My favorite composer on this grand scale was Erich Wolfgang Korngold, who wrote scores for **Robin Hood**, **The Sea Hawk** and **King's Row**. Others like Franz Waxman, Miklos Rosza, and Dmitri Tiomkin also produced the highest quality scores. Musicals, of course, were the richest source of Movie Music. I think the first song I tried to memorize was *The Best Things in Life are Free* from the great 40's film, **Good News**. I saw it recently on Turner Classic. It was a *hoot!* Those were the days...when college was a merry romp: dancing on tables, Cheerleading 101 and doing the *Varsity Drag!* A teenage Mel Tormé sang *my song* better than I ever could.

Who couldn't love those musicals — especially when choreographer Busby Berkley filled the soundstage with hundreds of chorines kicking and tapping. *Gold-digger* movies are spectacular and super silly. But Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers top my list for cool sophistication and grace. Why is it that most of their sets look like they're made of meringue and patent leather?

Forgive me for being nostalgic. I know many old songs — songs so old that when I take the microphone for karaoke, nobody seems to have a clue where to find my favorites. Nelson Eddy and Jeannette MacDonald songs are not party popular today. Even so, I can do a mean Mountie serenading *Rose Marie*. Any takers?



## **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION**

**Registration for the 2013-2014 Religious Education Program for Kindergarten through Confirmation Year II continues!** Please send in or drop off the form that was mailed to returning families or if you are new to the Religious Education Program, please call the RE Office, 847/966-1180, to set up a time to come in and fill out registration forms. You will also need to bring a copy of each child's baptismal certificate if they were not baptized here at St. Isaac Jogues Church.

**Kindergarten classes meet on Sundays, 10:30-11:30 a.m. and Grs. 1 – Confirmation Year II meet on Mondays, 6:45-8:00 p.m.** Families are strongly encouraged to have their children come each year as no one year suffices in providing what is important for a strong faith foundation. Students preparing for sacraments must attend for the two immediate years prior to receiving each sacrament. If families have children with special needs or who have not received their sacraments, we would be happy to meet with you and discuss options. There is tuition as well as book and sacrament fees. Families with financial concerns are encouraged to talk with us as **no child is denied religious education because of finances.** All are welcome!

## **Year of Strong Catholic Parents**

**July 2013 - June 2014**



On July 1<sup>st</sup> the Archdiocese of Chicago entered the third year of our Strategic Pastoral Plan, "Reflect Christ's Light". The goal of this plan, which spans 2011-2016, is to grow the Catholic Community of faith in each parish in the Archdiocese by 20 percent by 2016. The purpose of the plan is to more deeply incorporate baptized Catholics into the Catholic Church over the entire course of their lives. The first year was the Year of Teens and Young Adults; the second year (which we just completed) was Year of Sunday Mass and now we begin the Year of Strong Catholic Parents.

The focus of this third year is to foster deeper connections with parents, to provide a deep understanding of the sacraments as well as a growing appreciation for them as encounters with Christ and as the basis of the Christian life. It is hoped to highlight and encourage parents' responsibility to raise their children in the faith, "to create a family and home life that fosters a knowledge of faith, prayer and service in the world... that works for justice and an appreciation of one's unique vocation or calling by God." This invitation to deeper reflection on their faith lives will hopefully lead to more confident, more courageous witness as they serve as role models and pass on the faith to their children.

As we move forward into this year, we invite parents, grandparents, and others to share suggestions or ideas of events/resources/etc. to assist parents and our parish to be strong in faith and to share it with enthusiasm and conviction with our children and teens. ## PARISH VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES...

- **RE Room Parent** – Share your time and faith with the RE program by assisting with receptions (sacrament celebrations or RE night) and/or registration, help a class with a project or listening to prayers or other needs the catechist may have. New room parents would have a meeting before the new RE season begins and we meet at the end of the year.
- **Sacristan** – share your time and attention to detail by helping to clean the church once a month so that people come to a welcoming, prepared place to praise and worship God. We are in particular need of help the third and fourth weekends of the month. If you've been wanting to help the church but prefer a more "behind the scenes" way to serve, this may be for you!
- **Usher** – if you like to be with people – like to make them feel welcome and want to be helpful to them – this may be your ministry. Ushers come about 20–30 minutes before Mass begins, greet people, answer questions, distribute items before or after Mass (bulletins, prayer sheets), take up the collection, invite people to bring up the gifts and assist the procession to Communion.

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

On a summer day, with the windows open, we may hear the sound of church bells. Bells seem to have come into church life in Irish monasteries around the seventh century, and spread around the Christian world by Irish monks on missionary journeys. By the eighth century, bells were standard equipment in even small parish churches. An ancient ceremony, once called the “baptism of the bells,” recognizes that the church bell

has a voice to call people to awareness and summon them to worship, and even bestows a name on the bell.



In a world without clocks or watches, the bell had an indispensable role. For calling monks in from the fields for prayer, or alerting far-flung visitors, the bell's voice was enhanced by hoisting it high into a tower. Soon it was learned that the sound of several bells clanging together in harmony imparted a sense of joy to great celebrations, and bell towers prospered, some chock full of bells. Different combinations of rings could indicate a death, a Mass, a wedding, a fast day, the curfew at the end of

day, and the Angelus. Before electricity, bell-ringing was hard work indeed: the biggest bell in the Catholic world, in Cologne, Germany, weighs twenty-seven tons! There's no substitute for the resonant roar of a mighty bell; electric chimes are not eligible for blessing!

## WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR? “*Islamophobia*”

“Even before the tragedy of 9/11 the word ***Islamophobia***, from the Latinized *Islam* plus Greek *phobia* (fear), has already been used to describe the pervasive sentiments of fear or dislike of Muslims. You might have heard this term over the radio. On the other side of the coin, there are, in fact, non-Christians who are afraid of us, and disapprove of Christian behavior or culture.

“These religious sentiments are very real in our world today; we feel and breathe them almost everywhere, whether we are aware of them or not. Every day, domestic and international TV or radio news programs and newspapers vividly serialize very disturbing events that explicitly express the menacing consequences of these destructive phobias.

“Aren't these prevailing facts urgent enough to compel you and me to ask whether we might be nursing some fears or perhaps aversion in our hearts in relation to Islam or the Muslims? What do we think is one of the underlying reasons for these uncomfortable sentiments?”


