DEACON ROD RANOLA:

Consecrated to Serve

After the Bishop lays hands on a candidate for the Diaconate, he prays a prayer of consecration.

Lord, look with favor on this servant of yours, whom we now dedicate to the office of deacon, to minister at your holy altar.

Lord, send forth upon him the Holy Spirit, That he may be strengthened by the gift of Your sevenfold grace to carry out faithfully the work of ministry.

A deacon is called and consecrated to service. He is charged to

*excel in every virtue;
in love that is sincere,
in concern for the sick and the poor,
in unassuming authority, in self-discipline, And in holiness of life.*

As he is presented with the **Book of the Gospels**, the deacon receives the greatest challenge of his new ministry:

*Receive the Gospel of Christ,
whose herald you now are.
Believe what you read,
teach what you believe,
and practice what you teach.*

The Diaconate is part of “a threefold ministry of worship and service . . . “ No one is ordained in isolation. Ordination involves **relationships** that are hierarchical. Bishop, priest, deacon each serve God and the Church. In the Sacraments, administration of parishes, preaching and works of charity, each has an official role. That role presupposes obedience to Church Law, the pope and the local ordinary (bishop). A good minister is **not** an ordained version of the “Lone Ranger”!

I say all of this as we bid Deacon Rod Ranola farewell. We are grateful for his thirteen years

of faithful service to this, his home parish. Now he has been called, as a deacon of the Chicago Archdiocese, to a new assignment. To serve St. Cornelius Parish will be his priority in ministry. He takes with him his experience here, our friendship, and our prayers. Ahead of him are new challenges and blessings.

In his function, Deacon Rod is like all deacons. What he brings to the ministry is uniquely personal. Personal gifts reveal who we are. Who we are ought to be a “sacrifice of praise” we give to God. Deacon Rod has a beautiful voice. I will miss his dramatic proclamation of the **Exultet** most, but also the way he could add unexpected harmony to a hymn at Sunday Mass. Often, when conducting a Wake Service, he will add a song. That impresses the bereaved. I know because they have told me.

Our staff is giving Deacon Rod a statue of the **Pieta** carved in the Holy Land. My personal gift is an icon of a Greek saint, **Romanos the Melodist**. Deacon Rod has a special devotion to the Blessed Virgin and has his own favorite saints. I want to “introduce” him to Romanos because they have two things in common - - they like to sing and they are deacons.



St. Romanos was Syrian in origin. He was ordained in Beirut and eventually served in the Church of the Most Holy Theotokos in Constantinople during the reign of Emperor Anastasius I (491-518). Romanos is considered the foremost hymnologists of the Eastern Church. In the East, hymnologists are recognized as

*Christians of virtue and great faith,
having been endowed with musical talent as well as the power of religious inspiration.*

There is a particularly beautiful story about Romanos. According to the account, he had a terrible voice. Whenever he tried to read or sing in the Liturgy, the congregation would cringe. Of course this made him sad. Nevertheless, he was devoted to the Holy Mother of God.

On Christmas Eve, he dreamed that the Blessed Virgin appeared to him. She held out her right hand with a scroll. She told Romanos, "Take the scroll and eat it!" He did as he was told. The next morning he was told to chant a verse proclaiming the Lord's Nativity. When he ascended the platform to sing, the people in that great church braced themselves, but were surprised! Romanos began:

*Today, the Virgin gives birth
to the one who is above
all living things . . .*

His voice was strong and mellifluous. All agreed he had the voice of an angel!

The voice and the verses he would later compose were "miracles" - - gifts to inspire the faithful. St. Romanos is called the "Melodist."

In his own way, Deacon Rod has been an excellent herald of the Gospel. He believes what he reads, teaches what he believes and tries to practice what he teaches. Wherever he is sent, that is what he has been called to do. I hope that my parting gift - - the icon of St. Romanos - - will remind him to be thankful that God has blessed him with a special gift. Like St. Romanos, Deacon Rod is a "Melodist."

HAVE YOU NOTICED?

A few of the smaller maintenance and improvement projects have begun. Some projects have been funded by the generosity of Parish organizations. Others are projects identified as desired to improve the comfort of our worship space.



1. The Crucifix has been removed for cleaning and preparation to be suspended over the altar.
2. The ceiling has been cleaned and prepared for the Crucifix
3. New ventilation has been installed over the baptismal font which will improve air circulation in the center of the church.
4. New energy efficient light bulbs have been installed - improving the lighting in the church and decreasing our lighting costs by as much as 30%.

We continue to search for and evaluate possible solutions to the challenges of our aging facilities. We are currently reviewing options for boiler and roof repair.

In those countries, they have worked with the people to establish schools, clinics and parish ministries. They are the ministers of the Word who have seen the Word work great miracles among the lives of the people to whom they minister-and in themselves.



HAVE YOU REGISTERED YOUR CHILDREN FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION?



Registration for the **2014-2015 RE Program for Kindergarten through Confirmation Year II (Gr. 8 and older)** is currently **taking place!** **Classes for Grades 1 – Confirmation Year II are on Mondays, 6:45-8:00 p.m. and the Kindergarten RE class meets on Sundays, 10:30-11:30 a.m.** Our year runs from late August to mid-May.

Families are strongly encouraged to have their children come each year as no one year suffices in providing what is important for a strong faith foundation. Students preparing for sacraments must attend for the two immediate years prior to receiving each sacrament. So First Graders are to attend religious education classes beginning this Fall in order to receive First Communion in the Spring of 2016.

Registration consists of filling out forms, providing copies of each child's baptismal certificate, if not baptized here at St. Isaac Jogues Parish and a partial payment. There is a tuition as well as book fees and sacrament fees (as applicable). **If families have children with special needs or older children who have not received their sacraments, we would be happy to discuss options for their religious education and preparation for sacraments. Families with financial concerns are encouraged to talk with us as no child is denied religious education because of finances. All are welcome!**

Please complete this important task now so that we are prepared with catechists, assistants, books and other materials! Sessions begin at the end of August. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Charlemagne, crowned Holy Roman Emperor on Christmas Day, 800, had a major interest in shaping the worship life of the church, and began a long period of reform and regulation. We owe many confirmation policies and practices to his rule. A baptized person was required to be confirmed as soon as the bishop's presence made it possible. Priests were expected to do their best in seeing to it that a newly-baptized child received the Eucharist. One twelfth-century ritual insists that if the child is not yet capable of eating or drinking, then the priest might give him or her some of the Precious Blood on a leaf or a finger.

Despite the best efforts of the Empire to hold liturgical life together, the rules were not always lived out with great beauty. St. Richard of Chichester of thirteenth-century England, for example, was canonized for his holy life as a bishop. One of the remarkable signs of his sanctity was his willingness to climb down from his horse to confirm "merely baptized" layfolk who crossed his path! This praiseworthy practice points a finger of blame at less zealous bishops, whose casual attitudes revealed a sacrament in need of rescue.




