Lenten Regulations

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday

by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59.

Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal.

Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

The special Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.

QUINQUAGESIMA IN ORDINARY TIME: Living History

Sometime in December, I received a package from Clear Creek Abbey in Hulbert, Oklahoma. It was a calendar with quotes from the Rule of St. Benedict and pictures of monastic daily life. Like other Benedictine calendars, it presented the ideals and motto of its founder -- **“ORA ET LABORA.”** **“PRAYER AND WORK”** summarize more than 1500 years of monasticism in the West. I saw in the calendar, tradition translated into living history.



Clear Creek Abbey is an American offshoot of Fontgombault Abbey in France. Both Abbeys celebrate the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite. It became obvious, as I turned the pages of the calendar, that the **ordo** of feasts was taken from the Latin Missal of 1962. The calendar was a vivid reminder that, thanks to wise provision of Pope Benedict XVI, Catholics can experience the continuity of historic and contemporary liturgies.

The Clear Creek Abbey Calendar tells me that the Sixth Sunday of Ordinary Time is also **Quinquagesima Sunday**. It may seem odd that, for centuries, the Catholic Church observed a Pre-Lenten period without the Gloria and Alleluia and in purple vestments. Beginning with **Septuagesima**, then **Sexagesima**, and **Quinquagesima**, the faithful did a “countdown” of days to Easter . . . Seventy, Sixty, Fifty and finally Forty Days. In many places Lent had been more than forty days. In some places, it had been a full eight weeks!

Liturgical scholar Pius Parsch tells us:

In past centuries Pre-Lent was compared to the seventy year captivity of the Jews and was regarded as a time of suffering for sin . . . In the Babylon of our earthly life, we sit by the streams, weeping as we remember Sion.

The three Sundays before Lent were regarded as “a prelude to the entire Easter season.” It was an ancient practice well established in the Roman Rite by the 6th Century. But, was it, as some have judged it, “a tendency towards unnecessary elaboration”? The old **St. Andrew Daily Missal** (1950) describes the Pre-Lenten season as a reflective prologue:

It serves as a time of transition during which the soul passes from Christmas joys to Lenten sobriety . . . During this season of Septuagesima, the Church lingers especially over these events: we see the fall of Adam resulting in original sin and its baneful consequences . . . Actual sin and the Flood which was its punishment, and finally the sacrifices of Abraham and Melchisedech, which foreshadowed the sacrifice which God required from His own Son . . .

Among my large collection of church music, there is an old reel-to-reel tape of the **Chicagoland Church Hour** in 1967. I recorded Solemn High Mass for Septuagesima Sunday at the Episcopal Church of the Ascension. If I can ever find the right tape deck, I would enjoy hearing it again. However, it is a greater blessing to know that in Catholic monasteries and churches today it is not only the Sixth Sunday of Ordinary Time, but also Quinquagesima Sunday . . . not acted out in a museum, but in an approved celebration of the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite. Living history is not re-living the past. It is recognizing lasting connections with the eternal.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Lent, the Church's annual pre-baptismal retreat, prepares us to gather around the Easter font, renew our baptismal vows, and receive new life from the water as the elect are plunged into Christ's death and resurrection. This core meaning is more or less available, depending on whether we journey with catechumens in the parish and on the vigor of our liturgical celebration of the Triduum. Some persist in seeing Lent as a lonely journey in the wilderness; yet this week we enter the Lenten fast in solidarity with one another. The smudged foreheads you will spy throughout Ash Wednesday on buses, street corners, and supermarket aisles remind you that you are hardly alone in your desire to enact a spring cleaning regime for your spiritual life.

Long ago, this kind of repentance was available to Christians only once. Ashes and sackcloth were not raiment for a day, but permanent habits for public sinners. Fasting became a way of life, and if they sinned severely again, there was no hope of restored communion. Happily, this system did not endure. It produced reluctant Christians who even held back from baptism, like St. Augustine did, out of fear. Today we have recovered an ancient tradition that conversion and repentance are constant themes on life's journey, and that Lent is an annual opportunity to revive our baptismal identity, both as individuals and communities.

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FOR THE GLORY OF GOD


The entire history of the Jewish people is directed toward one goal: that God might be glorified through the chosen people. Christians, too, are called to “do everything for the glory of God.” In today's scriptures Paul reminds us that the best way for us to glorify God is to seek to benefit “the many,” as Christ did when he shed his blood for all of humankind.

The reading from Leviticus explains one way the Jews sought to benefit the many, by keeping lepers and leprosy away from the chosen people. Jesus finds a better way. He cures the leper, who immediately re-enters the community to spread the good news about Jesus to everyone who will listen. In this way both Jesus and the leper fulfill their calling to glorify the God who fills us “with the joy of salvation.”

"The priest absolves your sins," the catechist tells her class of seven-year-olds. They accept it but, of course, don't understand it. Maybe some of us older folks don't quite get it either. The meaning behind this uncommon word is actually pretty simple. To absolve is to **free up**. We could use other words as well, such as to forgive, to unknot, to undo, or to release.

And the freedom we experience is genuine freedom, not just the freedom to do whatever we want but the real freedom to be who we truly are—God's beloved sons and daughters.



ST. JOSEPH TABLE

The St. Joseph Table is an old tradition from Sicily.
Many centuries ago there was a famine and the people
prayed to St. Joseph, their patron, and asked his interces-
sion. Rains came, the famine ended and a special feast to
thank and praise God and to honor St. Joseph was pre-
pared after the harvest. All were welcome to come and
enjoy, especially the sick and the homeless.

**Though Sicilian immigrants introduced the custom to
America, the celebration and feast are open to all.** The
Saint Joseph Table is a source of petition and thanksgiv-
ing. Most of the foods presented on the altar are acquired
through begging, asking the help of people and local busi-
nesses to represent what the poor of Sicily had to do. At
the end of the St. Joseph Table the remaining food and
whatever money has been given in donations are given to
the poor.

Everyone is invited to our parish St. Joseph Table on **Sun-
day, March 15th beginning with the Noon Mass.** The
blessing of the table and serving of food will follow and
continue until 4:30 p.m. downstairs in the Parish Hall. **Per
the tradition there is no charge to eat at the table but
donations will be accepted for our St. Vincent DePaul
Ministry to assist those in need. Be sure to bring your
family and friends.**


