

How Do I know What God Is Asking Me to Do?

ON SOLID GROUND . . . WITH A VIEW



The Transfiguration is a “mountain-top” experience. Given the shocking revelation of the Passion, the apostles face reality. That reality seems like a bad news overload. But, is it really good news in disguise? When Jesus invites Peter, James, and John to accompany Him up the mountain, He gives them an unexpected glimpse of the future He gives them a vision of God! It is a foreshadowing, a **view**, of the fullness of the Paschal Mystery. The Transfiguration was a “mountain-top” experience, but it has left the apostles on solid ground with even more solid faith in the future. This is not to say that all their fears were gone. Their greatest test lay ahead of them. All, but one, succeeded.

As I read the mid-year financial report, I saw our financial picture in black and white . . . and **“red.”** When I see columns of numbers on a page, I have to focus and refocus. I was glad that when she prepared the report, Lori Herbert, our Business Manager, provided a gloss in the margin to emphasize “Areas of Focus.” **Our two biggest problems are “occupancy expenses” and the decline in weekend collections.** The **reality** in these areas is bad news. How can the parish best overcome these formidable obstacles? We have made changes that were common sense “cuts” in expenses. Others - - especially the

elimination of two secretarial positions - - were not only difficult, but painful. We appreciate the value of the people involved, and are most grateful for their dedication and service. But, the change - - a sacrifice - - was necessary. Be assured, we will do our best to make prudent decisions that will not alter the quality of parish services.

The **Report** revealed something encouraging - the steady support of Archdiocesan collections. We are also proud of the generous response to the “To Teach Who Christ Is” campaign and the Annual Catholic Appeal.

Finally, our focus is on you, the parishioners of St. Isaac Jogues. It is an appeal to stewardship. Our biggest problems - - paying unexpectedly large utility and grounds’ maintenance expenses and the decline in weekend collections - - can only be effectively solved with your help. **What can you do?** Of course, increase your weekend offering! Even \$1 can make a significant difference. Just \$1 per week from **all** registered families would generate an increase of almost \$50,000!

Another important contribution would be your creative input. Consider new fund raising events - - events that can unify the parish and are very profitable. Please contact our Parish Pastoral Council with your suggestions at SIJPPC8149@yahoogroups.com. Your ideas and willingness to volunteer will make a difference.

Just as the apostles worried about the future and were apprehensive in the face of bad news, so are we. The ground on which our parish stands remains solid. At times, we need to focus and refocus on our reason for being a parish. That reason is our faith in Christ Jesus. We are called to be more than pessimists and realists, who believe only what they see. We are called to be idealists, whom G. K. Chesterton accurately described as

“Visionaries, people who believe more than they see.”

We respectfully share our mid-year financial report. The financials have been reviewed by the Finance Committee and submitted to the Archdiocese of Chicago. **Rest assured, St Isaac Jogues is on solid ground.** The financials also reveal possible areas for adjustment. We continue to monitor and make sensible changes where necessary. We will do all we can to effectively manage our resources to enable implementation of major project commitments such as a new roof, enhanced lighting, upgraded electrical systems and new flooring. Parish goals and parishioner needs guide our decisions. As good stewards of the parish, help us to be diligent in our allocation of resources.

AREAS OF FOCUS:

As you can see, collections are again under budget, but a bit ahead of last year as previously reported. Even an extra \$1 per week will help us close the gap!

Occupancy expenses represent utility, building and grounds maintenance costs. You can see a significant difference which is explained below.

Even though the past few weeks have been bitterly cold, we've experienced lower snow fall so lower snow removal bills.

The net negative Operating expense is lower than the prior year. It's moving in the right direction.

Don't be misled by the Extraordinary financials. As explained below, the income includes our 60% portion of the "To Teach Who Christ Is" donations received through December of \$45,728, together with our Green Envelope collection. Again, the green deficit reduction envelopes help pay for basic services.

Support of the Archdiocesan Special Collections has remained steady.

The bottom line is we need to do two things:

- Increase collections and consider new fund raising activities
- Monitor and decrease expenses where it makes sense in our efforts to serve God!

We believe you will do your best to help in that mission.

As part of our mid-year Archdiocesan financial reporting and preliminary review of our Fiscal Year 2016 budget, we continue to take a hard look at all expenses. One purpose of this review process is to identify and evaluate potential changes with the least impact on St. Isaac Jogues programs and parishioners. Our evaluation has shown that it is necessary to eliminate two positions to most effectively manage our financial resources.

We want to express a sincere **THANK YOU** to our Parish Secretary, **Janet Piovosi** and our Religious Education Staff Assistant, **Renata Jaroslowski** for their dedicated and professional years of service to St. Isaac Jogues Parish and parishioners. Their individual contributions to the parish will be missed.

ST. JOSEPH TABLE

The St. Joseph Table is an old tradition from Sicily. Many centuries ago there was a famine and the people prayed to St. Joseph, their patron, and asked his intercession. Rains came, the famine ended and a special feast to thank and praise God and to honor St. Joseph was prepared after the harvest. All were welcome to come and enjoy, especially the sick and the homeless.

Though Sicilian immigrants introduced the custom to America, the celebration and feast are open to all. The Saint Joseph Table is a source of petition and thanksgiving. Most of the foods presented on the altar are acquired through begging, asking the help of people and local businesses to represent what the poor of Sicily had to do. At the end of the St. Joseph Table the remaining food and whatever money has been given in donations are given to those in need.



Notice, however, that there is something very special about the pledging or promising that belongs to marriage. Usually, promises are about doing something or keeping something. In marriage, it is different. A man and a woman pledge and promise *themselves*. It couldn't be more personal. They give not something but themselves to each other.

Now we know how fragile our human pledges and promises can be. In the sacrament of Marriage, when a couple pledges themselves to each other, they wrap that promise in faith in God who will sustain the union and keep them faithful. Human pledges and promises are full of risks and unknowns. What makes them real and possible is a love that is more than human. It is God's sustaining love.






