

Reflections from Fr. Dennis

Dear Friends and Fellow Parishioners:

A very popular genre on television involves people remodeling their homes. Doing home renovations has certainly become common during this area of COVID-19. These shows are not about totally demolishing what was originally built. Instead, they demonstrate how to fix what has broken, renewing what has become stale and dated, thus giving new life to something that has deteriorated. Of course, God does not simply remodel or restore creation as though it were some cosmic house-flipping show. Instead, God restores creation - including us – to our primordial innocence as creatures fashioned in God's image. This restoration does not involve lumber, nails, or paint but instead increases God's peace and love in our lives so that we can live his commandments in our faith community.


Differences in Church communities can become heated and divisive. Not only theological differences but also political and cultural differences sadly hurt and harm the Body of Christ that is the Church. We must take time and prayerfully reflect on whom we follow – some political or cultural figure of Jesus Christ? These Church struggles, which can destroy a local community, show the value we place on being Church. Living and loving through these struggles is the opposite of saying, "I am spiritual, but not religious." The Church has been struggling and grappling from the very beginning to understand what it means to be part of this mystical Body of Christ. The divisiveness in which we find ourselves today comes from a long tradition and lineage.

Jesus makes a basic, logical "If, then" statement. He offers a lifestyle based on our love for Him. Too often Jesus can be reduced to someone who simply loves and provides whatever we think will make us happy. In reality, however, love is not afraid to make demands upon us. Our love of Jesus, being empowered by the Holy Spirit, and growing in our faith community will allow us to offer authentic witness to Christian living. Our tired and jaded world needs our authentic witness as Christians. We cannot underestimate how much the love we show within our faith community will help us evangelize people.

Loving Jesus leads to our own inner peace. The peace that the world cannot give is beyond all understanding. This glorious city of the Jerusalem coming down from heaven has the apostles' names on the walls. This radiant city will be built on peace and love, enabling God to reside with its inhabitants. Although we eagerly await the restoration of creation and the heavenly Jerusalem coming to us, we can enter this city today by loving Jesus Christ and keeping his commands. Let's face it though. The peace most of us yearn for is not the one Jesus offers. Most of us would be content with a peace that answers our daily human needs – an easy peace – even if at times, it might turn out to be a temporary one. Today we are invited to ask ourselves if we truly understand this gift of peace: the power to be at peace and reconciled with God and others; to trust in Him in the moments of trial and tribulation in life; to stand firm and in obedience to what God has asked of us through the events of our lives. This is true peace, and it is the peace the world can neither give nor take away. It's the peace that many find when they lose themselves in the service of others, and it is the peace Jesus offers us today. Our challenge is to reach out and make it our own!

Church renovation update

Many have been asking "what's going on?" We've been working in the background to finalize details with the architect and contractor along with the help of our Archdiocesan Facilities Project Managers. Contract review with general contractors and sub-contractors is on-going.

Following are some of the high-level finalized details:

- * Asbestos abatement is required to eliminate contaminants under the carpet, under the pews.
- * The stone wall where the old baptismal font is will be removed.
- * New flooring is being installed throughout which will be a combination of carpeting in the aisles and hard surface materials under the pews and in the sanctuary.
- * The stained glass windows on the tabernacle wall of the church will be uncovered again to add symmetry to the church.
- * The radiator covers on the west side of the church will be removed since they are no longer needed and the walls will be patched. All drywall will be repaired/replaced where necessary. The entire church is receiving a badly needed fresh coat of paint.
- * The pews are being removed, repaired and refinished. We will not have/need cushions. The kneelers will remain.

Following is a project still in discussion:

- * The bathroom in the narthex has been an issue for some time and it no longer meets Americans Disability Act (ADA) requirements and needs to change. We are looking at a few options to keep a restroom in the church, but how to best serve the parish in the long-term and eliminate the noise and distraction caused by usage during masses & events. The architect & contractor are working on plans and costs for our review.

Next steps:

- * Movers will be on-site May 23-24. Over 400 chairs, file cabinets, boxes, musical instruments, altar furniture, stations of the cross, ambry, vigil lights, statues, paintings, etc. need to be moved.
- * The Holy Family Room will become "church."
- * Pews will be removed later that week or early the week of May 30th.
- * Asbestos abatement is tentatively scheduled to begin June 1st and could take 2-3 weeks for carpet removal, remediation and air-quality approval from the State of Illinois.
- * Demolition/renovations will commence upon asbestos abatement completion.
- * Flooring materials and paint are being ordered
- * Securing required permits with Village of Niles and Cook County

We believe the project could take 5-6 months depending on material availability and shipping time. Final drawings & renderings will be shared when available. We will provide periodic project updates along the way.


