PASTOR'S NOTES

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“LITTLE THINGS MEAN A LOT”

What ever became of **Trivial Pursuit**? **Trivial Pursuit** was the board game that took America by storm in the 1980s. The "game" offered 1,000 trivia questions in six categories to challenge players. The object was to answer questions in all six categories and proceed to the center of the board for the game winning question. In a way, it was a little like "Parlor Jeopardy" without buzzers and theme music.

Can you answer **all** these questions correctly?

“What grandson of a Polish king was also the “Pretender” to the throne of England?”

“Who popularized the slogan, Black Power?”

“What Hugh Lofting character lived in Puddeby—on- the- Marsh and had a pet duck named Dab Dab ?”

“Who was the first major league baseball player to have his number retired?”

“Who was the ‘Sarong Girl’?”

The correct answers are (in order):

Bonnie Prince Charlie,
Stokely Carmichael,
Dr. Doolittle,
Lou Gehrig and
Dorothy Lamour!

If you were able to answer all or most of the questions correctly, you probably left behind the desire to “buy” Boardwalk or Park Place, the civilized mastery of **Backgammon** and the nostalgic non-sense of **Old Maid** back in the 1980s. You were made for **Trivial Pursuit**. I know I was!

From my experience and all reports, **Trivial Pursuit**

was both educational and community building. It had a special appeal for those of us who were educated beyond practical need and rarely forget a thing! Trivia is, after all, “unnecessary knowledge”—a collection of trifles. But can anyone make a living by quoting Homer in the original Greek?

Can anyone halt the aging process by recounting legends about the “Fountain of Youth?” Is there value in “unnecessary knowledge?”

As - a priest, I am in a “profession” I consider a VOCATION. The secular world sees **clergy** as useless. Clergy traffic in the intangible. Faith, idealism, morality, a pattern for living that leads to ultimate truth - for some these remain useless and trivial pursuits. But for others, such “unnecessary knowledge” is a talisman for happiness and a ladder to perfection. Isn't it strange how people who possess broad and seemingly useless knowledge never seem to tire of life? They don't surrender to the plague of boredom that assaults us from the playpen to the rocking chair to the grave.

One of my favorite quotes on the subject was given me by a ninety year old nun, who found joy in her dedication to detail. Michelangelo said it and we, practical Americans of the twenty-first century, may well ponder it:

*“Trifles make perfection,
but perfection is no trifle!”*

Our world has become sloppy because we expect perfection only from “Word Perfect” and the precision of our technological toys. I prefer **Trivial Pursuit**, the company of friends, the poetry of the useless and the inspiration of the saints. I confess to being “computer illiterate.” But if given a choice, I'd rather have an objet d'art than a “gizmo.”

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

*Registration for the 2008-2009 Religious Education Program for families with children in K-Gr. 8 is ongoing! If you have not yet taken care of this important task, please contact the RE Office this week and set up a time to register, 847/966-1180.

Kindergarten classes meet on Sunday mornings, 10:30-11:30 a.m. and Grs. 1-8 (Confirmation Year II) meet on Monday evenings, 6:45-8:00 p.m. Students must participate in religious education classes for at least two years prior to receiving a sacrament. Families are strongly encouraged to have their children attend religious education every year to assist them in their faith development and formation. Families who have children with special needs or older children who have not yet celebrated First Reconciliation, First Eucharist, etc., are encouraged to talk with us to see what options are available for your children's participation.

There are tuition and sacrament fees but please note that **no one is denied religious education due to financial difficulties. If you have a concern, please contact the RE Office at 847/966-1180 to discuss the situation.** Please call that same number for other information or to have questions answered. Thank you!

RE ASSISTANTS SOUGHT

The Religious Education Program can use the help of teens or adults as assistants (in Gr. 1, 2, and 3) in the coming year. If you can give about an hour and a half on Monday nights, enjoy being with children, and have a desire to share our Catholic faith and tradition with them, this may be a ministry to consider. There are some training/formation sessions to attend at the beginning of the year and 31 sessions during the year (from the end of August to the middle of May). ROOM PARENTS

Looking for a way to be a little more involved with the RE Program without having to commit a lot of time? Being a Room Parent might be a way! Room Parents have two meetings a year (August and May); they coordinate one reception during the year and help with set-up, serving, and clean-up; they attend prayer services/Mass with the children; are an extra pair of hands for special class projects or celebrations (as needed and as available or you call others parents/guardians of the class to help instead). Most Room Parents will tell you it's been a good experience and not very time consuming at all.

SPRED HELPER CATECHIST

As part of your commitment you observe a SPRED session at another parish and you

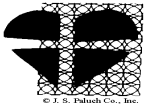

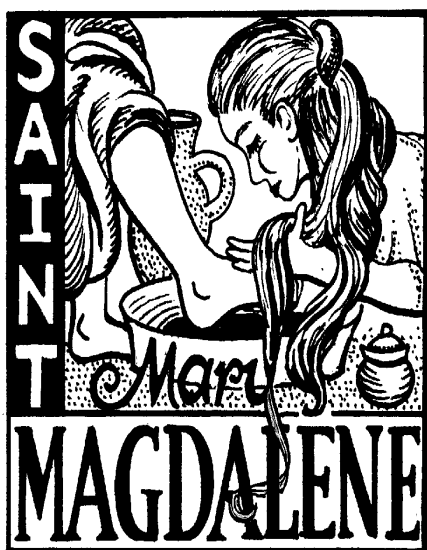
The Irish Are Coming, the Irish are Coming!

Celebrating their 20th anniversary, the Milwaukee Irish Fest Choir is coming to St. Isaac Jogues Church, 8149 Golf Rd. in Niles, on JULY 25th at 7:30 pm. Tickets for this musical event are \$10.00 obtainable either through the Parish or Music Office. Tickets will also be available at the door.

The Milwaukee Irish Fest Choir is the resident choral group of the world famous Milwaukee Irish Fest. Hosting almost a quarter of a million people every year at the Maier Festival grounds on Milwaukee's lakefront, it truly is the World's largest Irish Festival. There is something for everyone.

The MIFC is composed of auditioned youth singers between 14-21 years of age. They rehearse twice weekly during the summer months to ultimately perform Main Stage events at the Fest. This year MIFC is hosting the Omagh Youth choir celebrating their tenth year as a group, and will perform together at the fest. MIFC has toured the Eastern-Midwestern US, Ireland, and is now on a mini-tour through Chicago. They have performed for dignitaries from Ireland, Great Britain, and the U.S. They continue a tradition of singing the national Anthem at Miller Park for the Brewers game every year to crowds of over 40,000.

The MIFC is directed by Chuck Kessell, former music director at St. Isaac Jogues. The Asst. Director is Kayme Henkel, a Nationally Certified Music Teacher, currently both teaching music and finishing her Doctorate in Piano in Milwaukee. The music performed in this concert is appropriate for all ages, so bring the entire family! General seating, so come early. The concert will be performed in the church proper.

ADDING NAMES TO THE PARISH SICK LIST

It has always been the policy of St. Isaac Jogues to offer our parish community an opportunity to pray for those parishioners who are ill and in need of our prayers. We have tried to keep close track of these names for our Bulletin as they are made available to us.

However, now we face an important privacy issue, very much like the issues faced by hospitals, health institutions, and certainly by other parishes.

We cannot (by law) publicly let our parish community know the health status of any of our members without their permission.

We appreciate the fact that often friends, neighbors, and acquaintances wish to do something special for a person who is ill, and ask to place their name on the list to be prayed for. While their intentions are surely good, we simply can no longer accept names in this manner.

We will institute a new process regarding calling in names for the Bulletin list.

Names for the sick list placed in the Bulletin have to be called in by the person who is ill, or by a member of their family. At the time they call in the name, they will be asked whether they are the sick person him/ herself, or a member of their family, and if they give permission for the name to be placed on the list. They will be asked for the **correct spelling** of the sick person’s name. If a **family member**, they will be required to give **their** name for our records.

Thank you for your patience regarding this new process. We wish to do all we can to offer our parish community the opportunity to offer prayers for those who are ill — but we must also be cognizant of the fact that all members of our congregation are entitled to their privacy in this regard.
