

HOLY WEEK

Now we enter the holiest part of Lent. The Church has prepared us step by step for this sacred experience. A steady crescendo in the liturgy has been taking place ...

Each week the sound rose higher, and louder. Although Mother Church often spoke about the Cross and the resurrection, she did so in veiled signs and figures, as if she feared exposing a most precious object to profane eyes. Not until this moment does she remove the curtain. Now we see the Holy of Holies; and more than that, we are asked to participate in the most sublime drama of religious history.


The greatest and holiest of weeks is about to begin. We should not call it a week of mourning, for Cross and resurrection are inseparable. Christ's redemptive work did not end with death, it continues on in the victory of His resurrection. Therefore, we must not separate the passion from the resurrection, but rather regard the Cross as the way to Easter victory.

The liturgy does not make this week one of sorrowful lamentation or tearful sympathizing with our suffering Lord. That was the medieval approach. No, through the whole week there runs a note of victory and joy, a realization that Christ's sacred passion was a prerequisite to Easter glory. We cannot understand the Church's liturgy unless we keep this in mind.

There is no day in the entire coming week when the theme of Easter and victory does not resound loud and clear. Think only of *Palm Sunday* with its homage to the King; of *Holy Thursday* with its solemn Mass and consecration of the Holy Oils; of *Good Friday* with the solemn exaltation of the Cross; of *Holy Saturday*, the beginning of the Easter solemnities.

Four days take on special importance, viz., Palm Sunday and the sacred Triduum. The remaining three days, Monday through Wednesday, do not differ radically from other days in Passiontide. Palm Sunday may be called the golden gateway leading to the holy mysteries of Easter.


Pope Francis

Pope Francis, formerly Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio, S.J., had been Archbishop of Buenos Aires, Argentina, since 1998. He was born on December 17, 1936 in Buenos Aires, to an Italian immigrant who worked on the railroads and his wife, also of Italian descent. He was ordained for the Jesuits on December 13, 1969 during his theological studies at the Theological Faculty of San Miguel.

He was novice master in San Miguel, where he also taught theology. He served as Provincial for Argentina from 1973 to 1979 and as rector of the Philosophical and Theological Faculty of San Miguel from 1980 to 1986. After completing his doctoral dissertation in Germany, he returned to his homeland to serve as a confessor and spiritual director in Córdoba.

On May 20, 1992 he was appointed titular Bishop of Auca and Auxiliary of Buenos Aires, receiving episcopal consecration on June 27. On June 3, 1997 he was appointed Coadjutor Archbishop of Buenos Aires and succeeded Cardinal Antonio Quarracino on February 28, 1998. He was also Ordinary for Eastern-rite faithful in Argentina, who lack an Ordinary of their own rite. Archbishop Bergoglio was named cardinal by Blessed John Paul II on February 21, 2001. He served two terms as President of the Bishops' Conference of Argentina from November 8, 2005 until November 8, 2011.

He has served on the Congregation of Clergy, Congregation of Divine Worship and Sacraments, Congregation of Institutes of Consecrated Life, and the Congregation of Societies of Apostolic Life, as well as the Pontifical Council for the Family and the Pontifical Commission for Latin America. He was Adjunct Relator General of the 10th Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops in October 2001. On March 13, 2013 he was elected the 266th pope in the apostolic succession dating from the time of Saint Peter.

THE FEAST OF DIVINE MERCY: APRIL 7



In 1931 Our Lord appeared to Sister Faustina Kowalska in a vision and gave her the mission of spreading His message of Mercy to the whole world. Jesus said to her: ***"Paint an image according to the pattern you see with the signature: 'Jesus, I Trust in You' – 'Jezu, Ufam Tobie.' This Feast emerged from the very depths of My mercy, and it is confirmed in the vast depths of My tender mercies (420... It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fountain of My mercy (600)."***

On the first Sunday after Easter 2000, Pope John Paul II announced that Sister Faustina was to join the ranks of Saints. On that same day the Pope formally announced that the Sunday after Easter would henceforth be known as Divine Mercy Sunday.

We will celebrate The Feast of Mercy beginning with the Noon Mass on Sunday, April 7th. It will be followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament until 3:00 p.m. The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available from 2:00 – 3:00 p.m. with confessions being heard in English and Polish. The Chaplet of Divine Mercy will be prayed in English, Polish and Tagalog at 3:00 p.m. and conclude with Benediction. All are invited to conclude the Octave of Easter with praise and thanks to God in Christ for His Divine Mercy.

Booklets for the Divine Mercy Novena, which begins on Good Friday, are available at the doors of the church TODAY and throughout this week. Please join in praying this novena which our Lord also entrusted to St. Faustina.

In the Eucharist Jesus gives Himself into our hands. How do I give myself to God?


KNOW THE MASS, ONE WORD AT A TIME: REMEMBER

"Every Mass remembers the Death and Resurrection of Jesus, but not as you would expect. Most of our day-to-day talk about remembering really means recalling or bringing up something that happened in the past. Our remembering at Mass is much, much different. It is not a matter of recall, but rather of making present – here and now – what we remember. The Mass doesn't just commemorate the Death and Resurrection of Jesus as a past event. The Mass makes this event present to us, right now, right here, in sign and sacrament. Our remembering in the Mass enables us to be present to him – right here and right now – as the self-sacrificing Lord who destroys death and restores life.

Each one of the Eucharistic prayers has an anamnesis, or a special prayer of remembering. So, for example, the priest prays in Eucharistic Prayer IV: 'Therefore, O Lord, as we now celebrate the memorial of our redemption, we remember Christ's Death and his descent to the realm of the dead, we proclaim his Resurrection and his Ascension to your right hand...' And in our prayer of remembering we don't just recall Jesus, we meet him as the dying and rising Lord who draws us into new life."

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Later this week, the Chrism Mass is celebrated in every cathedral in the world in preparation for the Easter Triduum. Only a bishop can consecrate chrism, pure olive oil infused with rich fragrance, so this liturgy is a sign of the unity of the local Church and the bishop's ministry to all who will be baptized and confirmed in our parishes in the coming year. Chrism is also used in the ordination of priests and bishops and the consecration of new altars. Two other sacramental oils, the unscented olive oil for catechumens and for the sick, will be blessed in the same liturgy and transported carefully to every parish by the beginning of the Triduum.

Remember when Noah's dove returned with the sign of the world's rebirth? The dove carried an olive branch, a pledge that God was breathing the world to life again. Yet olives require human nurture. Olives are inedible unless they are cured by human labor. Olive trees grow on sunny slopes, away from the shade of city walls, so they can only be properly tended, cured, and laboriously pressed in peace time. The Chrism Mass with its olive oils expresses God's deepest desires for us, and our resolve to place our lives in service to God's saving, healing, loving plan.



The chip-timed 5K will start at 9 am beginning at the Resurrection College Prep High School parking lot and the route will be in the neighborhood surrounding Resurrection. A course map is available at www.reshs.org. Advance registration fees are \$30 per adult and \$10 for students (ages 6-18) through April 19. On the morning of the event the on-site registration fees will be \$35 per adult and \$15 per student. Children ages 5 and under are free with a registered adult.
