residents.

At around that time, a seminarian named Thomas Mescall was staying in Rome and became acquainted with a brother who told him that the sisters at Santa Lucia were desperate get some repair-work done in the convent and were willing to let him try to find a donor who, in exchange for a relic of a vertebra of St. Birgitta, would donate enough to cover the repair. Not knowing how to go about this, the future Fr. Mescall, gave the sisters the money they needed, in exchange for the relic. He brought it with him back to Chicago. While he was pastor of the now-merged St. Adrian parish, he tried to have the church declared a shrine of Brigittine devotions, but it didn't work out. Several years ago, for twice the amount given by Fr. Tom in the first place, the relic was rescued for the Shrine of All Saints. It can be venerated there to this day, in a large brass reliquary made specifically for this relic and certified and sealed by Clemente Riva, auxiliary bishop of Rome, on February 12, 1986. The Shrine's painting of St. Birgitta and St. Catherine was the creation of Swedish artist Carl Oluf Larssen in 1900.
