

REFLECTIONS FROM FR. CARLOS

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. Some years ago, this Sunday was known as the low Sunday in contrast to Easter Sunday which is the high Sunday. On this day, many years ago, the newly baptized would lay aside, the white garments they had worn throughout the first week of Easter. So, it was also known as the Sunday you drop the white garments. The name we call it today, the Divine Mercy was in obedience to the instruction Jesus gave to Saint Maria Faustina in her numerous visions, the first Saint to be canonized this millennium. You can learn so much from her and the experience of the mercy of God by reading her Diary.

The first thing to notice in today's first reading is the unity that existed among the early Christians. They had everything in common. One of the Graces we experience in the Risen Christ. He restores people to unity. We all remember how they were scattered after the death of Christ. Some were even ashamed that they had betrayed Him and wanted to go their way. However, Jesus' resurrection is a powerful source of unity. That means every Christian Church or family that truly bears the mark of Christ should be united. Unity is a sign that Christ dwells with us in our families or in our Church. It is the Devil that sows the seed of division and we must watch out for that. Christian unity must be based on moral truth, genuine love and sound teaching. If there is any time Christians need to be united, it is now that our values are constantly under attack by secularism. On a practical side, a unity I also think we need in families today is for parents to be on the same page when they correct their children. Maybe I can call that unity of correction. When parents are divided when correcting the children, that is the sign of a crack in the family. The devil loves such cracks and uses them to bring down homes. We must always avoid this. The same unity was also expressed by the disciples when Jesus appeared to them. Jesus also loves unity based on Love and Truth. We pray that our families and our world will always be united.

“ALLELUIA” AND “THANK YOU” ARE OUR SONGS

“We are an Easter people and Alleluia is our song!” We are also a Eucharistic people with thanks ever flowing from our lips and our hearts. On behalf of our faith community thank you to everyone who helped make our celebration of the Sacred Triduum, the Holy Three Days, one of great reverence, prayerfulness, beauty, and joy, one of safety, hopefulness and friendship! DOUBT

The desire to be able to prove the existence of a divinity has troubled humanity since human consciousness first became aware of the divine. To this very day we are fond of saying that any number of things—from sunsets to hot fudge sundaes—are “proof that there is a God.” We get so caught up in the story of “doubting Thomas” that we fail to notice that today's Gospel gives us John's account of Pentecost, the bestowing of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples following the Resurrection. Thomas, evidently, missed out not only on seeing the Risen Christ, but receiving the Holy Spirit as well. This is not to be taken lightly and, perhaps, makes Thomas' disbelief a bit easier to comprehend. It also makes his professing that Jesus is his Lord and God—the only time the New Testament explicitly refers to Jesus Christ as “God”—more remarkable.

EASTER REFLECTION:

From a sermon by St. Gaudentius of Brescia, bishop


“The heavenly sacrifice, instituted by Christ, is the most gracious legacy of his new covenant. On the night he was delivered up to be crucified he left us this gift as a pledge of his abiding presence. This sacrifice is our sustenance on life’s journey; by it we are nourished and supported along the road of life until we depart from this world and make our way to the Lord. For this reason he addressed these words to us: *Unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood, you will not have life in you.*



“It was the Lord’s will that his gifts should remain with us, and that we who have been redeemed by his precious blood should constantly be sanctified according to the pattern of his own passion. And so he commanded those faithful disciples of his whom he made the first priests of his Church to enact these mysteries of eternal life continuously. All priests throughout the churches of the world must celebrate these mysteries until Christ comes again from heaven. Therefore let us all, priests and people alike, be faithful to this everlasting memorial of our redemption. Daily it is before our eyes as a representation of the passion of Christ. We hold it in our hands, we receive it in our mouths, and we accept it in our hearts.


“It is appropriate that we should receive the body of Christ in the form of bread, because, as there are many grains of wheat in the flour from which bread is made by mixing it with water and baking it with fire, so also we know that many members make up the one body of Christ which is brought to maturity by the fire of the Holy Spirit. Christ was born of the Holy Spirit, and since it was fitting that he should fulfill all justice, he entered into the waters of baptism to sanctify them. When he left the Jordan he was filled with the Holy Spirit who had descended upon him in the form of a dove. As the evangelist tells us: *Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan.* Similarly, the wine of Christ’s blood, drawn from the many grapes of the vineyard that he had planted, is extracted in the winepress of the cross. When men receive it with believing hearts, like capacious wineskins, it ferments within them by its own power.

“And so, now that you have escaped from the power of Egypt and of Pharaoh, who is the devil, join with us, all of you, in receiving this sacrifice of the saving Passover with the eagerness of dedicated hearts. Then in our inmost being we shall be wholly sanctified by the very Lord Jesus Christ whom we believe to be present in his sacraments, and whose boundless power abides for ever.”

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

St. Faustina wrote, "While I was saying the chaplet, I heard a voice which said, ***“Oh, what great graces I will grant to souls who say this chaplet; the very depths of My tender mercy are stirred for the sake of those who say the chaplet. Write down these words, My daughter. Speak to the world about My mercy; let all mankind recognize My unfathomable mercy. It is a sign for the end times; after it will come the day of justice. While there is still time, let them have recourse to the fount of My mercy; let them profit from the Blood and Water which gushed forth for them.”*** (#848, *Diary*)

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. The Feast of Mercy Mass is at 10 a.m. followed by the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament until Noon. The Diving Mercy Chaplet will be prayed at Noon followed by Benediction. If you are attending the 10 a.m. Mass you may either stay for adoration or leave. If you are attending another Mass but want to come for adoration and/or the Chaplet and Benediction, you are welcome to come to the usual door and give us your name and phone number and come in based on how much space we have and what we have been able to sanitize. Masks must continue to be worn. All are invited to continue the celebration of Easter by participation in all or some part of this feast day as we conclude the Octave of Easter.
