

FROM THE
Pastor's Desk

They abandoned their nets and followed Jesus

The gospel of Mark for this Sunday tells us about the call of Simon and Andrew to follow Jesus and how they immediately followed him abandoning their nets, and the other two brothers James and John did likewise leaving their father behind in the boat. What was so attractive about the person of Jesus and the call that they followed him without ever giving a second thought? There was no time to pack their things, they left behind their fishing net, their trade and their families to join a different mission altogether. Nothing was discussed about pay or where are they going to live. What would that mission fetch them?

I am fascinated by the response of the four fishermen. They responded so promptly to the call as if they knew what lies ahead. Or is it that they were tired of their fishing trade doing the same thing over and over again that they felt a call to do something different? We find Jesus choosing his disciples to collaborate in the mission work of his Father. Normally Rabbi's wait for their pupil to come to them to be their disciples but in the case of Jesus, he went out in search of people who would work with him to fulfill his Father's plan of establishing his kingdom on earth. These ordinary men received a call precisely because Jesus knew they would respond willingly. Christian discipleship demands a dramatic reorientation of one's life, redirecting one's focus from self to God changes everything.

These four fishermen Peter, Andrew, James and John left their boats and nets in pursuit of God's kingdom to be in a state of interior peace that preserved them from the noise and confusion of the world. They discovered something far more radical. The kingdom was the belief that God was present among us and that divine power was active in the lives of those who followed Jesus' example. That simple message inspired joy and wonder throughout Galilee. The power of this good news healed the sick and changed the lives of sinners. As the first apostles witnessed these wonders, they came to believe in the truth of Jesus' message of the kingdom.

Jesus relies on us to continue this ministry. It is our responsibility to proclaim that God is present and active among us. We can do this in both obvious and subtle ways. The world is full of people longing for good news. As we reflect on those moments Christ nudged us onto a path of discipleship, we find the wisdom to bring a similar transformation to another. Discipleship is costly. What is the cost of your discipleship?

I think we tend to look at this gospel in terms of '**What** can we do to follow the Lord Jesus?' What things do we have to change in order to truly be a follower of Christ? Perhaps the question needs to be asked '**Who** does God want me to become?' He wants us to enthusiastically abandon our nets and follow and be his disciple and be joyful doing it.

We are called to abandon those things that keep us from being joy-filled, Christ-filled people. What are the things that drag us down like a net filled with dead fish that keeps us from being dedicated Catholic Christians? Do we need to abandon our desire to know exactly where we're going to be in 5 or 10 years? Is it our need to be better off than everyone else is or to have more things than the people next door? What is God calling me to be? To abandon every other thing except the word of God.

From the Detailed Rules for Monks by St. Basil the Great

“What words can adequately describe God’s gifts? They are so numerous that they defy enumeration. They are so great that any one of them demands our total gratitude in response. Yet even though we cannot speak of it worthily, there is one gift which no thoughtful man can pass over in silence. God fashioned man in his own image and likeness; he gave him knowledge of himself; he endowed him with the ability to think which raised him above all living creatures; he permitted him to delight in the unimaginable beauties of paradise, and gave him dominion over everything upon earth.

“Then, when man was deceived by the serpent and fell into sin, which led to death and to all the sufferings associated with death, God still did not forsake him. He first gave man the law to help him; he set angels over him to guard him; he sent the prophets to denounce vice and to teach virtue; he restrained man’s evil impulses by warnings and roused his desire for virtue by promises. Frequently, by way of warning, God showed him the respective ends of virtue and vice in the lives of other men. Moreover, when man continued in disobedience even after he had done all this, God did not desert him. No, we were not abandoned by the goodness of the Lord. Even the insult we offered to our Benefactor by despising his gifts did not destroy his love for us. On the contrary, although we were dead, our Lord Jesus Christ restored us to life again, and in a way even more amazing than the fact itself, *for his state was divine, yet he did not cling to his equality with God, but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave.*

“He bore our infirmities and endured our sorrows. He was wounded for our sake so that by his wounds we might be healed. He redeemed us from the curse by becoming a curse for our sake, and he submitted to the most ignominious death in order to exalt us to the life of glory. Nor was he content merely to summon us back from death to life; he also bestowed on us the dignity of his own divine nature and prepared for us a place of eternal rest where there will be joy so intense as to surpass all human imagination. How, then, shall we repay the Lord for all his goodness to us? He is so good that he asks no recompense except our love: that is the only payment he desires. To confess my personal feelings, when I reflect on all these blessings, I am overcome by a kind of dread and numbness at the very possibility of ceasing to love God and of bringing shame upon Christ because of my lack of recollection and my preoccupation with trivialities.”

A NEW DAY DAWNS

Today we hear how Jonah, sent by God to warn the people, storms through the streets of Nineveh, scaring the citizens out of their wits. And it works! God has a change of heart, seeing “by their actions” how the people turn from evil (Jonah 3:10). A new day dawns.

Next we hear Paul telling the Corinthians, “The world in its present form is passing away” (1 Corinthians 7:31). He calls for a change of heart. Stopping short of telling them to stop carrying out their everyday activities, he urges them—rather mysteriously—to live “as though” they aren’t doing the things they are doing. A new day has dawned.

Finally, Jesus stands on the shore and cries, “The kingdom of God is at hand!” (Mark 1:14). Simon and Andrew abandon their nets—and even their father—and follow him. A new day had dawned.

Everyone has to change when a new day dawns: the Ninevites, the Corinthians, the apostles, even Jesus! Didn’t a new day dawn today for us as well?

PRAYER FOR THE YEAR AHEAD


