## A CHAPEL IN ROME



*"To His open heart the Savior invites all, to draw water in joy from the springs of salvation."*

The Preface of the Sacred Heart

Rome is a city of great churches. Tourists and pilgrims need time to absorb the colossal impact of seventeen centuries of faith's expression in art and architecture! Every period of church building has its own "message" to preach. They are, in a sense unintended by Shakespeare, "sermons in stone."

I cannot say that the **Gesu** is one of my favorite churches in Rome, but it **is** an eloquent "sermon in stone." What church better fulfils the artistic ideals of the Council of Trent? Trent decreed that "all artistic endeavor was to be subservient to the aims of the Church." Art was to be

*Clear, simple, and intelligible to all;  
It was to be realistic;  
And it was to provide an emotional stimulus to piety.*

The architects of the **Gesu**, Vignola and Della Porte, clearly provided an "emotional stimulus to piety." As one passes through the triumphal arch of the main doorway, one perceives a "gravity" - a self-conscious grandeur of purpose, a baroque "catechesis." No surface offers a "free space." Even so, the **Gesu** pleases and inspires.

What impressed me the most was a small side chapel dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Once again, the Tridentine artistic priority, to be a "stimulus to piety," seems to have motivated the chapel. While I certainly enjoyed the magnificence of **Gesu's** heroic size, its ceiling fresco, the **Triumph of the Name of Jesus**, and shrines to St. Francis Xavier and St. Ignatius Loyola, the Sacred Heart Chapel somehow surpassed them. It was warm in its ornateness, intimate and comforting. Upon entering the chapel, I was startled to find

Pompeo Batoni's "surreal" painting of the Sacred Heart. I must confess I had never liked Batoni's painting. The "heart in hand" portrait had always struck me as grotesquely sentimental. It was an embarrassing icon that evoked an old popular song of the 1950's - "If I give my heart to you, will you handle it with care?"

Then something unexpected happened. I stopped criticizing Batoni's artistic vision. Alone, in that little chapel with my least favorite icon of Jesus, I felt . . . a **personal** "jolt." It was like the reassuring touch of a friend or like a child's relief that he or she is no longer alone in the dark. What I "felt" prompted me to recall **why** the Sacred Heart devotion is important.

Last Friday was the **Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus**. Throughout the year, Catholics honor the Lord with a First Friday Novena and daily prayers. This is commendable. However, like all regular piety, the Sacred Heart devotion runs the risk of becoming routine and mechanical. There is a wealth of material written on the Heart of Jesus - from the mysticism of St. Gertrude to Pius XII's landmark encyclical, **Haurietis Aquas** (1956). Whether medieval or modern, such reflections can add new depth to popular piety. So too can contemporary spiritual reflections.

In **The Mystery of Love** by the late Cardinal Basil Hume, there are two insights that brought me back to my experience in that small chapel in Rome. The first is that

*the Sacred Heart makes divine love human, interprets divine love in human language; for the Word made flesh speaks not only in verbal communication, but also in terms of divine qualities in human experience.*

The second is that the "Sacred Heart reveals the vulnerability of God." Both of these insights remind us of the great love God has for each of us. That recognition is also a personal vocation to be what Christ is and do what Christ does. To make divine love real to human beings, it must be "a gift of the heart" . . . a **human** heart; both triumphant and vulnerable through love.

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

Today is an exceptional event on our calendar: the Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time is eclipsed by a solemnity honoring two saints who didn't spend much time together in their earthly ministry, and who have distinct feasts so they probably don't mind sharing this one. Yet each suffered a similar fate in the same city, Rome, during the persecution of the Emperor Nero. Nero probably ordered the destruction of many of the residential neighborhoods in service to his building projects, and when the homeless began to look for someone to blame for the fires, Nero targeted the Christians. Soon, Peter was crucified, upside down, on the Vatican hill. Excavations (called *scavi*) under the Vatican basilica have proven the authenticity of his burial place near the place of his death. Paul, a Roman citizen, was later granted a swifter execution by sword, and is remembered at a vast basilica on the city's outskirts.

Peter and Paul were just about polar opposites. Peter rough and ready, Paul poetic and polished. Peter carried a burden of regret for his denials, Paul had his own issues with which he struggled. Peter leapt over barriers to go to the Gentiles, Paul strove with and surrendered to the same call. True, they spent very little time together in this life, but the same Spirit filled their hearts and by their witness changed the face of the earth.




## SAINTS PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES

Today is something of a rarity: the celebration of a saint's day that replaces the Sunday liturgy. Only a handful of these days, given the official rank of "solemnity," are considered so foundational and primal to the mission of the Church that they can interrupt the Sunday sequence. And so it is with Peter and Paul today.

In a way, they each have personality traits with which we can identify. They are both impetuous, sometimes acting or speaking thoughtlessly, contradicting the spiritual gifts given to them by God. At such times, they might receive a nudge from God, much the same as many of us experience. On the positive side, these men were deeply rooted in their faith in Christ, tireless and fearless in living out their call to spread the Good News of his death and resurrection. Perhaps we might identify more with one or the other, but the essential truth we celebrate today is this: Through the Spirit, Christ built and continues to build the Church and make the kingdom known through fragile, remarkable human beings, each graced in a particular way for the work of the reign of God.


SIXTH ANNUAL CONCERT

On November 17, 2013 many lives in the municipality of Washington, Illinois were tragically torn apart by a devastating act of nature. The destruction of houses, businesses, and lives happened in a matter of minutes. Lives have irrevocably been changed. The healing process takes time and a great amount of effort. This is a process of finding a new way in and of life, a new way to exist in the *here and now* and to look to *'living'* a future of hopefulness, a *hard earned* faithful discipleship of accepting that unpleasant and destructive acts may occur again, a trust of faith that God will answer the call of HIS people in their need for compassionate love and in their hope for a prosperous future. Deacons, Wives of deacons and Laity have volunteered time and in some cases materials to bring healing and hope to people in need of assistance to rebuild their lives and families. We have assisted in renovation of parish buildings, clean-up of building debris from building fires and damage to a building involving a vehicular accident, from vandalism and flooding. This is the second time I am volunteering time to Hope Is On The Way (my first time traveling out of town). The first time that I volunteered time to the 'Hope' organization my daughter Elizabeth came with me to a parish in the Archdiocese of Chicago that needed assistance in repairing/renovating a parish center damaged by flooding. This particular parish ministers to the Haitian Community of the Catholic Faith. Truly the 'Hope' organization is a family and a family oriented 'home church' based group.
