From the Pastor

THE DAY AFTER CHRISTMAS: "Boxing Day"

strive to avoid the understandable melancholy of December 26. It's the "morning after"- - the hangover after the great feast. For me, the day after Christmas has always had a gray filter. Perhaps it's all those empty boxes, crumpled wrapping paper and discarded Christmas trees waiting in the gutter for their "final solution." It is a "mood indigo" like the one I've just described that probably inspired English poet, W.H. Auden, to write For the Time Being: A Christmas Oratorio. Though Auden composed his long poem in 1945, its contrast of the Nativity of Our Lord with contemporary attitudes is still as fresh as it is disturbing. The final speech by the narrator of the poem has been described as the modern "crisis of faith and brotherly love." It is all so matter of fact. Yet it echoes a popular cry — an impasse between boredom and quiet desperation."

Well, so that is that. Now we must dismantle the tree,

Putting the decorations back into their cardboard boxes- -

Some have got broken- - and carrying them to the attic.

The holly and the mistletoe must be taken down and burnt,,

And the children got ready for school. There are enough

Leftovers to do, warmed up, for the rest of the week- -

Not that we have much appetite, having drunk such a lot,

Stayed up so late, attempted - - quite unsuccessfully- -

To love all of our relatives and, in

general,

Grossly overestimated our powers.

Auden's "lament" seems most incurable when it becomes epilogue. Auden succeeds in showing what has been missed. It is the *Magnum Mysterium*, the Great Mystery, itself. The Lord's Nativity, His Incarnation, is the ever-ready remedy for what ails our contemporary celebration of the Christmas Season.

We need to return to the "happy traditions" of the Christmas **Season**. I emphasize season because Christmas **begins** a season of light and grace. Returning to W. H. Auden- - he had a prophetic message to his own British Christian people. In the face of wonderful traditions and customs that extend Christmastide, it is nonetheless a "battle" to know our heritage and share it enthusiastically with the young. There are, in Britain,

the United States and Canada opposing voices and secular forces that compete with and often reject the ongoing "spirit" Christmas. How refreshing it is to run "counterclockwise" in the mad cuckoo clock of our secularized society.

How delightful it is to "restore" the feasts of ancestors. I highly recommend a simple book, A Yearbook of Seasons and Celebrations by a Catholic writer, broadcaster, and journalist, Joanna Bogle. Joanna and her husband, James, are regulars on EWTN. While I never grew up with the celebration of "Boxing Day," I thought it most interesting that this legal holiday in Britain began as a charitable outreach to the poor. The "boxes" in guestion were alms boxes that were opened and distributed to the needy on the Feast of St. Stephen (December 26). The tradition grew to include "boxes" or gifts to servants, dustmen, postmen, etc. Apprentices, assistants, and eventually even children might also take up a kind of collection from employers or those deemed to be their "betters."

There is a warm, family spirit on "Boxing Day." The leftovers of goose, turkey, or ham accompany a uniquely British "mash" called "Bubble and "Squeak." Sounds dreadful, but it is actually quite tasty! The popular British comedy series called *Two Fat Ladies* demonstrated how to make "Bubble and Squeak" even for very discriminating plates -- the priests of Westminster Cathedral!

BUBBLE AND SQUEAK (Two Fat Ladies) Serving Size : 1 Preparation Time :0:00 Amount Measure Ingredient -- Preparation Method 1 pound cold potatoes 2 ounces dripping or lard 1 onion finely chopped 8 ounces cooked cabbage or sprouts -- chopped Salt Black pepper -- freshly ground

Finely chop the potatoes and crush slightly. In a frying pan melt half the fat and lightly fry the onion. Mix in the potato and greens and season well. Add more dripping or lard. Press the bubble into the hot fat and fry over a moderate heat until browned underneath. Turn the bubble over, add the last of the fat and fry until the other side is browned.

EVANGELIZATION THROUGH TV ADS

Evangelization has always been the mission of the Catholic Church. The call to evangelize first given to us by Christ requires that we proclaim the word of God using every means of communication. In the Church today using the media has become indispensable in bringing the Gospel message into the world through the internet, radio, and television.

In 2009 Cardinal George collaborated with the Bishops in the Dioceses of Rockford and Joliet on an evangelization initiative using television advertisements. Catholics Come Home Chicago gave us ads in three languages broadcast on 10 networks that invited Catholics who had drifted from the practice of the faith to come home. Over 70% of the parishes responding to a survey on the initiative felt it has been a benefit to their parish in several ways – increase in Mass attendance, more people participating in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, a renewed sense of Catholic identity in active parishioners, etc. While we have experienced a period of growth in number and strength, we know that the continuation of this work is the responsibility of every person in the parish.

This year there are *Catholics Come Home* ads on TV from now to mid-January. Once again, the ads will become a catalyst for faith conversations and moments of evangelization in homes, schools, neighborhoods and places of business around the

Archdiocese. Here at St. Isaac Jogues we are asking you to pray for those who have been away to consider the invitation to come home, to invite family members, friends or neighbors to join you for Mass at Christmas, to give them some of the information that is available at the Welcome Table in the Holy Family Room, or that can be found in the pamphlet rack by the parking lot door (near the Ushers Room) and to accompany them to parish events. Preparing the Spirit for Christmas Keeping a Spiritual Journal



As we have walked the Advent path these past weeks, we have been preparing not only for the secular celebration of the season, but also for the religious holyday on which we commemorate Christ's birth. Although our journey concludes at week's end, anticipation of His coming again in glory continues. As a way of being ready each day – for we neither know the hour or the day – I offer this spiritual practice. It comes from a program called *Experiencing God*.

Many people journal – to record significant events, work through difficulties & release emotions. "Keeping a spiritual journal will help [one] remember the important things God says...and the things He does in your life." You may use the following questions as a guide for each day's writing or tool for reflecting upon a week of entries. Remember nourishing the spirit can make a body well!

What has God revealed about Himself? What has God revealed about His purposes? What has God revealed about His ways? What has God done that caused you to experience His presence? What Scripture has God used to speak about Himself, His purposes, or His ways? What particular person or concern has God given you to pray for? What has God done that has given you a sense of His timing or direction concerning any aspect of His will? What word of guidance or truth may God have spoken to you through another? What adjustment is God leading you to make in your life? What acts of obedience do you know God wants you to take?

We <u>REALLY</u> need Bingo Workers!

We have a long history of Friday night Bingo at St. Isaac Jogues. In order to continue this Friday night tradition of service, support and fund we need volunteers.

We have a critical need in the following areas.

<u>Kitchen</u>

The kitchen sells comfort food for our patrons. We offer Sloppy Joes, Tuna Salad, Grilled Cheese and Hot Dogs along with fresh Pop Corn and candy bars. The Kitchen is open from 5:30 to approximately 7:30. Preparation begins between 4:00 and 4:30. We need two volunteers to man the kitchen each week. The goal is to have 8 to 12 individuals who would rotate responsibility.

Bingo Games

The doors for Bingo open at 5:30. Our goal is to have four teams each consisting of five to six workers. The teams are made up of a Leader who oversees operations; a Caller who runs each game; three Floor Walkers who sell Bingo cards and verify winning cards; and a Casher. We are extremely short of help in this area, particularly on the third week of each month. We need 10 to 12 volunteers to man this operation.

Cashiers

The Cashier is responsible for recording eh number of winners and the payout for each game. Recording receipts, disbursing cash to pay gamer winners, preparing the summary of the night's results and of course preparing bank deposits

Processions

Why does the liturgy begin with a procession? It is not just a practical matter of getting the ministers of the liturgy from the sacristy to the sanctuary. The procession is a powerful sign of who we are as Christian people. We are not static, staying in one place. We are going somewhere. Our procession leads us to the altar, sign of Christ's presence in our midst. We move, we process, because we recognize our need for what Christ is preparing for us at that table. We go forward eagerly, because we are hungry for that heavenly food. This procession is an orderly one: servers, deacon, priest presider. Each is set apart by distinctive vesture: albs for the altar servers, dalmatic for the deacon, chasuble for the priest. The procession is an image of the hierarchical structure of the Church. On a deeper level it is an image of unity in diversity. We are all on a journey to the heavenly city, but each of us is clothed with different gifts. We all receive the call to service, but not in the same way. Only by coming together in all our wonderful variety can we achieve the work of the kingdom.

ADDING NAMES TO THE PARISH SICK LIST

It has always been the policy of St. Isaac Jogues to offer our parish community an opportunity to pray for those parishioners who are ill and in need of our prayers. We have tried to keep close track of these names for our Bulletin as they are made available to us.

However, now we face an important privacy issue, very much like the issues faced by hospitals, health institutions, and certainly by other parishes.

We cannot (by law) publicly let our parish community know the health status of any of our members without their permission.

We appreciate the fact that often friends, neighbors, and acquaintances wish to do something special for a person who is ill, and ask to place their name on the list to be prayed for. While their intentions are surely good, we simply can no longer accept names in this manner.

We will institute a new process regarding calling in names for the Bulletin list.

Names for the sick list placed in the Bulletin have to be called in by the person who is ill, or by a member of their family. At the time they call in the name, they will be asked whether they are the sick person him/ herself, or a member of their family, and if they give permission for the name to be placed on the list. They will be asked for the *correct spelling* of the sick person's name. If a *family member,* they will be required to give *their* name for our records.

Thank you for your patience regarding this new process. We wish to do all we can to offer our parish community the opportunity to offer prayers for those who are ill — but we must also be cognizant of the fact that all members of our congregation are entitled to their privacy in this regard.
