



## THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY January 18—25

The tradition of praying for Christian Unity for eight days in January began in 1908 with Fr. Paul Wattson. Then an Episcopalian priest, he would go on to co-

found the Graymoor Franciscan Friars and convert to Roman Catholicism. Through the "**Octave of Christian Unity**" the Ecumenical Movement gained momentum in the Catholic Church and other Christian Communities. A key figure in the evolution of Catholic sensitivity to other Christians was Abbe Paul Couturier, who has been called "the father of spiritual ecumenism." Abbe Couturier advocated prayer "for the unity of the Church as Christ wills it." Through his insight even those who could not fully accept the "Primacy of Rome" were invited to pray together for reconciliation and cooperation among Christians. In an atmosphere of charitable and enlightened dialogue, Catholic Ecumenism became a special focus of the Second Vatican Council. **The Decree on Ecumenism** (1964) encouraged "separated Christians" to gather for prayer and discussion. Moreover, the **Catholic Catechism** views the desire for the unity of all Christians as "a gift of Christ and a call of the Holy Spirit." But a gift ought to be graciously welcomed and a call both heard and responded to. A true response to the call toward unity is characterized by

- **permanent renewal** of the Church in greater fidelity to her vocation...
- **conversion of the heart** in conformity to living the Gospel; unfaithfulness of Church members causes divisions;
- **prayer in common** ... change of heart, holiness of life and public and private prayer for the unity of Christians should be regarded as the soul of the whole ecumenical movement, and merits the name "spiritual. ecumenism."
- **fraternal knowledge** of each other,
- **ecumenical formation** of the faithful and especially priests
- **dialogue** among theologians and meetings among Christians of different churches and communities,

- and **collaboration** among Christians in service of humankind.

Vatican II's **Decree on Ecumenism**, well summarized in the **Catechism**, provides motivation and support for clergy and laity who pray and work for Christian Unity.

In recent years, the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity and the World Council of Churches have invited ecumenical leaders from a different country each year to prepare the theme and text for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. This year the National Council of Churches of Brazil have chosen the theme: "**GIVE ME A DRINK.**" The focus is the encounter and dialogue between Jesus and the Samaritan woman at the well in the fourth chapter of St. John's Gospel.

St. Isaac Jogues Parish has had a growing interest and commitment to ecumenism and interreligious dialogue. Several years ago, our own Ecumenical Committee was formed. During the Unity Octave, we pray for Christian Unity at all Masses. Specific local churches are prayed for each day. This year our calendar of prayer includes the following:

- Jan. 24 - St. Luke Christian Community Church in Morton Grove
- Jan. 25 - Messiah Lutheran Church in Park Ridge

The John 17 Fellowship, an ecumenical dialogue group that includes St. Isaac Jogues, Messiah Lutheran and Holy Trinity Lutheran Churches will sponsor a Prayer Service this Sunday, Jan. 18, at Messiah Lutheran Church, 1605 Vernon Avenue in Park Ridge at 3:00 p.m. All are cordially invited to share prayer and fellowship.



WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY  
SERVICE TODAY

TODAY at 3 p.m. three area churches will come together to pray for unity in our divided world. As we mark the beginning of the 2015 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, the theme for this year's service is "Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.'" Area churches, as well as the wider community, are cordially invited to the service to be held at Messiah Lutheran Church, 1605 Vernon Avenue, Park Ridge (one block south-east of Lutheran General Hospital).

Leadership in the prayer service is to be provided by Fr. Andrew Luczak, Pastor of St. Isaac Jogues Church; Pastor Lynne Morrow, Messiah Lutheran; and newly ordained Pastor Chris Neptun, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Glenview. Laity and clergy from the three churches formed the John 17 Fellowship two years ago. The life and work of this planning group is based on the prayer of Jesus, "that they may become completely one" (John 17:23).

Following the service all are invited for refreshments and conversation in the church's new Friendship Place, with fully accessible facilities, which was dedicated in 2014.

This Thursday, January 22<sup>nd</sup>, we will mark with sadness the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision that legalized abortion in the United States. It is designated as a day of prayer for the legal protection of unborn children. Our parish observance includes:

- Collecting packages/boxes of diapers of various sizes (newborn and older) for the Women's Center in the Holy Family Room TODAY. You may also bring your donations to the Religious Education Office on Monday or Tuesday of this week. There is always a big need for diapers and this is one way to assist women to keep their babies. - Holding a Holy Hour for Life and Benediction this Thursday at 7 p.m. in church.
- The 10<sup>th</sup> Annual March for Life Chicago will be TODAY beginning at 2 p.m. at Federal Plaza, 50 West Adams, Chicago. There will be a rally and feature speakers including Archbishop Cupich, Rep. Dan Lipinski, Rep. Peter Roskam, Abby Johnson, Joe Schiedler, and others. Following the rally the group will walk to the James R. Thompson Center, 100 West Randolph and conclude about 4 p.m. "The March for Life Chicago message is one of love and hope. This occasion affirms the authentic dignity of women, celebrates the gift of children, and promotes a culture dedicated to protecting life at every stage of development. March for Life Chicago joins events across the country from Washington DC to San Francisco to proclaim that all lives matter and declare that it is time to end abortion in America."

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

Old customs fade slowly, and in 1560 the Council of Trent tried for significant change in pastoral care of the sick. People resisted, thinking that the last breath was the right time for the sacrament. Although physical improvement was often noted after anointing, it was seen as a kind of bonus, rather than an expected outcome of a prayer for good health, strength, patience, and even healing. More than four hundred years later, many people still do not ask for anointing until it is literally too late for the person to have reasonable hope of healing, or at least be aware enough to participate in the ritual. By then, it may even be too late for viaticum, the true “last rite.”

We have a treasure in our tradition that we seem reluctant to use. We visit the sick, we anoint those who are in the first crisis of illness, we give Communion to those who are dying, and we keep vigil and pray for those close to death. When anointing is celebrated early enough, optimally when the sick person is still at Sunday Mass, it can be a source of courage, faith, and hope for a difficult road ahead. When we anoint our sick, we remind them that they belong to Christ and a community of faith. We bring them into the presence of Christ to reconcile, heal, and give strength and hope. We resist forces that isolate and alienate the sick; the symbol of touch is a powerful act of acceptance. Why wait until the crisis of illness is dire before we apply such a rich remedy to body and soul?




