
The Short Fall and the Long Haul

THE NEGATIVE

Bob Kerls is an excellent business manager. Carefully read his annual Financial Report in today's bulletin. St. Isaac Jogues Parish Mission Statement challenges and encourages us

to help bring about and experience the Kingdom of God through active involvement, evangelization, and stewardship.

I am proud of our history and I believe in our future. Still, like you, I am disturbed by our unexpected deficit. My gut reaction is right out of Charles Dickens. I hear Mr. Micawber pronounce:



I am not an economist, accountant, or a financial analyst. I do not have to be to recognize that even the budgetary forecast is subject to UNEXPECTED - stormy weather, flooding, the high cost of snow removal. Nor are budget forecasts immune to changing trends in private school enrollment. Our tenant, Children's Learning World, fewer students, had needed classrooms, and paid us less rent. Bingo also brought in a lower profit. Weather was partially responsible for that too. While we depend on our tenants and Bingo, our deficit was also the result of a decline in weekend contributions.

Extraordinary expense for necessary repairs to the Rectory has been an ongoing concern. Special

collections for parish needs have been kept to a minimum. Rectory replacement of porous brick, plastered walls and part of the roof could hardly have been anticipated fully in last year's budget! When special parish collections occur, please try to understand and be generous.

PICTURE IN PROGRESS

Some time ago, Bob Kerls proposed a simple solution to our deficit problems. In his bulletin updates and "financial snapshots," there is a record of the "ups and downs" of parish giving. Bob has suggested that if everyone gives \$2 more in his or her weekend envelope, the deficit will no longer be a problem. We are grateful that many parishioners have responded to Bob's appeal. But sometimes we recognize that God is giving us a preview of the "hundredfold..." something beyond **our** efforts and expectations.

There is a kind of "in joke" in most rectories. When we tell people to find information in the Bulletin, the customary retort is,

"BUT NOBODY READS THE BULLETIN!"

If you have read thus far, congratulations! But I can honestly say that a recent experience convinces me that people not only read the Bulletin, they really care about their parish!

I received a telephone call from a parishioner about an appointment. In the course of our conversation, he told me he read about the deficit and wanted to do something about it. Soon after the call, the parishioner came in to the Rectory and handed me an envelope. He said little, But made me promise to keep the gift anonymous. When I opened the envelope, I found a check for \$3,000. Extraordinary? Perhaps, but whether it is \$2 or \$3,000 ... it can be like a "negative" transformed-- a "picture in progress." If you have not already done so, please add \$2 or more to your regular weekend offering. Help us to eliminate the shortfall, and for the "long haul."



Each Parish in the Archdiocese of Chicago is required annually to publish its financial results. This is an important requirement to ensure oversight, transparency and good stewardship.

This has been a very difficult year for our nation and our community! The financial problems which have hit many of our parishioners are reflected in the Parish's financial results. As you will see in the following tables the Parish incurred a deficit for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009. Factors which contributed to this deficit are detailed on the following pages.

For Fiscal Year 2010 a balanced budget was submitted to the Archdiocese. This budget is based upon a pay freeze for all parish employees, reduced spending and an <u>increase</u> in Sunday Collections.

The following table provides an overview of St. Isaac's Fiscal Year 2009 results compared to Fiscal year 2008. Additional detailed information is provided on the following pages.

Financial Highlights FY 2009

- Operating Expenses exceeded Income by \$74,500.
- Actual Sunday Collections declined by \$5,403 from Fiscal Year 2008.
- Sunday Collections dropped by \$23,000 over the last six months of the fiscal year (January to June 2009).
- Actual Sunday collections were \$34,000 less than the 2009
 Fiscal Year Budget.
- Christmas and Easter
 Collections remained flat year
 over year.
- Lease income decreased by \$36,786.
- Bingo attendance and income decreased by \$5,000 when compared to Fiscal Year 2008.
- Operating Expenses increased by only 2%.



Now for the details ... Let's start with Income.

Income decreased by 7.9% in Fiscal Year 2009! Sunday Collections lagged behind Fiscal Year 2008 by \$5,403. It is imperative for our Parish's health that collections are increased. Each week an average of over 1,470 persons attend Mass at St. Isaacs. An increase of \$2 per week by each person would help to ensure the financial health of the Parish.

We depend upon Sunday, Christmas and Easter Collections for the majority of our income. Sunday collections dropped dramatically in the last six months of the fiscal year (January to June 2009). This was a decline of almost \$34,000 from budget projections.

A significant portion of Parish revenues comes from the leasing of classrooms. The economic downturn has had a dramatic impact upon our prime renter, Children's Learning World. Decreases in enrollment led to fewer rooms rented and a decline of almost \$37,000 in rental income.

This line shows the net results of Bingo. Revenue for the year amounted to \$46,592. Expenses were \$16, 317. Bingo is an important source of funds for the parish. But we are running short of volunteers to run this operation!!! We desperately need volunteers to continue!!!

The support of the parish provided by organizations continued to be a bright spot! We are indebted to the Men's Club, Women's Club, and Filipino Parishioners, for their hard work in raising funds. Note that results for 2008 include the net proceeds of that year's Parish Raffle.

Expenditures - Salaries & Benefits


Salaries and benefits represent the cost of six full time staff, six part time staff and teenagers who work as part time receptionists. Full time staff members include the Pastor, Business Administrator, Director of Religious Education/Liturgy Coordinator, Music Director and our two person Maintenance Staff.

Expenditures - Utilities, Maintenance & Repairs.

The cost of electricity and natural gas increased by \$11,450 and \$4,100 respectively. These increases were partially offset by reduced charges for Water and Telephone. The good news is that natural gas and electricity rates have dropped in FY 2010. Pray for a mild winter this year!!



We have an excellent Maintenance Manager in Jerzy Sokolowski. His expertise and diligence has helped to minimize our maintenance and repair costs. But, maintaining and repairing our buildings is expensive. Included in this number is \$15,313 for snow removal. Pray for a mild winter this year!!

Administration expenses include the cost of office supplies, copy machines, postage, collection envelopes, computer equipment and software.

Diocesan charges include the Parish's portion of property insurance, payroll taxes, benefits and the mandatory assessment for support of the Archdiocese.

All Other includes the cost of the Ministry Center, Parish Nurse program and the school subsidy paid to St. John Brebeuf. The subsidy increased from \$25,000 in FY 08 to \$32,000 in FY 09.

Rectory Repair Collection

During the year significant repairs were needed to the exterior brickwork of the Rectory/Parish Office Building. Water damage caused by faulty brickwork resulted in extensive internal damage to the building. Phase One of this Project replaced brickwork on the southern and eastern exposures and repaired or replaced damaged interior walls, ceiling joists and electrical outlets. Phase II work on the northern exposure was completed in the current Fiscal Year 2010.

ABOUT NEXT WEEK'S READINGS

DANIEL: "The book of Daniel was written 150 years before Christ, when the Jews were experiencing fierce persecution. The author wanted to encourage the people by telling heroic stories about a person

named Daniel who lived many centuries earlier. Today's reading describes his vision of heaven, and is written in symbolic language—similar to the book of Revelation. The term 'Son of Man' indicated a human chosen by God for a special purpose. Christians have applied this vision to Jesus."

REVELATION: "The book of Revelation was not intended to predict actual people and events in later times. It was rather intended to be a source of hope for Christians toward the end of the first century who were suffering persecution. Today's passage is from the very beginning of the book and is part of a greeting from God the persecuted people."

HUMAN CONCERNS

American Diabetes Month

Diabetes is a chronic, progressive disease that impacts the body's ability to "produce or respond properly to insulin, a hormone produced in the pancreas, "that allows blood glucose (sugar) to enter the cells of the body and be used for energy." (About American Diabetes Month," pg. 5, Daily Herald, American Diabetes Month, Wed. Nov 4, 2009) Without insulin, the body's cells don't work right & they "starve for energy." ("Children & Diabetes", pg. 2) It is a condition that affects almost 24 million Americans – both adults & children – & is "the sixth leading cause of death by disease in the US." (pg. 5)

There are two forms of diabetes – Type 1 & Type 2. In Type 1, the pancreas no longer manufactures insulin. Those affected must rely on insulin shots so their cells can be properly nourished. Without insulin, glucose in the blood increases & causes symptoms such as excess thirst, weight loss, increased urination, blurred vision, as well as fatigue and weakness. ("Symptoms" pg. 7) In Type 2, the pancreas may not be producing enough insulin or the body doesn't utilize it properly. Weight loss, a prescribed diet, exercise & medication (if indicated) can help.

Although lifestyle changes (diet, exercise, controlling stress, not smoking & limiting alcohol intake), insulin & oral hypoglycemic medications can help a diabetic lead a long & healthy life, even with the best control may not prevent complications. Long term effects — related to age at onset, poor control, & non-compliance — include heart disease, kidney disease, nerve damage in the feet, and blindness.

In the next weeks, I'll write more – about risks, facts & stats & diet. Meanwhile, be well!

Great American Smoke-out

Thursday, Nov. 19 is the American Heart Association's annual effort to get Americans who smoke to quit for one day. Why? Because "smoking is dangerous." "...it is responsible for almost 90% of lung cancer deaths... & "causes most cancers of the bladder, larynx, and esophagus." Smoke from tobacco "contains 4,000 chemicals...over 60 known to be cancer causing. Among the dangerous chemicals are "carbon monoxide, arsenic & lead." Smoking can lead to or impact heart & vascular diseases as well lung disorders such as emphysema. In addition, there's the issue of secondhand smoke that can affect children & the unborn. The results of exposure can mean smaller babies, infants with weaker lungs, SIDS, bronchitis, pneumonia, more frequent asthma attacks & more ear infections. 





ADDING NAMES TO THE PARISH SICK LIST

It has always been the policy of St. Isaac Jogues to offer our parish community an opportunity to pray for those parishioners who are ill and in need of our prayers. We have tried to keep close track of these names for our Bulletin as they are made available to us.

However, now we face an important privacy issue, very much like the issues faced by hospitals, health institutions, and certainly by other parishes.

We cannot (by law) publicly let our parish community know the health status of any of our members without their permission.

We appreciate the fact that often friends, neighbors, and acquaintances wish to do something special for a person who is ill, and ask to place their name on the list to be prayed for. While their intentions are surely good, we simply can no longer accept names in this manner.

We will institute a new process regarding calling in names for the Bulletin list.

Names for the sick list placed in the Bulletin have to be called in by the person who is ill, or by a member of their family. At the time they call in the name, they will be asked whether they are the sick person him/ herself, or a member of their family, and if they give permission for the name to be placed on the list. They will be asked for the correct spelling of the sick person's name. If a family member, they will be required to give their name for our records.

Thank you for your patience regarding this new process. We wish to do all we can to offer our parish community the opportunity to offer prayers for those who are ill — but we must also be cognizant of the fact that all members of our congregation are entitled to their privacy in this regard.
