Reflections from Fr. Dennis

Dear Friends and Fellow Parishioners:

There has been much discussion recently regarding who should and who should not receive Holy Communion. Today's familiar Gospel parable can help us to address this complex issue. Specifically, the introduction to the story may be the most important part of this reading. Jesus told this parable because his critics were complaining: "He welcomes sinners and eats with them."

There are two sons in the story, one righteous and the other a renegade. Which one was more eligible to share in the feast? One son knew he was not worthy even to be called a son, let alone have a banquet held in his honor. He was willing to admit this – after a painful process. The other son thought himself worthy of a feast but disapproved of his father's prodigal conduct – as well as the offenses of his wayward brother. We do not know if the righteous son changed his attitude and eventually joined the feast. Taking our cue from the introduction to the parable, we may assume that he stayed outside, condemning and griping. Who could blame him?

In the course of the Gospel parable, what St. Paul calls in the Second Letter to the Corinthians "a new creation" was taking place, beginning in a pigpen far away. Old things were passing away; new things were coming to pass. That is why Jesus was willing to eat with sinners. By welcoming them, He was making it possible for something new to happen. He was opening the door to reconciliation. Jesus didn't always succeed, but He was willing to take the risk. "God made Jesus to be sin," says St. Paul, "who did not know sin, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him." Those are mysterious words indeed.

No one is worthy to sit at table and dine with the Son of God. We all declare before we come forward to receive Holy Communion, "Lord, I am not worthy to receive you." We hope that we are reconciled to God as we approach. We don't need to judge how reconciled the person before or behind us is. We cannot know the state of another person's soul at any given moment. THAT person knows. And Jesus knows. Jesus has made himself vulnerable to misuse, in hope that a new creation can take place. We may wonder at that – just as the righteous son wondered at his father's actions. We, too, may wonder, but we can rejoice on this Laetare Sunday. For although we may give up on each other, Jesus never gives up on us.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Over the years, our tradition has come to see this Sunday as a transition, a midpoint, an oasis in the middle of six long weeks of preparation for Easter. The key is the Latin word *Laetare*, or "Rejoice," which was for centuries the first word sung in the Mass for this Sunday. In southern Europe, the first roses of springtime are appearing now, and there used to be a custom of honoring those to be baptized at Easter with roses on this Sunday. Long ago, this was also seen as a day for celebrating the ordination of priests. Many parishes retain the custom of using rose-colored vestments on this day. Normally flowers are banned from worship in the restrained season of Lent, but here, midway, these signposts of festivity pointing to the renewal of Easter springtime sometimes make a quiet appearance. A project for today would be to plant a few paperwhite or narcissus bulbs in a water bowl filled with river rocks. Like those elect who will soon be bathed in baptismal waters, they will come to full stature in the Easter season.



*ACT OF SPIRITUAL
COMMUNION*

Even if we are unable to physically receive Holy Communion at times we can enter into spiritual Communion with the Lord by praying:

My Jesus, I believe that You are truly present in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

I love You above all things, and I desire to possess You within my soul. I am sorry for ever having offended you.

Since I am unable now to receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as being already there, and unite myself wholly to You.

Never, never permit me to be separated from You.

Church Interior Renovation Update

Along with the formation of the Unification Committee, and the work to begin to discern a possible new name, St. Isaac Jogues also received permission from Bishop Bartosic to restart the interior renovation project. We have been working with the Archdiocese of Chicago Facilities project managers who are helping us navigate the contract, bidding and permit process based on proposed designs that were discussed with the Design Committee in 2019. We invited another general contractor to review the plan and bid the project. He presented a lower bid. The bid was reviewed & accepted and a contract will be awarded to the new general contractor. Additional contracts will also be awarded to other specific vendors once scope is finalized.

Our project start date is late May-early June at this time, beginning with asbestos abatement. The general contractor believes the project will take 12-16 weeks which could take us to late September. Our hope is to be completed in time for our feast day in October. During the project, the Holy Family Room will become our worship site.

Your design team includes Nancy Winans, Jelly Carandang, Irene Baron, Gerry Zeller, Lisa Hall, Dolores Stanton. Our next meeting with the Architect is scheduled for April after Easter. Once more decisions have been finalized, we will continue to provide updates.

Quick info guide to suggesting our new parish name

Where can I get a name submission form:

-on your seats at St. Martha or from an usher at St. Isaac, -in the narthex at St. Martha or at the 3 entrance doors at St. Isaac, -attached to the Friday Flock Note as a PDF, -from the business offices at either church.

Where can I return my completed form:

-the Sunday collection basket this weekend, -the collection box in the narthex at St. Martha or the designated collection baskets at the entrances at St. Isaac, -the business offices, -email to Lori@saintmarthachurch.org

When is the submission deadline?

All completed forms must be received by 3pm on Monday, March 28.

What if I have more than 1 suggestion?

Complete a form for each name, including a reason for each.

Are there protocols to guide my suggestion?

According to the guidelines laid out by the Archdiocese, the name of the new parish should be:
 -a title of Christ under a title already accepted in the liturgy or that speaks to a mystery in His life;
 -one of the angels or a canonized saint;
 -a name based on a special devotion to a particular saint or because the saint represents a certain cultural or ethnic perspective.
 -The name for the new parish should have a feast day for the new parish to celebrate.
 -Do not submit a name that is already in use for a parish, school, mission, agency or shrine in the archdiocese. Please do not submit a name under Mary or her titles due to the large number of churches in her honor already. Consult the list of used names posted in each church building.

What if I have more questions?

A member of the Naming or Communication Subcommittee is available after all Masses this weekend to answer questions.
