

# U.S. Bishops' Annual Collection for the Church in Latin America

WASHINGTON - At Masses on January 21-22, Catholics in parishes across the United States will have the opportunity to support ministry among their poor and suffering neighbors in Central and South America and the Caribbean Islands when their dioceses take up the U.S. bishops' annual Collection for the Church in Latin America.

"The Collection for the Church in Latin America is about changing lives – sometimes saving lives – and bringing people to Jesus. Your gift, no matter how large or small, will join with those of other Catholics to make a multimillion-dollar impact in places where people are praying for miracles," said Bishop Octavio Cisneros, auxiliary bishop emeritus of Brooklyn and chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America.

Bishop Cisneros, who came to the United States as an unaccompanied teenage refugee after the communist takeover of Cuba, spoke of his desire to help people who face poverty or oppression in their homelands. "I know what it is to leave behind everything and everyone but Christ. You hold tight to God and to Our Lady for strength and hope, praying continually. Such are the prayers of those who survive disasters or seek faith in the face of crushing poverty or political oppression. Your gifts to the Collection for the Church in Latin America are the answers to many such prayers."

In 2021, this collection provided 281 grants totaling more than \$6.1 million for ministry, evangelization, vocations work, seminary training and to help churches recover from natural disasters. Nearly 50% was used for evangelization, faith formation, social ministry, and pastoral work. The next largest portion, totaling 29%, was for disaster response, followed by vocations and preparation for the priesthood or religious life at 20%.

- In Nicaragua, where political strife has compounded damage from two devastating hurricanes, recovery projects included building numerous rural chapels to replace those destroyed and training 1,200 lay leaders to provide emergency management services along with pastoral care.
- In Cuba, this collection supports many community "mission houses" for prayer and evangelization, from which trained lay leaders go door-to-door each summer, telling thousands of people about Jesus in a nation that discourages religious faith.

- In Haiti, 400 young people have received a theological education ranging from biblical studies to Catholic social teaching and are now ministering to hurting people in their communities.
- In Brazil, the collection funded new commercial kitchen equipment for a community of contemplative nuns who support themselves by making communion hosts.
- In Paraguay, 38 young men who had begun studies for the priesthood just before the global pandemic struck received support for basic needs such as food and healthcare.

All Catholics are urged to give to the collection when it is offered in their diocese. If they cannot be at Mass that Sunday, #iGiveCatholicTogether also accepts funds for the collection.

# OUR FASCINATING FAITH Calendars

Perhaps you noticed that this year we didn't celebrate the Baptism of the Lord on the Sunday after Epiphany (today), but instead on last Monday, the day after Epiphany. Why the shift? It all has to do with regional calendars. Within certain general boundaries, every national conference of bishops is able to set its own liturgical calendar according to how it is felt to benefit the people in that region most. So, for example, the Epiphany of the Lord is celebrated January 6 on the Church's universal calendar. But the bishops of the United States decided that, for the benefit of the faithful, it would be better for Epiphany to be celebrated on a Sunday every year. So here in the States we see Epiphany's date vary from January 2 to January 8. The biggest problem this presents is that the Baptism of the Lord, which is normally celebrated on the Sunday after the Epiphany, would push back the whole liturgical calendar by a week on the years when the Sunday celebration of the Epiphany falls on January 7 or 8, putting the U.S. out of sync with the rest of the Catholic world at least until Lent. To avoid that scenario, the U.S. bishops decreed that in those years the Baptism of the Lord would fall on the Monday after Epiphany, leaving the rest of the calendar intact.


# COMMUNITY-BUILDING/SOCIAL

# Our Relic of St. Edmund, King and Martyr

Born in 840, when he was only 15 years old, Edmund was crowned king of East Anglia under the suzerainty of the kings of Wessex. This took place on Christmas day, 855. During the Danish invasion, after the Battle of Thetford, he was overtaken by the fearsome leader Ivar "the Boneless" at Heglesdon. Because he was faithful to Christ, he was beaten with cudgels, bound naked to a tree, and shot by these Vikings until his body was covered with their arrows. Then he was beheaded at Hoxne, Suffolk, on November 20, 870. He expired with the name of Jesus on his lips and was always venerated as a martyr. His body was taken to the wooden church of St. Mary at Beodricksworth (the future Bury St. Edmund's). According to Abbo of Fleury, Edmund's first biographer, the martyr's body was attended by "a certain woman of blessed memory called Oswen, who...passed many years in succession near his consecrated tomb, absorbed in fastings and prayers." Oswen "made it her constant practice to open the sepulchre of the blessed martyr year by year, at the anniversary of the Lord's Supper (Holy Thursday), and trim and pare his hair and nails." The fact that the king's hair and nails continued to grow was, of course, continuing evidence of his incorruption. According to Abbo of Fleury, Edmund's first biographer, Oswen collected the nailparings and stored them in a casket on the altar of the church. In the year 1020, King Canute built a magnificent abbey church there and transferred the body of



St. Edmund, along with the relics, and put the abbey and the relics in the care of the Benedictine monks. The fact that the monks chose to preserve the nail-parings is significant, because the monks justified their replacement of the secular priests who originally guarded the body of St. Edmund on the grounds that the clerics were negligent. The nail-parings represented the care taken by the seculars (and indeed a laywoman) for the body of the martyr, something that the monks could easily have ignored and disposed of if they suspected that the nail-parings were not genuine. The casket of the martyr's nail-parings were the only relics of St. Edmund that Thomas Cromwell was able to produce and give to King Henry VIII at the time the abbey was dissolved.

In the 1040s, Abbot Leofstan of Bury St. Edmund's did something which led to the spreading of the martyr's cult throughout Europe. When he opened St. Edmund's shrine, he reclothed the body and removed the old blood-stained garments and placed them in a chest. St. Edmund's incorruption meant that his bodily relics were not yet being distributed to other locations. In 1070-71, Abbot Baldwin changed the situation by bringing portions of the blood-stained garments with him when he visited Rome. He also gave some of these relics to St. Martin's Cathedral in Lucca on October 6, 1070. It is probably no accident that the reigning pope at the time, Alexander II, had previously been bishop of Lucca. An altar to St. Edmund was dedicated in the portico, and, before long, miracles were being reported and the martyr's feast was added to the city's calendar. The number of relics there must have increased subsequently. But by 1239, the Luccans had both forgotten Edmund's name and were exaggerating the nature of their relic they claimed to possess a silver reliquary containing "capud sancti Almondi (the head of St. Almondus")! The Lucca connection may be of significance to us because the bone relic of St. Edmund which just arrived at the Shrine of All Saints was certified and sealed by Archbishop Ferdinandus Capponi of Pisa in June of 1902. Pisa is very close to Lucca.

Bury St. Edmund's continued to prosper throughout the centuries. The abbey church was the largest in England. And the abbot had great power. The last great occasion there took place in 1533, when Mary, Queen of France, sister of King Henry VIII was buried there after a solemn Requiem Mass. Only six years later, in 1539, as a component of Henry's Dissolution of the Monasteries, Bury St. Edmund's abbey was closed and then destroyed. Its last Abbot, John Reeve, and 40 of the brethren were forced to leave. St. Edmund's shrine was destroyed, but there is no report of a body in the tomb.

In his book, "Edmund: In Search of England's Lost King", historian Francis Young points out that "The commissioners who dissolved the Abbey on November 4, 1539, mentioned nothing about the body, and given St. Edmund's royal statue it is likely they would have quietly allowed the monks to remove the body from the shrine and relocate it." He notes that in a 1698 third-hand account in a chronicle, which he uncovered in 2013 when he visited Douai Abbey in Berkshire, the successor of the monastery founded in seventeenth-century Paris as the successor the abbey of Bury Saint Edmund, it is written that a few monks had placed St. Edmund in an iron chest, although it does not specify where within the abbey he was buried. "On balance, however, the monk's cemetery is the most likely location." Long before Young, respected antiquarian and medieval scholar and leading expert on Bury Saint Edmund M. R. James's research led to the uncovering of the tombs of six abbots of Bury on the site of the former chapter house. Excavations there continued between 1957 and 1964, but they stopped short of one crucial area of the complex - the site of the monks' cemetery.

The 2012 discovery of the skeleton of King Richard III under a parking lot in Leicester stimulated hope that another lost king could be recovered. In 2017, Experts in Bury Saint Edmunds began the removal of the tennis courts which had been laid out above the monks' graveyard adjacent to the former abbey. They especially hoped to locate the iron chest containing the bones of St. Edmund. The excavating there continues to the present.

The bone of St. Edmund which has just come to the Shrine of All Saints belonged to the Orsini Pitnatelli family of Spinazzola, Italy. Both of these families produced popes. Throughout history, they certainly had access to any relics of St. Edmund which had been kept in the stock in the Vatican.
