

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## THE MYSTERY OF THE MAGI

*"We Three Kings of Orient are,  
Bearing gifts we traverse afar  
Field and fountain, moor and mountain,  
Following yonder star."*

This beloved carol was first published in 1862. The words and music were composed by an American clergyman, The Reverend John Henry Hopkins, Jr. He was Rector of Christ Church, Williamsport, Pennsylvania. Even though Reverend Hopkins was Protestant, his carol was based less on the Gospel of St. Matthew than it was on popular legends about the Wise Men. Those legends and speculations have led rationalists to conclude that the story -- even in the Gospel -- is not fact, but fiction. I think it was sometime in the early 1960's that more daring preachers alleged that the Wise Men never existed and that they were purely symbolic. **Catholic and Orthodox Christians defend the Wise Men as fact.**

As fact, the Wise Men are still mysterious. What were they? How many were there? What were their names? Were they really "kings"?

The Wise Men, most agree were **magoi** or magi. While the term covered a full range of occult practitioners, the Magi in the Gospel were members of a priestly caste. They were learned men -- astronomers -- who were also skilled at interpreting dreams.


No father of the Church attests to their royalty. While Tertullian refers to them as "well nigh kings," the association of Psalm 72:10 with the Feast of Epiphany prompted a popular assumption that

*The kings of Tharsis and the isles shall offer presents;  
the kings of Arabia and Saba shall bring gifts;  
and the kings of the earth shall adore him"*

referred to the Magi as kings and not to the general homage of the nations. One author attributes to St. Augustine the faulty interpretation of the Magi as kings. I have seen no evidence to support this theory.

The earliest depiction of the Adoration of the Magi is a second century painting in the **Capella Greca** in the Catacomb of St. Priscilla in Rome. The ancient paintings sometimes show two Wise Men or three, four, eight or twelve. St. Matthew does not tell us how many Magi, only that there were three gifts presented.

There have been different names associated with the Magi. The more exotic have been Yazdegerd, Hormizdah and Perozadh, Kings of the East. In a sixth century Greek manuscript we first "meet" Gaspar (Caspar), Melchior and Balthasar. They are represented as of different races and ages. Balthasar is the middle-aged Black King of Ethiopia, Melchior the old King of Arabia, and Gaspar the youthful King of Tharsis. Each is assigned a gift -- gold, frankincense, or myrrh. The gifts recognize the kingship, priesthood and Passion of Christ.



The legends associated with the Magi are many. Their relics were brought to Constantinople either in the 4th or 6th centuries. After the First Crusade their incorruptible remains were moved to Milan and finally to the Cathedral of Cologne where the Wise Men are still venerated.

## CHRISTMAS CORNER: EPIPHANY HOME BLESSING

*(Before the blessing begins the Leader may wish to explain that Epiphany is a customary time to bless homes and families. The blessing often includes a 'chalking' of the front door with the year and the letters "CMB." These refer to the traditional names of the magi – Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar – or to the Latin phrase, "Christus mansionem benedicat – May Christ bless this house." Another tradition is to take the first Christmas card received that season with the image of the magi and tape it above the inside lintel of the front door. Both traditions remind us to seek and welcome Christ every time we pass through the doors.)*

*The family and their friends, holding lit candles, gather outside the open front door of the home and sing a verse or two of "O Come All Ye Faithful".*

Leader: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. All: AMEN.

As the Magi followed the light of the star, we too follow the light of Christ to be a place of welcome, a people of generosity, and a dwelling place for God. Let us ask God to open our hearts so that, as the doors of this home are opened to neighbor and traveler, this family may be a source of welcome for all in need and a place where Christ is found. Let us consecrate this door and the home it protects to Christ who is the sheepgate. Let this door be the threshold that leads both ways to the blessings of God.

*The oldest and youngest persons may inscribe with chalk 20 + C + M + B + 15 on the outside lintel of the front door as another person reads from John 1:14 –*

**“And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we saw his glory, the glory as of the Father’s only Son, full of grace and truth.”**

*Another family member tapes the Epiphany card over the front door inside the house as another person proclaims Matthew 2:9-11 –*

**After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasure and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.**

*All enter the home and place the lit candles in appropriate places throughout the main gathering space.*

**Leader:** Let us pray that this home shines radiantly with the love of God.

**Leader or Reader:** Our response is **“Make us your dwelling place, Lord.”**

With Mary and Joseph...With Anne and Joachim...With Elizabeth and Zechariah...With Anna and Simeon...With shepherds and the kings...With all the angels and saints...With all holy men and women...For the sick and the hungry...For the homeless and the lonely...For friend and stranger... For neighbor and traveler...in our hopes and dreams...In our faults and failings...In times of joy and peace...In times of sadness and grief...When anger and fear confuse us...When pride and pain confound us...When the plans we make must change...When you call us home by a different way...In all things, great and small...

**Our Father...**

**Leader:** Blessed are you, God of all creation, for you give us shelter from the cold and the light of your Word to brighten the night. We come bearing no gifts for everything is a gift from you. All we can offer is our love for each other and our faith in your Son. Transform, then, these humble gifts into a sign of your presence, and bless this house and all who come to it. May this home and this family be a light for all who are lost and afraid, a place of peace and hospitality for those in need, and a sign that you are indeed God with us. When our long journey has ended, lead us all by the star of your mercy that we may come home to you to the dwelling place you have prepared for us in heaven. Grant this through Christ our Lord. AMEN.

*Sing a verse or two of Joy to the World. Then share a sign of Christ’s peace.*



## Name



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When Jesus is baptized in the Jordan River, a voice from heaven says, "You are my beloved son in whom I am well pleased." Jesus' heavenly Father **names** him and identifies him as his beloved son. Our own Baptism is also a naming. By tradition, we receive our names at Baptism, the identity tag that stays with us across a lifetime. There is, however, something more and something much deeper at work than getting a tag.

In our Baptism we not only receive our proper names, but we are also, like Jesus, named God's beloved sons and daughters. And this means far more than a name that appears on a driver's license or passport. This is the identity that we cling to, and do so for dear life. For you see, nothing about us matters as much as that we belong to God—not just as his creatures or his dependents but really and truly as what we are named, beloved daughters and sons.



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### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Epiphany celebrates the wake up calls of life, the showings of God's majesty and power in the person of Jesus. The feast alerts us to look for signs of the Lord's grace and action in our lives today. In this context, the call of the Second Vatican Council to reform the sacramental life of the Church, including our pattern of care for the sick, is indeed a holy awakening.

Prior to the 1960s, our care for the sick had collapsed in the popular imagination into something everyone called "last rites." An immensely complicated ritual, with anointing accompanied by quickly muttered Latin prayers, was enacted for a marginally conscious person at "death's door." By the time a priest was called, the sick person might not be able to receive viaticum, or derive much personal benefit from the ritual. The healing effects of the sacrament, investing suffering with the dignity of a link to Christ's cross, and the immense assurance of forgiveness for a person reviewing the life journey, were hidden. Suddenly, an epiphany swept through the Church, and the way we care for the sick was utterly transformed. It took several centuries, however, for the Church to reach that moment of renewal.

**Notes from the 12/11/14 PPC**

- We began a discussion regarding the development of a Vision Statement for SIJ. Developing a vision statement is the first step in being able to come up with a new 5 year plan that will drive ministries, programs and interaction with the community we serve. The main question, “What/where do we want the parish to be in five years?” will drive our discussions. We realize that we need to consider the history and traditions of SIJ while looking to the future. Plans for dialogue with parishioners to gather information and ideas will be created shortly. This will be an ongoing process that will take time to develop and refine.
- Cardinal’s Questions: “Catholic means universal. It means one communion of cultures. It means one family of families drawn from every nation, people & tongue” How might bridges be built between distinct cultural communities within your parish?

*Cardinal’s comments: Look at the diversity of local churches. \*How can WE be more welcoming, and receptive of all cultures? Discuss resentments among parishes. What are we gaining with diversity? With churches closing, how best do we address the blending of other parishes into the new “home” parish?*

- Discussed the condition of the roof and continuing process for repairs.
- Feedback from the new parishioner welcome reception was positive even though attendance was light.

We find more of the promise in Isaiah—a light shines upon us! In the psalm we know a promise of a world of flowering justice, profound peace, the poor rescued, pity for the lowly and the poor. This is the promise; and one of the best ways for us to lift ourselves out of any possible low spirits we may be suffering is to live out our partnership in this promise each and every day.


