

## Reflections from Fr. Dennis

Dear Friends and Fellow Parishioners:

Jenny didn't quite understand what it meant to be Catholic – even though she was born into a Catholic family, was baptized a few days after her birth, and attended Catholic elementary school, high school, and college. When her relationship with her boyfriend moved from dating to possible marriage, her significant other asked her, "Jenny, are you a Christian?" Her response puzzled him. She said, "No. I'm Catholic." We have to admit that nowhere in the New Testament is the Church called "Catholic". It was St. Ignatius of Antioch, a first-century Church Father, who initially applied the term "catholic" to the Church. He was distinguishing the "whole Church" (or the Church at large) from a local congregation.

The term "Catholic" then took on several different meanings. If at first "catholic" meant the Church at large (an all-embracing, universal Church as a whole), it was soon used to mean "orthodox" (faithful to the Gospel it had received). For some, "catholic" implied that the Church had everything that Jesus intended the Church to have and do. Because "katholikos" in Greek can mean "universal", the term "catholic" meant that the Church had the mission to evangelize all people on earth. Eventually, the term "Catholic" was used to distinguish the Church under the authority of the bishop of Rome from those congregations who reject the pope's leadership.

Most of us accept the title "Catholic" with pride, but today's Liturgy of the Word reminds us of the responsibility which comes with the honor. Jesus gave his disciples a mission: "Go, make disciples of all the nations" (Matthew 28:19). Judaism had not thought of itself as having a mission to make converts; it did not proselytize. Some of the Jewish Christians were uneasy with a mission to make disciples of so many gentiles; Paul reminded them that they were to be "light for the gentiles". As disciples of Jesus, we are expected to "make disciples" to evangelize in whatever ways are appropriate to our state of life.

Like Jesus, we share the duties of a shepherd, tending with patience and love those in our care or circle of influence. The etymology of the word "congregation" is "to gather a flock" (the Latin word "grex," the heart of the word "congregation", means "flock"). Jesus is the ultimate Shepherd, but He shares that task with all who bear his name. We are Christians to be sure, but we identify ourselves as Catholic, and that implies we have a concern to bring the fullness of the Gospel to all the world.

We are gathered here as the local congregation of the Catholic Church. In our celebration of the Eucharist, we join with our sisters and brothers around the world to praise God and to be nourished by the heavenly bread so that we may be truly Christian – authentic followers of Christ – and authentically Catholic – conscious of our responsibility for bringing Christ and the Gospel to the world.

## A FORETASTE OF PARADISE

Throughout Easter Time, the Church rejoices with Jesus, risen from the dead. Our readings on this Fourth Sunday of Easter celebrate our instinct to come together in joy, worshiping in church. While private prayer nourishes our individual relationship with the Lord, community prayer is a foretaste of paradise. The book of Revelation depicts a "great multitude" worshiping God "day and night in his temple." Our churches on Easter Sunday often reflect this happy multitude, filling the pews to bursting. Four Sundays into the festive season, we are encouraged to keep praising God together. In the Acts of the Apostles, Paul and Barnabas demonstrate their instinct to worship with their faith community each Sabbath, dutifully taking their seats in the synagogue. In the Gospel, Jesus calls us his sheep and reminds us why coming together as a flock is so important: uniting in community, we imitate the unity of God.

## EASTER REFLECTION

"What are the pastures of these sheep if they are not the deepest joys of the everlasting fresh pastures of paradise? For the pasture of the saints is to see God face to face; when the vision of God never fails, the soul receives its fill of the food of life for ever. And so, dear brothers and sisters, let us seek these pastures and there join in the joy of the celebrations of so many citizens of heaven. Let their happiness and rejoicing be an invitation to us. Let our hearts grow warm, let our faith be rekindled, let our desires for heavenly things grow warm; for to love like this is to be on the way." (St. Gregory the Great, 6<sup>th</sup> century)

INSTITUTE FOR  
DIACONAL STUDIES



Congratulations to Leke Brisku. On May 14th, Cardinal Blase Cupich will ordain him to the Order of Deacon at Holy Name Cathedral in Chicago. He will be one of 20 men to be ordained as deacons.

Leke has journeyed through four years of preparation for this day, attending academic classes, formation programs, engaging in extensive theological reflection sessions, retreats, regular spiritual direction, as well as being involved in many liturgical practica and pastoral field education experiences, including an eleven-month internship.

Ordinations to the permanent Diaconate in the Archdiocese of Chicago have taken place since 1972. There are presently nearly 500 active deacons in the Archdiocese, as well as 40 men currently in formation at the Institute for Diaconal Studies, with a new cohort beginning in the fall. The presence of deacons serving in the Archdiocese is widespread, yet still a frequently asked question is, "What or who is a deacon?"

Bishops, priests and deacons receive the Sacrament of Holy Orders. The diaconate is a three-fold ministry of Word, Liturgy and Charity that is in service to the bishop. Deacons are ordained to baptize, proclaim the Gospel and preach, assist at the Eucharist, witness marriages, officiate at wakes and funeral services, etc. These are the ministries most visible in the parish. The less visible aspect of diaconal ministry traditionally has its history in the Acts of the Apostles, chapter 6. The Apostles laid hands on "...seven reputable men, filled with the Holy Spirit and wisdom..." to care for the widows and administer the daily distribution in the early Christian community.

Thus, from the earliest days of the Church, deacons were involved in service to the bishop not only liturgically and through evangelization efforts but as administrators and representatives (the bishop's "eyes and ears") charged with caring for the poor (spiritually, emotionally, physically), the alienated, and those who, for various reasons, find themselves on the fringes of society. Therefore, deacons also minister in hospitals, prisons, shelters, soup kitchens, and within the various ministries coordinated through organizations such as Catholic Charities and the St. Vincent de Paul Society, modeling the call of *diakonia* that belongs to all the baptized in service to our brothers and sisters in Christ.

And since most deacons work full-time outside the Church, deacons in their workplace (and in the world) are sacramental signs and icons of Christ the Servant visible in the community.

Please keep in your prayers Leke & Blandina, all candidates who will be ordained, their wives and families, and all those in formation, that they might continue to answer God's call in their lives.


## Religious Education


