“BROKEN?”

Our Ecumenical Hope

*Drive us in the open
where the sun will sew
our wounds
with golden threads.
COME LEAD US HOME.*

Life has “broken moments.” We cannot escape them. We speak of broken homes, broken relationships, broken promises, and (if we are, in the least, religious) broken commandments. The author of **Ecclesiastes** describes vanity with images of brokenness:

*Before the silver cord is snapped
And the golden bowl is broken,
And the pitcher is shattered at the spring
And the broken pulley falls into the well . . .
vanity of vanities . . . all is vanity!*

The subject of “brokenness” surfaced recently at a **John 17 Fellowship meeting**. Our Lutheran-Catholic dialogue group has begun to discuss **One Hope: Re-memembering the Body of Christ**. It is a book designed and written by Lutherans and Catholics in anticipation of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Christendom is broken. Can Christians “fix” the brokenness? Or is the brokenness like Humpty Dumpty after the fall? All the kings horses and all the kings men “couldn’t put Humpty back together again!” The **wars** of religion in the 17th century proved that all the kings, their horses, and men at arms only made the brokenness worse. What we have always needed is grace—the intervention of heaven—and an inspired vision of how **God** mends and restores. Humanly, we need honest, humble forgiving hearts. There is nothing like a story to illustrate an inspired vision. I am grateful to Pastor Lynne Morrow of the **John 17 Fellowship** for recommending a blog on **Kintsugi**—the Japanese art “that finds beauty and life in brokenness.” On that blog was a story by Tim Willard called **Beauty in Brokenness**.

The story is ancient, but its message is fresh, vital and needed.

Once there was an aspiring tea master who found an exquisite Chinese tea jar. He was so proud of his treasure that he invited the most renowned tea master in Japan, Sen no Rikyu, to his home. He put the jar where Sen no Rikyu could not help but see it. Much to the proud host’s chagrin, even when he served the master tea in the vessel itself, he paid no attention to it . . . not a comment or even a nod of appreciation!

When Sen no Rikyu left, the furious tea man flung the beautiful jar against the wall. Its fragments were gathered by his friends and meticulously glued back together with gold lacquer. The resourceful



friends then invited Sen no Rikyu to have tea with them. They served him tea in the mended jar. The master was enthusiastic as he took the jar: “Now the piece is magnificent!”

The story teaches a lesson. Tim Willard offers a postscript to his story:

When we release ourselves from the standard of perfection and view our path to wholeness as a Kintsugi artist would— as an opportunity to accentuate the unique beauty marks that bear our story— we shift our perception of life’s struggles. We see value emerge from our brokenness, and distinction from the fragments of ourselves that have been healed, as if we are living vessels bearing the Kintsugi beauty . . . each vessel— and every one of our lives— can tell a unique story if we no longer feel we must hid the scarred parts of our lives.

Thank you again Pastor Lynne and author Tim Willard. I now have more hope that Christendom can be “re-memembered.” It is by the divine “alchemy” that our human brokenness can be mended and a divided Church can be truly One!

Lorenzo Ruiz is the first Filipino saint.




He is also the first Filipino martyred for the Christian Faith. Lorenzo Ruiz was a layman, married and had two sons and a daughter. Born in Binondo, Manila, about 1600, he was educated in the school of the Dominicans there. He served as an altar boy and later was a helper and clerk-sacristan in the church of Binondo. He was a member of the Confraternity of the Rosary. He made his living probably as a calligrapher, one who renders documents in beautiful penmanship for private or official use. To be sure, that work denoted an accomplished and educated person, especially at a time when many an illustrious personage was far from excelling in this art. An adverse event made him leave the Philippines in 1636. When he was in his late twenties or early thirties, he became involved or was accused of being involved in a criminal case, the circumstances of which are far from clear. Whether he was involved or not, one thing was clear, he was afraid that, as a consequence of a trial or mistrial, he might be given a death sentence. After joining a group of missionaries bound for Japan where Christians were being persecuted, he was arrested and imprisoned together with his companions. He underwent inhuman tortures and valiantly confessed his Christian faith.

Refusing to renounce his Faith, he told his executioner that he was ready to die for God and a thousand times over again for Him. On September 27, 1637, he was hung from a gallows by his feet, his body falling into a pit. After two days of agony, he died of bleeding and suffocation. His body was cremated and the ashes thrown into the sea. He and fifteen companions, martyred in the same persecution, were beatified by Pope John Paul II in Manila on February 18, 1981 and elevated to full honors of the altar by canonization on October 18, 1987 in Rome. Their official feast day is September 28th.





TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

At first glance, the situation of the penitents in the early church is shocking: isolated and labeled, their journey back to fellowship at the Lord's table seems arduous and even cruel. However, at no time in the process were the penitents lacking the support of the community. Penances were performed for all to see, and we can tell from the homilies of the day that people earnestly desired to see the sinner benefit from the remedy. Tertullian reminded the penitents that they were living among their brothers and sisters, fellow servants of the same Lord, still in the embrace of the Spirit. He tells them that when they extend their hands in blessing to the faithful, it is Christ they touch. He tells them that when they see tears in the eyes of believers, it is Christ who is interceding for them with the Father.

There is a treasure of our tradition woven into this history: these people knew profoundly that the prayer of Christ's body, the church, was the prayer of Christ himself. Prayer was not merely support for a person down on his or her luck; it was effective and necessary. The treasure we can see even through the tangles of history is this: the Spirit of God is poured out on the church, and brings grace, forgives sin, makes us holy, and always calls us to fullness of life.
