

## TEMPLES OF THE SPIRIT: *Mystical Body Building*



The Third Sunday of Lent invites us to “REBUILD” the House of God. The readings provide a blueprint.

In Exodus 20, the “Ten Commandments” remind us that the foundation of dwelling with God is a relationship that makes demands of us. St. Paul (1 Cor. 1: 22-25), tells us that “Christ crucified” - a “stumbling block” to the unbeliever - becomes the “cornerstone” of the whole structure of Christian living. Jesus, cleansing the Temple (John 2:13-15), demonstrates the constant need to reform the church and our lives. The promise to “rebuild” the Temple foretells both Christ’s Resurrection and the Risen Life of His Body, the Church.

As the Mystical Body of Christ, we **are** the “House of God.” Pope St. Leo the Great gives us a surprising insight into the project of “rebuilding.”


*There is no doubt that we cannot begin or complete the building unless its architect helps us. Yet He who builds it has given us the ability to make the building more perfect by our labors. For the material God uses in constructing this temple is alive and endowed with reason, and the Spirit of grace inspires it to form, voluntarily, a single structure . . . Since, then each believer, and all believers together form one and the same temple of God, the temple must be perfect not only in all together but in each.*

“Rebuilding” the House of God is “Mystical Body Building.” Popular Lenten practices seem to declare war on the **material** universe. There is a vulgar equivocation of the “body” and corruptible “flesh.” The “way of the flesh” is like “buying and selling” in the Temple. Corruption must be purged. That is why we do penance and fast. That is why we make sacrifices and give alms. That is why we freely “choose” God’s Way.

Truly, Jesus did not embrace Passion and Death to “spiritualize” matter, but to “reintegrate” God’s plan - - to redeem the body and re-form the divine image. Would there have been any need for “resurrection of the body” if our destiny and the destiny of the world was to be abstracted from material existence to a “higher plane”? The Mystery of Christ is no spiritual abstraction! It personally “incorporates” us. Consider St. Paul’s view in Ephesians 2: 19-22.

*So you are no longer strangers and aliens, but fellow citizens with the holy ones and members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the capstone. Through him the whole structure is held together and grows into a temple sacred in the Lord; in him you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in the Spirit.*





While it is a meatless table we will have pasta (marinara and with sardines), fish, egg dishes, vegetables, fruits, breads, sweets, and beverages. All the food will have been donated through the generosity of parishioners and local businesses. **There is no charge to come and eat at the St. Joseph Table. Donations will be gratefully accepted to help our St. Vincent DePaul Ministry reach out to those in need.**

The St. Joseph Table celebration begins with the Noon Mass on March 15<sup>th</sup>, followed by the blessing of the Table and the serving of the food until 4:30 p.m. The line to come down to the table will form in the Holy Family Room as only so many can be served at one time. Everyone's patience and cooperation will be appreciated! Kindly follow the guidance of our Men's Club and please remember that there is also an elevator available by the ramp door of the church if you need that assistance to get down to the Parish hall.

If you made a promise of food (meatless of course) and **it does not need to be refrigerated, please bring it to the Parish Hall on Saturday, March 14<sup>th</sup>, between 9:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Otherwise all other food donations need to be brought to the Parish Hall on Sunday, March 15<sup>th</sup>, from 7:30-11:30 a.m.** in order to finish final preparations of the table. We will have runners near the Holy Family Room on Sunday to carry the food in for you, if you would like. Because we will be making preparations on Sunday morning, no one will be able to come and view the table until it is time for the blessing and serving of food. Food donations will be taken at the door at the bottom of the stairs.

### St. Vincent de Paul Ministry 2014 Report to Parish

*Amen I say to you:*

*Whatever you did for one of the least  
of my brethren, you did it for me.*

Matthew 25:40

Thank you for your generous support of the St. Vincent de Paul Ministry. Enabled entirely by your donations, we continued our work on behalf of the needy within our community during 2014. We provide food, but we also provide non-food assistance such as rent, temporary housing expenses, medical expenses, utility bills, transportation expenses and communications expenses. We handled 134 cases during 2014. The trend of recent years persisted with cases growing more complex. We also expanded the reach of our assistance and entered into new partnerships with community aid organizations.

Many of our clients rely on SVDPM for holiday food and gifts for their children:

- During Easter week, we delivered 18 food baskets
- During Thanksgiving season, we delivered 25 food baskets.

Most of the food for the Easter and Thanksgiving baskets was purchased from Meijer, with the balance either coming from our pantry or from the donations of individual parishioners. During Christmas season, we delivered 15 food baskets, all of which were donated—along with toys—by the Morton Grove Fire Department. The Morton Grove Fire Department has partnered with us for several years on this program. Every year they astound us with their generosity. Led by Firefighter Erik Miller, the MGF is a valued partner in our holiday giving efforts.

A number of parishioners participated in our Giving Tree events at Glenbridge Nursing & Rehabilitation and Niles Nursing & Rehabilitation Center. The residents really appreciated the Christmas gifts that we distributed as well as the songs and good will that were shared.

Our food pantry continues to be a welcome source of nourishing staples for our clients. Your donations left in the food collection basket located in the entry of the Holy Family Room have kept our stock of non-perishable items at record high levels. For the fourth year in a row we have augmented our supply of food with frozen chicken that was generously shared with us by OLPH. Other ministry assistance activities included the following during 2014:

- A very generous parishioner, who has been—along with his family members—a long-time supporter of SVDPM, convinced the Lions Club of Niles to “sponsor” one of our client families. After the delivery of the Lions Club monetary donation, he continued to sponsor this family by bringing food to them on a regular basis. He also encouraged his family members to forego their Christmas presents to each other so they could give gift cards and gifts to this needy family. We are thankful to him not only for his generosity but for introducing, through his example, a possible model for other sponsorships in the future. We are in the process of studying the feasibility of such a program. If you are interested in sponsoring a family, please contact Joyce Mills through the rectory.
- Assisted by other parishioners, we provided and served food at Catholic Charities in Des Plaines on two occasions, feeding approximately 150 people.
- We assisted three families during the annual SIJ school supplies drive.
- We provided food to Catholic Charities in Des Plaines when they were dealing with a serious shortage.
- We helped eight SIJ families in need to pay religious education tuition expenses.
- We made a contribution to Maternity BVM, our sharing parish, to help families with Catholic school tuition expenses.
- In the on-going effort to communicate effectively with the parish community, our Secretary, Joyce Mills, published 17 articles about the ministry in the bulletin.
- We entered into a relationship with Niles Family Services at their request. They referred six clients (and their families) to us. We assisted with food and/or payment of rent and utilities.
- We also entered into a relationship with the Maine Township Emergency Food Pantry. Marsha Warnick, Director of General Assistance for Maine Township, participated in one of our meetings and contributed valuable insights regarding the procedures and policies of outreach work. When Maine Township experienced a food shortage during the holidays, we provided surplus food to them.

More about the new relationships with Niles Family Services and Maine Township:

- Many Niles Family Services and Maine Township clients residing in our assistance area typically wind up coming to us eventually. It's not uncommon for them to hear about us from other social service clients or to visit us because they have been advised to look to local churches for additional aid.

- These new relationships allow us to serve these clients more efficiently, keeping them from enduring even longer periods of privation.
- Both organizations scrupulously qualify their clients.
- Niles Family Services has entered into similar relationships with St. John Brebeuf parish, Our Lady of Ransom parish and Catholic Charities.

We added one new member during 2014. If you think you might be interested in participating in this critically important work of helping those in need within our community, please contact the parish office. One of our members will get back to you to discuss joining our ministry.

It has been an especially difficult year for the ministry due to members' deaths, illnesses and moves. I am proud of our members who—despite these added challenges—not only kept the ministry's work going, but expanded our services and extended our outreach by partnering with municipal service organizations. My gratitude goes out to all of our members. They always answer the call. They are, through the donation of their time and talents, examples of Christian charity in action. I am also grateful to our officers—Joyce Mills, Nenita Mallari and Deacon Paul Stanton—for their leadership.

On behalf of the ministry and all those who received assistance, thank you again for your donations and your prayers. Without your support, we would not be able to continue this work.



"I promise to be true to you in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health. I will love you and honor you all the days of my life." This is an impressive promise. In essence, it is a promise to **stay** with each other, whatever the circumstances of life. This is not an easy promise to make, nor is it an easy promise to keep. For those who enter marriage as more than a human covenant but as a sacrament, the promise takes on special meaning.

When a baptized man and a baptized woman promise in faith to stay with each other, they draw their *inspiration* and their *power* from Jesus Christ. "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age," he says at the very end of Matthew's Gospel (28:20). Elsewhere, he says, "I will not leave you orphaned." (John 14:18) The grace of permanence in marriage is truly a grace, not a human achievement.

#### PARISH INPUT TO ARCHBISHOP FOR OCTOBER SYNOD

Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, has called together two synods or meetings of representative bishops from throughout the world to consider the family. The first synod took place last fall, and the second will take place this coming October. Our own Archbishop Cupich has been named as an alternate delegate to the synod.

As he prepares to offer a perspective to his fellow bishops in the United States and in turn to the Synod Office preparing for the November meeting in Rome, Archbishop Cupich wants to hear the voice of the people of the Archdiocese of Chicago. Consider filling out this brief questionnaire to help him prepare for his work. Your comments should be dropped off at the Rectory or placed in the collection basket by next weekend. The theme of the synod is the vocation and mission of the family in the Church and in the contemporary world. The hope of the synod is to make the 'gospel of the family' come alive in our world. That means to understand and live family life in such a way that the family becomes a privileged place where we meet God and God meets us. It also means that the family assumes its holy mission in the world to bring new life in Jesus Christ to others. In the complexities of our world and of family life itself, this is no easy task. 


