




## ALL SAINTS' AND ALL SOULS' TRADITION IN NEW ORLEANS



It is said that when St. Anthony died in 1231, the people of Padua shed few tears. They were so certain that their holy, eloquent friend was in heaven that, on the day of his funeral, they decorated their houses with flowers. They rang bells and played lively, joyful songs! It wasn't an escape from the reality of death. Nor was it denial. It was an affirmation that at death "life is not ended, but merely changed." Centuries of that faith are reflected in the Vigil Service of the **Order of Christian Funerals**:

*My brothers and sisters, we believe that all the ties of friendship and affection which knit us as one throughout our lives do not unravel with death.*

*Confident that God always remembers the good we have done and forgives our sins, we ask God to gather N. to Himself . . .*

*" . . . For those who believe in your love death is not the end, nor does it destroy the bonds that you forge in our lives . . . "*

Decorating tombs and graves and honoring the memory of the dead are deeply ingrained in many cultures. It is a Christian custom, but it is rooted in a **human** need.

Some cultures actually celebrate a "Day of the Dead." We do not have to travel to Mexico or the Philippines or Poland to find an example.

New Orleans is an American city, but it is a fusion of cultures, a colorful mosaic of traditions. French, Spanish, Italian, and African-American folkways seem to harmonize with feasts of the Catholic Church. While **Mardi Gras** is the most famous example, All Saints' and All Souls' Days are also significant. In **Matters of Life and Death**, Leon Ronquillo explains that "in Louisiana the celebration of death does not end with the funeral." All Saints has been called by some, the "festival of the history of the city." Decorating cemeteries on All Saints Day has been a custom since the first cemetery, St. Louis Cemetery No 1, opened in 1742. The Bulletin cover shows "All Saints Day in New Orleans," a wood engraving by John Durkin. It was published in **Harpers Weekly**, November of 1885. It depicts families gathering faithfully at the above ground cemeteries "to clean, white wash and repair family tombs." Bouquets of flowers (mostly chrysanthemums and roses) are placed on the tombs. It is not uncommon for families to bring picnic baskets. Many remain to reminisce, pray, and recapitulate family history over lunch!

Not only family history but a combination of local pride and scandal may draw New Orleanians to cemeteries on All Saints' Day. For the "above ground tombs recall the lives of generals, voodoo queens, politicians, and rogues" as well as relatives.

New Orleans' "Cities of the Dead" can be dignified or carnival-like. Vendors may sell popcorn, tamales, pralines, candy and flowers as families clean, weed and whitewash tombs. Praying a rosary, lighting a candle, making a floral tribute may be followed by a toast. Some might consider this eccentric, even disrespectful on hallowed ground. But in New Orleans where "the saints go marchin' in" with a brass band, the Church Militant does its best to remember and celebrate what William Faulkner described:

"The past is not dead. It's not even past."



## REFORMATION SUNDAY:

### Hopeful Signs

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, then an Augustinian monk, nailed 95 theses on the door of Wittenberg Cathedral. It was a challenge to a



theological debate, but became the spark that ignited the Protestant Reformation. On the Sunday closest to All Hallows Eve, Lutherans and other Protestants celebrate Reformation Sunday. For centuries, no Catholic dared to appear, let alone participate in a commemoration of Luther's call for reform.

In 1971, a year after my ordination, I was honored to be invited to preach on Reformation Sunday. I will never forget ascending the steps of the pulpit of St. Timothy's Evangelical Lutheran Church. I was nervous. Looking over the congregation, I recognized a mixed assembly of Protestants and Catholics. Later I told the Lutheran pastor, I felt like an Arab celebrating Israeli Independence Day in Tel Aviv!

But Ecumenical charity prevailed. I spoke of change as a common experience . . . it's joys and sorrows and its inevitability. Was there a parallel between the doors of Wittenberg Cathedral and the portal of St. Peter's in Rome? A Protestant Reformation and a Catholic renewal set in motion by Vatican II . . . Could we find common ground? Was there hope for dialogue, sharing, possible reunion?

These questions were a revelation after almost 500 years of bitter conflict and so-called wars of religion. Still, caution tempered our enthusiasm.

History cannot be set aside like an empty china cup at a fellowship tea! But history can yield to the Lord

of History. And it is His Will that "All may be One."

My Reformation Sunday "debut" may not have been "Polyanna in the pulpit," but it was not without purple prose and overextended analogies. I dared to liken "reform" to a divine wind. A "new Pentecost" is not an original image of formation and reformation of the Church, but it did specify where the real hope for unity originates.

1971 is forty-two years ago. Since then, dialogue has borne fruit. Lutherans and Catholics "have come to acknowledge that more unites than separates them."

In 1999, there was the landmark agreement of Catholics and Lutherans on the doctrine of justification. That doctrine permanently divided the Church in the 16th century. Today there is a deeper understanding of how faith is expressed in good works. No armed conflict brought about agreement, but reason and faith.

Locally, a new Lutheran-Catholic dialogue between St. Isaac Jogues Parish, Messiah and Holy Trinity Lutheran Churches has begun. St. Isaac Jogues will be hosting the annual Morton Grove Interreligious Thanksgiving Eve Service. On December 8th, there will be an Ecumenical Advent Ceremony of Lessons and Carols at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Glenview.

On the world "stage," in preparation for the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, there is news of another Lutheran and Catholic accord. Setting aside centuries of hostility and prejudice, the Vatican and the Lutheran World Federation released "From Conflict to Communion" in Geneva, Switzerland on June 17th. In the document both sides embrace a new approach that focuses on a "reciprocal admission of guilt" and emphasizes positive progress made in fifty years of dialogue. While division remains on certain important issues, Lutherans and Catholics are committed to strive for greater understanding and harmony.

We urge all to pray so that "ALL MAY BE ONE."

## RESPECT LIFE MONTH DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

"Definition: A behavioral pattern based on the use of power and control of one person who perceives him or herself as stronger than another who is perceived as weaker. Domestic violence exists in different forms: physical, verbal (emotional or psychological), economical, sexual. Physical: Punching, slapping, pushing, kicking, pulling hair, pinching, threatening with a weapon, etc.; Verbal: belittling, insults, offensive language, name calling, excessive jealousy, silence, destroying clothing, harming pets, etc.; Economic: Denial of resources, especially money, schooling, driving, refusal to allow to work; Sexual: Obliging partner to watch pornography and require her to participate in offensive acts or wear offensive clothing, forced sex.

"Myths & Facts: *Domestic violence is not a serious problem.* Domestic violence in the U.S. is epidemic! Every 15 seconds a woman is beaten (FBI); 1 in 3-4 (25-33%) women is battered in her life time (U.S. Dept. of Justice). In Sunday religious service at least ¼ of women have experienced physical domestic violence and other forms. During the Vietnam War 57,000 U.S. soldiers died and at same time 54,000 women were murdered by partners in the U.S. In 2012 there were 556 calls a day for domestic violence in Cook County. Men are also victims (7-10% of victims are men) *Drugs, alcohol, stress, unemployment cause domestic violence.* They aggravate but do not cause it. *Domestic violence mostly occurs in lower class and minority communities.* Domestic violence occurs equally in all ethnic groups and social classes. *Batterers lose control; they can't help but behave violently.* It is learned behavior, it can be changed. *Battered women provoke their partners to use violence.* This is a form of blaming the victim. *Battered women don't want to seek help.* Battered women may be afraid to leave or ask for help for fear of the abuser or shame. Battered women's lives are most at risk when they attempt to move out. *Women's silence and/or actions can control the behavior of their abusers.* False. Silence will more likely protect abusers than women. Women's silence keeps them isolated. *When abusers apologize, ask for pardon, and promise to change, victims should forgive them.* Often this is a honeymoon phase used to control and manipulate victims. It is part of the cycle of domestic violence."

## SECOND COLLECTION FOR THE ARCHDIOCESE FOR THE MILITARY SERVICES

We will take up a **second collection for the Archdiocese for the Military Services (AMS)** at all the Masses the weekend of **November 9-10**. The guiding mission of the AMS is to provide the sacraments – and the re-affirming Word of Christ – to the men and women serving in our armed forces, patients in VA Medical Centers, civilians working for the federal government beyond U.S. borders, and the families of these populations. To provide these services they need your help – the AMS receives no federal funding.
