

CHRIST OUR KING



“Crossing the Threshold of Mercy and Life”

Over the main portal of great medieval churches is Christ the King. In his majesty, Jesus is enthroned in glory. Beneath him are the living and the risen dead awaiting the Final Judgement. Depending on the artists' imagination and motivation, it can either be a vision of heaven's triumph over evil or a graphic depiction of the “Day of Wrath”. Two French churches provide contrasting images of Christ the King. At Autun, the artist, identified as Gislebertus, dramatically doles out severe judgements in stone. Listen to how Lord Kenneth Clark describes them:

The row of the Damned under the feet of their Judge in the predella of the tympanum forms a crescendo of despair. They are reduced to essentials in a way that brings them very close to the art of our time: a likeness terrifyingly confirmed by the gigantic hands that carry up the head of a sinner as if it were a piece of rubble on a building site...Like all story-tellers, Gislebertus had a taste for the horrors, and went out of his way to depict them.



Studying the grotesqueries of the “Judgement” carved at Autun, they could well be accompanied by that musical masterpiece, the **Dies Irae**, once chanted on All Souls' Day and at most Catholic funerals.

*Day of wrath! O day of mourning,
See fulfilled the prophets' warning;
Heaven and earth in ashes burning.
Oh, what fear man's bosom rendeth,
When from heaven the Judge descendeth,
On whose sentence all dependeth...*

*Death is struck and nature quaking,
All creation is awaking
To its Judge an answer making...*

Far different is the wondrous portal of Vezalay Abbey. Christ is depicted not as Judge, but as Redeemer of the world. It is almost a reprise of Pentecost! Christ extends his blessing. Streams of light radiate from his fingertips to inspire the apostles. Their mission is to preach salvation to every nation and people. In panels surrounding the tympanum we see humanity in all its diversity—from pygmies to wolves' headed mutations with wolves heads! All are destined to hear the Good News!

The two medieval portals stand in stark contrast. Autun reveals the terror of Judgement, heaven and hell, the saved and the damned. Vezalay inspires us with a new creation through the transformation of grace. The Second Vatican Council teaches

*We know neither the moment of the consummation of the earth and of man, nor the way the universe will be transformed. The form of this world, distorted by sin, is passing away...God is preparing a new dwelling and a new earth in which righteousness dwells, whose happiness will fill and surpass all desires of peace in the hearts of men (**Gaudium et Spes, 39**).*

The Second Coming of Christ as King is about judgement and transformation. This life is the threshold to both. In the Middle Ages this inscription was often carved at the entrance to the church:

“Per me transite. Non est via altera vitae!”

“Pass through here. There is no other way to life!”

On the Solemnity of Christ the King, let us see ourselves at the threshold of God's mercy and a life transformed by grace.



As we prepare the way of the Lord, we gather as Christians to learn, share and celebrate our faith in and love for the Word made flesh as well as some of our special Advent traditions and guides.

WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS?

The Church wants to respond to and serve families, which are the reasons for the 2014 and 2015 synods in Rome. This year's Synod was entitled, *The Vocation and Mission of the Family in the Church and the Contemporary World*. The Holy Father made sure it was not "just a meeting" for people to get up and talk about nothing, or quote from scripture, but a time to truly reflect on the ordinary life of real people. The family is truly the "school of humanity;" it is critical for our existence and it experiences many challenges today. If we're really a domestic church, then we have to see the family as living together as the body of Christ, and it is a body of Christ in which there is ongoing conversion and a missionary spirit. Everything that is applicable to the Church as the body of Christ is also applicable to a family.

The concerns about marriage and family life are most important. With that in mind St. Isaac Jogues Parish Pastoral Council invites you now, and in the months ahead, to read, reflect on, and respond to one of the questions from the synod. The discussions will continue and actions are being developed. Your input and suggestions will be brought not only to our Council but to the Deanery and Archdiocesan Councils as well. **Please respond to either or both of these questions by December 1st** by dropping off your response at the rectory or the sacristy to the attention of Kathy Lord or Dee Stanton or emailing SIJPPC8149@yahoo.com, or in person. Thank you for your participation!

From the working document of the synod: "The family is a place of gathering. And so, inclusion is a hallmark of its existence. Exclusion, then, contradicts the very nature of family life. In today's context, there are groups of people who pose a challenge to the inclusive nature of family. They call for special attention. Among them are the elderly, widows, those in the final stage of life, the disabled, and migrants. Special challenges with inclusion emerge in cultures that foster arrangements that contradict marriage or family life, such as: polygamy, marriages of mixed religion, cohabitation, marriage in stages, the birth of children outside of marriage, and the often confused role of women in society and in the family."

How can the Church be a place which gathers all those who might otherwise be excluded, so that everyone feels that he or she has a home, a community of belonging? How can families become "open families" that welcome those who otherwise might not be welcome?

Dear Parishioners:

My name is Gabrielle Carsello and my family have been parishioners for many years. I am a Lector and Eucharistic Minister at the 10 a.m. Mass and I have been part of the Teen Group, now Young Adult Service Ministry, since it began a few years ago.

As a student at Northwestern University, I have chosen to be involved with its Students for Life chapter (NSLF), and I am grateful to be a part of this very important group. Our organization has a wonderful opportunity to support life in January, 2016 by traveling to Washington, D.C. to join with hundreds of thousands of people in the **March for Life**. This will be the **43rd anniversary of the Roe v. Wade** Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion in the United States. Since that time over 55 million men, women and children have deeply suffered the tragedy of abortion – hundreds of these individuals affected each and every day in Illinois alone. I feel this is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that I would very much like to take part in to make a difference in the fight to save the unborn and to grow in my commitment to value life.

However, I need your support. The cost of the trip is **\$300 per person**, which includes travel, lodging, most meals, and our Students for Life of Illinois Summit.
