





FROM THE PASTOR

THE 2014 MASS BOOK: Individual and Collective Mass Intentions

Our parish policy on Mass Intentions conforms to the Code of Canon Law (1983) and The Policies and Procedures of the Archdiocese of Chicago (Book IV, 203.1-203.33), 1994.

Since August 2006, the practice of combining individual intentions as a norm has been eliminated. While in 1991, the Congregation for the Clergy issued a decree that allowed for an exception, permitting "Collective Intentions," certain rules were established that often made the practice difficult. "Difficult" does not mean "impossible." That is why St. Isaac Jogues Parish will introduce Collective Intention Masses in the 2014 Mass Book. The four rules that govern the use of Collective Intention Masses are:

1. **The donors of Mass offerings must be informed and agree to combine their offerings in a single Mass.**
2. **The time and place for the celebration must be made public.**
3. **Masses with collective intentions may not be celebrated by a priest more than twice a week.**
4. **Only one Mass stipend may be kept by the priest celebrant. Excess offerings ought to be given to the Ordinary (Archbishop), given to charity, or put into the general parish funds.**

The practical application of these rules for this year's Mass Book will mean that:

1. Two Masses (one on the weekend) will be designated "**Collective**" per week.
2. Donors of Mass offerings will be informed that there will be multiple intentions and must agree to share a single Mass.
3. Only one stipend will be given to the priest celebrant. Excess will be set aside for our St. Vincent DePaul Ministry or other parish needs.

Apart from Masses set aside for "**Collective Intentions**," all others will continue to honor individual intentions. The term "individual" applies to the donor. Thus, an individual intention is not necessarily limited to one person. It can be a couple, families or groups - - e.g., The Women's Club, the Men's Club, etc.

Pastoral concern motivates another decision - - **to limit the number of weekend Mass intentions to 12 for individual parishioners.** There will be no limit on weekday Masses. Hopefully, the charity and unity that gathers us for the Liturgy will help us to share more with one another and recognize the Mass as the public, official worship of the Church" . . . the **whole** church.

NOTES & COMMENTS

The mid-year report contains good news and reveals areas for review & change.

Collections are lower than budgeted and last year (-3%), but the Christmas collection did reach \$48000 - with donations received in January after the mid-year close.

Group income, including raffle sales continue to be lower than budget and prior year, but SVDP fund raising efforts have contributed better than expected results.

We continue to reap the financial benefit of staff cuts and changes - but there's not much more here we can do to help our bottom line.

The blessing of a mild winter, minimum snowfall and Archdiocesan negotiated utility savings contribute significant savings to our budget. These savings are great, they can't be assumed or expected.

Miscellaneous expenses include our tuition subsidy to St. John Brebeuf, raffle prizes & expenses, organization expenses including SVDP ministry, meetings & speakers, hospitality & other misc. items.

The financial picture of St. Isaac Jogues is stable and to all who continue to support your Parish

Our financial well-being is critically important and continually monitored. Since there are only two ways to improve a financial picture - either increase contributions or decrease expenses, we must work together.

We ask that you consider an increase in your donation to help us continue to provide the programs and services that support our mission & our parishioners. At the same time, our expense management objective is to identify opportunities for change with minimal impact on the parish community. We will continue to work with the Finance Committee and others to look for ways to keep expenses down.

GABRIELLE CARSELLO NAMED AS FINALIST IN THE 2013 NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM



Senior Gabrielle Carsello '13

Resurrection College Prep High School senior **Gabrielle Carsello '13** (60025) has been named as a Finalist in the 2013 National Merit Scholarship Program. In September 2012 she was named as a Semi-finalist in the National Merit program and she has now been notified that she has advanced to Finalist standing. As a National Merit Finalist, Gabrielle will have the opportunity to be considered for more than \$32 million in scholarships that will be offered this year. Approximately 1.5 million juniors in more than 22,000 high schools entered the 2013 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2011 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®). Of those 1.5 million juniors only 15,000 are chosen as finalists and represent less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, including the highest entrants in each state.

"I am very pleased to be a finalist in the National Merit competition," said Gabrielle. "It is a great honor, and I am looking forward to seeing what will happen." At Resurrection, Gabrielle Carsello is a Res Scholar, a Student Ambassador and a member of the National Honor Society (NHS). She is also President of World-wide Youth in Science and Engineering (WYSE) at Resurrection and recently took a First Place medal in Chemistry and a First Place medal in Biology at the WYSE Regional competition on February 1, 2013. Gabrielle is also Vice President of the Creative Writing Club, and on the staff of *ResBanner*, the Resurrection student news magazine.

Gabrielle Carsello is a graduate from St. John Brebeuf School and is involved as a lector and with the youth group at her parish, St. Isaac Jogues. She will be attending Northwestern University where she plans to study Elementary and Special Education.

MEET DEACON JOHN PAUL SHEA



Next weekend Deacon John Paul Shea will begin two months of weekend ministry here at St. Isaac Jogues Parish as he completes his studies for priesthood at the University of St. Mary of the Lake. Deacon John Paul is a transitional deacon who will be ordained a priest for the Diocese of Tucson, Arizona in June. He will assist at Mass, preach when our other deacons do, lead Stations of the Cross a couple of times during Lent, preside at the Saturday Morning Communion Service, help with wake services and funerals that might be held on the weekend and other service as needed. Deacon John Paul will introduce himself at the Masses next weekend and will assist at the Noon Mass. Please pray for him as he perseveres in the path to ordination to the priesthood. Here is a little about John Paul Shea.

He was born in Mesa, AZ and named John Alan Moore. His mom was a single parent and they along with his sister lived with his grandmother and uncles. John Paul was raised a Mormon and the family was very involved with their religion. Due to family circumstances he met the Shea family at the age of 15 and eventually lived with them. In his late teens he began to have a big interest in boxing, worked on it and even planned on turning pro one day... "but I soon realized that God had other plans for me." In late 1994 he had a conversion that led him to Catholicism and prepared him for the death of his dad, Mr. Shea, whose son he became through adoption. Fearful about his future and his place in this world, John Paul began to pray and ask his dad, who was away from the Church, about the Catholic faith. John Paul attended the RCIA and his dad returned to the Church. John Paul received his GED, took some community college classes and began thinking about priesthood. He lived as a Carmelite for 2 ½ years and then connected with the Diocese of Tucson. He attended a seminary in Oregon for two years and now is in his fourth year at Mundelein. He changed his name to reflect the blessings of God's grace through "my relationship with my adopted father, his and my conversion, and my new life and identity as a Catholic and future priest."

YEAR OF SUNDAY MASS: QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Jesus says in Matthew 7:20, “You will know them by their fruits.” After listening to Jesus’ parable today, what is the “fruit” from my reception of the Eucharist?

KNOW THE MASS, ONE WORD AT A TIME: HOPE

“We are at our best at Sunday Mass when we are focused and paying attention to what is going on right now. That isn’t, however, the whole story. Focusing and paying attention in the moment is good and necessary at Mass, but it’s also necessary to keep an eye on what’s ahead – our future. In and through the Mass, we hope; we look ahead to our future; we keep an eye on our future.

“The prayers of the Mass express how we hope and how we look ahead: ‘We await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.’ And just before Holy Communion, the priest says, ‘Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.’ The supper of the Lamb is our destiny in heaven. While we wait and as we move forward on the journey, we celebrate the Eucharist looking ahead. Saint Paul says, ‘For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord’s death until he comes.’ (1 Corinthians 11:26)




