THE MADONNA: "MY LADY... OUR LADY"

In our world, there will always be believers and non-believers. Both cover a broad spectrum. But there is another category - - those who are open to possibility. They can be young and innocent; they can be old and shop worn - - eager, bitter or unsure. Optimist, pessimist or realist, they admit life's mystery - - chance encounters, a journey to someplace new or even some "bright idea." As believers, we call it grace or providence.

As I reflected on last week's article, **Mary: The Christian Most United to Christ**, I had to admit that being grateful for the way other religious people appreciate Mary, I thought of an example of openness without immediate commitment. What came to mind, was a favorite film, **Under the Tuscan Sun**. Frances, the central character, is on the rebound from a painful divorce. She leaves her tour group, buys a villa in Tuscany, and proceeds to open her life to possibility.



An odd assortment of characters populate her new world. She wishes for a home, a family to inhabit it, and a marriage. Throughout her struggles, there is an unusual symbol - - the image of the Madonna. As a lapsed Methodist, is her immersion into the Italian Catholic culture playing tricks on her? Frances Mayes, the author explains **how** she can be open to Mary.

She always seems like Mary, the name of my favorite aunt rather than Santa Maria. Mary simply became a friend, a friend of mothers who suffered their children's pain, friend of children

who watched their mothers suffer. She's hanging over almost every cash register, bank teller, shot giver, bread baker in this town, and I've grown used to her presence. The English writer Tim Parks says that without her ubiquitous image to remind you that all will go on as before, "you might imagine that what is happening to you here and now was unique and important..."

For Frances, Mary's constancy is a little like the moon in its phases. "Aunt Mary" isn't high theology, but it has a connection to everyday life. Everyday life is the ground that opens to "heavenly seeds." Here the possibilities may include even the gift of faith.

G. K. Chesterton speaks of growing up a Protestant. Mary, in his **milieu**, was called the Madonna. He considers that might have been because of a "queer Victorian evasion; of translating dangerous or improper words into foreign languages."

But it is sincerity and a cultural nod to fine art and civilized achievement that motivate the use of the term Madonna. Translated from the Italian, it means "My Lady" - - a term echoing the ideals of courtly love and service. Today, "Madonna" has been vandalized, if not devalued, as a title because of an entertainer who needs no introduction and has already earned more than she deserves.

The real point Chesterton makes is one that Frances Mayes only implies - -

the Mother of God is in a rather special sense connected with things visible; she is of this earth, and through her bodily being God is revealed to the senses ... (she) does in some degree gather up and embody all those elements of the heart and the higher instincts which are the legitimate short cuts to the love of God.

The "Madonna" title makes Mary personal to the individual. She is "**My** Lady." It is when we see her personally relate to us that we catch a glimpse of her Community significance. She is "Our Lady." She isn't just "Aunt Mary," but "Holy Mary, the Mother of God."

As we celebrate two devotional feasts-- Our Lady of Knock and Our Lady of Czestochowa-- we can recognize how "My Lady" and "Our Lady" are two sides of a unifying Mystery. The mystery recalls

St. Augustine's perception that "God loves each of us as though each of us were an only child." But it also emphasizes that Mary belongs exclusively to no one group, but is Mother of All Peoples-- believers, unbelievers and those open to possibility.

GiveCentral is a safe, secure way to make donating easy. Your personal payment information is maintained in accordance with industry standards of online payment security or PCI Compliance. Credit card and bank account information is transmitted (not stored!) using Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) encryption. Every consideration was given to the needs of the donors, from security to ease of use.

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You can make donations from checking accounts, debit card accounts, and credit cards. You'll have access to reports allowing you to track your donations. You can add a memo to a donation indicating the purpose - Sunday collection, Annual Catholic Appeal, Christmas, Easter, - - again, the opportunity is yours. **GiveCentral** generates receipts via email.

FR. BILL BRINKER SCHOLARSHIP

Fr. William (Bill) Brinker was one of the founding fathers of Notre Dame High School, teaching for over 40 years! He was their first Athletic Director and designed the Letterman's jacket that is still worn today.


CHICAGO 2013 SHALOM FESTIVAL

The story of "Our Lady of Knock"



It all happened on a Thursday evening, the 21st of August, 1879 at 8:00 in the evening. Our Lady, Saint Joseph and St. John the Evangelist appeared in a blaze of light at the south gable of St. John the Baptist Church, Knock, County Mayo, Ireland.

They appeared to float about 2 feet above the ground, and each would occasionally move toward the visionaries, and then away from them. The Blessed Virgin Mary was clothed in white robes with a brilliant crown on her head. The crown was a deeper hue than the striking whiteness of the robe she wore. The upper parts of the crown appeared to be a series of sparkles, or glittering crosses. Where the crown rested on her brow, was a beautiful golden rose in full bloom. She was deep in prayer, with her eyes and hands raised towards Heaven. Saint Joseph wore white robes, stood on Our Lady's right, and was turned towards her in an attitude of respect. Saint John was dressed in a white vestment, stood on Mary's left, and resembled a bishop, with a small mitre. He appeared to be preaching and held an open book in his left hand. Behind them and a little to the left of Saint John was a plain altar on which was a cross and a lamb with adoring angels.

The apparition was witnessed by 15 people, including children and adults, male and female. Miraculous healings followed soon after in and around the area, and it is now a major pilgrimage destination. Devotion to Our Lady of Knock was approved by Archbishop Gilmartin, diocese of Tuam in 1936.

Pope John Paul II made a personal pilgrimage to the Shrine on September 30, 1979. He addressed the sick and the nursing staff, celebrated Mass, established the shrine church as a Basilica, presented a candle and the golden rose to the shrine, and finally knelt in prayer at the apparition wall.

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WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR?

“The Qur’an”

“For Muslims the Qur’an is the *exact* word of God spoken to Muhammad by the Angel Gabriel, revealed over a span of twenty-three years. After Muhammad’s death the words were put into a single volume that has remained exactly the same in the original Arabic for the past 1400 years.

“There are translations, certainly, into many languages but the translations are not to be understood as the Qur’an. God’s word is in Arabic. To ‘recite’ the Qur’an in its entirety is an honored practice and often done during the season of Ramadan, the month of fasting.

“The Qur’an is the source of faith and practice for Muslims and its central theme is relationship with God. It considers all the issues of human life, including belief, worship, and behavior. Unlike our Scriptures, the Qur’an does not have many long narratives, although it does contain well-known characters such as Noah, Abraham, Moses and Jesus. There is also a whole chapter on Mary, who is very much honored by Muslims.”

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The wonderful diversity of life and worship among Roman Catholics of East and West is an example of God writing straight with crooked lines. The steady hand of the villainous Emperor Diocletian drew a line across Europe and Africa that split the empire in two, and for the most part determined how Christians would worship two thousand years later.

Italy's heel and the far northern city of Trieste fell on the Eastern side, and have had a form of Eastern liturgy ever since. Constantinople, which soon became the seat of the Roman Empire, became a base for Christianizing the East up to Russia and Poland. Poland was on the Eastern side, but a series of wars and medieval mayhem pushed the religious boundary back to the Ukraine, and Poland remains an outpost of the Latin Church to this day.

An old rule of thumb declared that whatever religion was observed by the local prince, the people had to follow. This gave rise to persecution and migration as people sought toleration for their expressions of faith. In the United States, we are accustomed to peaceful collaboration among Christians of East and West, a situation that challenges churches that still feel the pinch of age-old division.






