**Second Sunday in Ordinary Time  
January 20, 2013**

**FROM THE PASTOR:**

*“Songs of Thankfulness and Praise,  
Jesus, Lord to You we raise. . .”*

This familiar hymn, with lyrics by Christopher Wordsworth, sums up the meaning of Christmas and Epiphany. The first three verses recall examples of “God in man made manifest.” The Baptism in the Jordan, the miracle at Cana, and other miracles of healing show God’s “gracious will ever bringing good from ill.” The final verse takes us beyond singing anthems of praise.



*“Grant us grace to see You, Lord  
Mirrored in Your Holy Word,  
May we imitate You now,  
And on us Your grace endow;  
That we like You may be  
At Your great Epiphany;  
And may praise You, ever blest,  
God in man made manifest.”*

The beauty of the hymn, and especially its final verse, is that Epiphany not only makes **God** manifest, but that **WE** can become manifestations of God ourselves! How do we do this? By **imitating** Christ in his generous gifts. Jesus gave His very Self. He identifies with us, proclaiming the Word, teaching, healing, and suffering for our sake. When we give as He gave, we also become like the Star that points the way to the Wise. The gifts of the Magi, in turn, are expressions of faith. We become like them as we worship and practice stewardship.

This past Christmas season was truly beautiful and edifying. Last week, I spoke of the Choir Concert on Epiphany. The spirit of “Thankfulness and Praise” was certainly present in the hard work and great performance of our Ministers of Music. Thank you, again, Lisa Hall and our choirs and cantors!

Hours of work also went into the decoration of the Church. But, for those who helped to decorate, it was truly a labor of love! Special thanks to Helene Kowalik, Dee Stanton, Paul Stanton, Chris Statkiewicz, Renata Jaroslowski, Julie Higgins and our maintenance engineer, Jerzy Sokolowski.

Thankfulness and Praise to all ministers who assisted at the Masses of Christmastide.

Another important aspect of the spirit of “Thankfulness and Praise” is in the generosity shown in this year’s Christmas collections. No one likes to talk about money less than I do, but it is what keeps the Christmas lights burning and our utility bills paid. I deliberately avoided telling parishioners **how much** to give. I urged all to be as generous as they could be. Last year, our Christmas Collection was \$42,697.63. This year, as I write this column, our collection is \$47,490.02! That’s an increase of \$4,793. Knowing the sacrifices you must have made, I am very proud of our parish. Truly, this has been a veritable “epiphany” of Holiday generosity, a reason for singing “Songs of Thankfulness and Praise.”





**KNOW THE MASS, ONE WORD AT A TIME: SERVE**

"Serving means making ourselves available to meet the needs of others. Jesus served us in the most remarkable way. He identified his mission and his service when he said 'the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many' (Mark 10:45). He serves us by giving up his life for us and for our redemption and healing. And we meet him serving us every time we celebrate the Mass – 'This is my body, which will be given up for you.'



## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The cause of church unity is commended to Christians for prayer and action every year around this time. This week is not so much to focus on the many divisions within the Christian family, but on bonds of faith and mission.

Even though Christians have always shown an inclination to fracture, spin off, and mutate into new expressions, recent history shows some new points of convergence and agreement. Catholics are more firmly rooted in the word of God, for example, and many Protestants are more likely to celebrate Communion than in years past. Some denominations are merging and pooling resources, and people from various traditions are collaborating on projects.

The call of this week is to be mindful of the diversity of our traditions and customs while treasuring what we hold in common. The old advice to "lighten up" is good medicine, because sometimes our differences are delightful and amusing. If someone says, "Let us pray," a Catholic might close the eyes, bow the head and fold hands; a Protestant reach out and clasp hands with the person in the next chair; and someone belonging to an Orthodox tradition might stand up with eyes wide open. Each has taken a different path, but the goal is always the same. This is a week not for focusing on the well-worn paths of divergence, but for mutual delight in a common goal.



### CHICAGO'S "PARISH OF THE AIRWAVES" SUNDAY MASS AT MERCY HOME MOVING TO WGN

CHICAGO—The *Sunday Mass at Mercy Home* is moving to WGN television, Channel 9 this January. The popular televised Catholic Mass can be seen on WGN every Sunday from 9:30 to 10:00 a.m. beginning on January 6. Viewers should consult local TV listings for cable channel.

*Sunday Mass at Mercy Home* is the most popular televised Catholic Mass in the Chicago area, with 60,000 faithful viewers tuning in every Sunday morning to share in the Eucharist. The Mass will have its last airing on its current broadcast station, WCIU Channel 26, on December 30.


