## CARDINAL GEORGE:

### *Personal Impressions of a “Good Shepherd”*



There is a scene in Willa Cather's *Death Comes for the Archbishop* where a priest tries to encourage his ailing bishop.

*“You should not be discouraged;  
one does not die of a cold . . .”  
The old man smiled. “I shall not die of a cold,  
my son. I shall die of having lived.”*

Death came for Cardinal George on Friday, April 17, at 10:45 a.m. Someone asked me how I felt. I said simply, “Sad.” Why sad? Because Cardinal George's “having lived” has made a profound difference for the Church, the Archdiocese and many of us **personally**. He will be remembered for his courage and the moral clarity of his leadership. What else will we remember? His great intelligence and attention to detail, certainly. He had theological depth. He faithfully served the Holy See. He was an advisor of popes. But, from all that has been written in tribute thus far, I believe, George Weigel, the biographer of John Paul II, has the best insight into Cardinal George.

*“He stood apart for his intelligence, his ability to make the church's proposal in a compelling way to contemporary society, his deep faith, personal holiness and courage . . . I think he would want to be remembered as a good and faithful priest. That's all he ever wanted to be.”*

Since my ordination in 1970, I have served four archbishops. I have known none of them **personally**. Our new archbishop I haven't met, except in a “welcoming crowd.” I have respected and obeyed all of them. Brief “encounters” with each of them have been awkward, even funny. Cardinal Cody never pronounced my name correctly. To him, I was “Father Luck-zak.” He once offered me the service of the Archdiocesan lawyer for my great uncle's estate, but I already had engaged my uncle's lawyer. My most memorable “encounter” was as a seminarian. We were in the Main Chapel sacristy alone. He obviously was having a stressful day. He looked at me and gave me only this advice: “Son, never aspire to be a bishop!” Coming from a powerful and prominent churchman, the advice spoke volumes!

Cardinal Bernardin introduced himself as our “Brother Joseph.” For me, he was never more or less than the Archbishop. He was well turned out in Stadelmaier vestments. He had a reputation for being urbane and progressive. . . an excellent cook. He was “political”, with both a national and international agenda. But . . . every time I met him face to face, he would look at me soulfully and say: “I really ought to remember your name, but I don't.” I first met him on the grand staircase of the Conrad Hilton. I noted then that Cardinal Bernardin was a master of the “Passover” handshake. It is a greeting that says “hello” and “goodbye” at the same time. Later, at the lowest point in his life, suffering from cancer, he impressed me most. There were those who allege that he wanted to be the first American pope. In the end, what mattered most for him and all the faithful was accepting God's will and the promise of Eternal Life.

Francis Cardinal George . . . meeting him was like being introduced to a decorated war veteran. He had been a victim of polio as a boy. His ambition was to be a priest. Quigley, the Chicago Preparatory Seminary, rejected him for his disability. That did not stop him! He went to another seminary and distinguished himself as a scholar. He was ordained an Oblate of Mary Immaculate. His ministry and work as a teacher and missionary were rewarded with key positions, travel and the experience of many cultures. He was made a bishop and responded to the particular needs of two dioceses. He learned Spanish and about Native American culture. In his approach, he combined the gifts of a scholar and a missionary.

Being appointed as Archbishop of Chicago was a “homecoming” of sorts. The “native” had returned. It was hard to miss the irony: “the stone rejected by the builders had become the cornerstone” of the Archdiocese! He accepted that irony well. He called the “shots” and criticized flaws. Early on, he was called “George the Corrector.” That was unfair as was some media coverage. His quick wit and “word bites” were sometimes misinterpreted. He was sincere, and effective, in addressing the scandal of child abuse by clergy with “zero tolerance.” He was diligent and practical in improving the complex financial picture. From afar, I admired his “no nonsense” leadership.

I did have significant “encounters” with Cardinal George. While I was at St. Lambert’s Cardinal George accepted our invitation to preside at a multicultural celebration of Epiphany. That year, there was a horrible blizzard the day before our festival. We were not sure the Cardinal would be able to be with us until about an hour before the Mass. When he arrived, he was gracious, and “down to earth.” I will never forget his kindness and interest in every group. The way he mixed with people reflected his “style” of shepherding. He knew my name. He pronounced it correctly. I felt honored that he had made sacrifices to be with us!

I had a similar experience at St. Isaac Jogues Golden Jubilee Mass in 2006. I was the new pastor, and I watched him engage people and put them at ease. It wasn’t an “act.” It was real. I was pleased that he still remembered my name.

What was my best “encounter” with Cardinal George? He telephoned me soon after my mother’s death in 2004. As he spoke to me, he did so as a **priest**. Once again, he was a real “shepherd,” not a “Corporate Soul” or an “Eminence”!

I have come to realize what I prize the most in my “encounters” with Cardinal George. He was a person, who suffered and showed us how to survive. For him, it wasn’t “toughing it” or “roughing it.” The secret of his survival was grace . . . his relationship with Christ. He really believed. With belief, we can accept, sacrifice and find peace.

Yes, I will miss his “rapid fire” intellect, his professorial humor, and the spiritual strength that was his defining trait. Archbishop Cupich observed that Cardinal George

did not let “his physical limitations moderate his zeal for bringing the promise of Christ’s love where it was needed most.”

Today is “Good Shepherd Sunday” and the **World Day of Prayer for Vocations**. May the example of Cardinal George inspire young people to imitate the authentic faith and zeal of this Good Shepherd. While we shall all “die of having lived,” the Paschal Mystery requires that we accept death to self before we can truly live.

*Eternal rest grant to Cardinal George.  
Let perpetual light shine upon him.*

*May he rest in peace!*






#### AN EASTER THOUGHT FROM POPE ST. GREGORY THE GREAT



The Rite of Confirmation contains these essential words for the conferral of the sacrament: "Be **sealed** with the Gift of the Holy Spirit." The exact meaning of these words may elude us. What does it mean to be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit? To seal something can often mean to enclose it, but clearly that is not the meaning of Confirmation. Another meaning is to certify or to guarantee. When something is sealed or has a seal affixed to it, we know that it is real and genuine.

As we try to follow Jesus and live his way of discipleship, we may be uncertain. And we should be, especially if we are relying on ourselves and our own efforts. In fact, when we are his confirmed disciples on whom the seal of the Holy Spirit has been set, we can be absolutely certain. We live and walk, not on our own, but by the grace and power of the Holy Spirit.




